Pilots Pack 20-7 Record

PORTLAND (AP)—The University of Portland will take a 20-7 won-lost record into the Oregon district NAAI baseball playoffs Friday after downing Oregon College of Education, 6-0, to close its regular schedule.

It was the third straight year in which the Pilots have scored 20 or more victories.

Art Bull pitched the third consecutive victory for the Pilots. In seven innings he scattered three hits, two of them triples by Ray Derrah and Ross Lemien. Bill Booth wound up with two hitless innings.

Don Eisele, usually a pitcher, was in right field for the Pilots and let all hitters with two hits, driving home three of his team's first four runs.

Portland will meet Lewis and Clark, the defending champion, in the NAAI opener here. In a second game Friday Southern Oregon College and Portland State will meet.

AIR FORCE TAKES TO ICE
COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP)—The Air Force Academy is embarking on a new sport—ice hockey. The team will begin competition next winter, first on a club or intramural basis. The Falcons will play a full inter-collegiate varsity schedule during the 1960-1961 season. The Falcons will be coached by Vic Heyliger, who guided University of Michigan teams for 13 years. At Michigan, his teams won 227 tests, lost 60 and tied 13.

Basilio Star Of Robinson Title Hassle

NEW YORK (UPI)—Carmen Basilio, with his guarantee boosted to more than \$238,000, was slated to be the star witness today at Sugar Ray Robinson's title hearing.

Carmen's co-manager, Johnny DeJohn, also was scheduled for the stand. Middleweight champion Robinson hoped the increased guarantee to ex-champion Basilio for a Philadelphia title fight might dissuade the New York Athletic Commission from vacating his crown.

Irving B. Kahn, president of Teleprompter Corporation, announced Tuesday night he was raising the Basilio guarantee from \$225,000 to more than \$238,000 "if it will keep Carmen happy."

Teleprompter wants to buy rights to theatre-TV, radio and movies of the proposed Robinson-Basilio title fight at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium Sept. 21.

Kahn produced a certified check for \$225,000 at the hearing's opening session on Monday—as a Basilio guarantee.

Robinson, already stripped of his title by the National Boxing Association because of his failure to defend in 14 months, was threatened with similar vacating action by the independent New York commission at the current hearings—unless he could prove an all-out attempt to "enter into articles of agreement" for a fight with Basilio.

Bucs Option Paul Giel

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Righthanded pitcher Paul Giel, who made only four appearances for Pittsburgh this year, has been optioned to Columbus of the International League where Pirate officials hope he will develop with more work.

The Pirates announced Tuesday that Giel, who has pitched only 72-3 innings and has no record, would be sent to the Jets.

The 26-year-old former All-American halfback at Minnesota was obtained by the Pirates on waivers April 13 from the San Francisco Giants. Giel passed up professional football to sign a \$30,000 bonus contract in 1954 with the Giants, who were then in New York.

Giel's place on the Pirates' roster was filled with the recall of Don Williams, a righthanded relief specialist, from Columbus. Williams, 27, compiled a 1-2 record in 12 appearances for the Jets as a reliever. Williams pitched in two games for the Pirates last September.

Giel's final outing as a Pirate was Monday night when he pitched six innings against St. Paul of the American Association in an exhibition game. He allowed two runs and seven hits—four of them of the scratch variety—as the Pirates whipped the Saints, 6-3.

Billy O'Dell Wins Wager

BALTIMORE (AP)—Billy O'Dell was doubly satisfied with his 2-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox Tuesday night.

The Oriole lefty not only felt he had regained his form of last year but he won a wager as well.

O'Dell explained that he and pitcher Hoyt Wilhelm, neither noted for hitting, had bet on who would hit the most home runs during the season.

Both Orioles' runs came on O'Dell's inside-the-park second-inning homer Tuesday night, his first of the year.

"I've won the bet already," O'Dell said after the game. "O'Dell blooped the ball over first base for an apparent scratch single. But it hit on the white-washed wooden foul line and bounced over the head of right fielder Al Smith, charging in to field the ball on the hop. The ball rolled to the auxiliary scoreboard in deep right field."

The victory evened O'Dell's record at 2-2. Harried by a back injury earlier this spring, he was encouraged by the performance of his last ball. "I'm getting stronger I feel sure of that," he said.

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Fight Heads Probe Rumors

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The California Boxing Commission started a hearing today on reports that underworld forces have tried to muscle in on welterweight champion Don Jordan's managerial contract.

Chief of Police William H. Parker says the intelligence division of his department has been working with commission investigators for several weeks. He said the hearing would produce evidence that gang elements have plotted to control the welterweight division.

Louis Dragna and Joe Sica, identified by Chief Parker as gangland characters, are among those to be subpoenaed before the probe. Others subpoenaed are Truman Gibson, head of the National Boxing Enterprises in Chicago; Bill Daly, New York City fight manager; Jack Leonard, Hollywood boxing promoter; and Jordan's manager, Don Nesseth.

Nesseth has openly charged that Frank "Blinky" Palermo of Philadelphia tried to move in on his contract with Jordan.

Today's hearing is one of several in recent years in California into the operation of the fight game.
