

\$30,000 Damages Awarded To Lad

PORTLAND (AP) — A circuit court jury has awarded a 15-year-old Brightwood youth \$30,000 damages for injuries he suffered when he was struck by an automobile driven by Michael E. Salo of Bend.

Salo is secretary-treasurer of the Central Oregon District of the Sawmill Workers Union.

His car struck Lee R. Freeman on Highway 36 last July 10. The boy suffered a head injury and partial paralysis of his right arm and leg.

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Accord Reached On Issues As Newspaper Strike Ends

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Agreement on all issues in the American Newspaper Guild's three-month-old strike against the St. Louis Globe-Democrat was reached Tuesday night.

Observers hailed the settlement as clearing the way for an end to the strike against St. Louis' only morning newspaper. The Globe hasn't published since 332 Guild members struck last Feb. 21.

The agreement, reached in the presence of two federal conciliators, came after seven hours of negotiations. Its terms were not disclosed.

It must be approved by the strikers, the executive committee of the St. Louis Guild local and by the Guild.

The union negotiating committee

announced in a statement that it will call a membership meeting for Friday to consider the agreement. It said that it will recommend that the strikers accept the terms.

There was no indication as to when the Globe-Democrat could resume publication.

Picketing continued at the Globe-Democrat building. In its statement, the Guild said it was speaking for itself and Globe Publisher Richard H. Amberg.

The statement said differences on job security had been resolved. This was one of two major points in dispute. The other was a Guild demand for a funded pension plan similar to one in effect at the rival St. Louis Post-Dispatch, an afternoon newspaper.

The strike began in support of the Guild's pension demands. But during the strike, the Globe sold its plant and equipment to the Post-Dispatch. Amberg announced that the sale would result in fewer jobs on the Globe, and that some employees would have to be dismissed. The Guild demanded the right to negotiate any dismissals caused by the sale, and thus the job security issue was created.

When publication is resumed, the Post-Dispatch will print the Globe. The newspapers, however, will remain separate in all other aspects.

Pair Killed In Gun Fight

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A Richmond mother, who carried a pistol because she lived in mortal fear of a rejected suitor, met him on the street here Monday and a gunfight ensued in which both died.

Police said Annie Pizzuto, 31, and the suitor she had spurned — retired Salvation Army Capt. Marvin Edwards, 38 — fired almost simultaneously at point-blank range, she with a .22 automatic, he with a .45 revolver.

Mrs. Pizzuto, mother of two young children, shot five times, wounding Edwards in the abdomen and hand.

Edwards fired three times. The first two bullets struck Mrs. Pizzuto in the head and she fell dead. The third bullet Edwards pumped into his own brain, as he lurched away from the scene.

Edwards, jailed last February for threatening Mrs. Pizzuto's life, was released March 23 and the same day, police said, Mrs. Pizzuto applied for a permit to carry a pistol.

"My life has been threatened by Marvin Edwards twice with a pistol," she wrote on the application blank. The permit was issued March 25.

The shooting took place as Mrs. Pizzuto walked back to her job at a printing office after going home for lunch.

Mrs. Pizzuto lived with her daughters, Elaine, 6, and Joann, 8; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George M. Tunstall, and her sister, Betty Jo. She was estranged from her husband.

Phone Employees Receive Pay Hike

PORTLAND (AP) — Negotiators for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. and for the Communication Workers of America Monday reached agreement on a new contract approving pay hikes of \$1 to \$5 for some 4,300 employees in Oregon.

Ronald Hale, a union director, said the increase would average 7½ cents an hour.

The union has until June 2 to ratify the agreement which would be retroactive to May 17 and would run until Aug. 20, 1969.

Upgrading of workers at Pendleton, Baker and Ashland also is provided in the agreement.

Second Degree Charge Lodged

RAYMOND, Wash. (AP) — Lou T. Glazier, 43, was charged with second degree murder Monday in the beating death of Mrs. Bertina Stephens, 41, Portland.

Bail for the unemployed South Bend logger was set at \$10,000.

Mrs. Stephens, who had been visiting friends in South Bend, was brought to a hospital here May 5 and died three days later. The fatal beating apparently occurred May 3, police said.

Goats Become 'Forecasters'

ROSEBURG, Ore. (AP) — Oregon State College professors are taking an interest in the goats who forecast Roseburg's weather.

These goats roam wild on Mt. Nebo above Roseburg. Residents watch their movements closely.

"The goats are up" is a heartening cry in Roseburg. Picnics are planned, golf dates are made and fishing trips planned. Invariably the sun shines.

But when the goats come down from Mt. Nebo to the shelter of shallow caves, bad weather inevitably follows.

How do they know what the weather will be?

That's what OSC professors want to know. Stephen Shou, Oregon State College librarian, has written asking for extra copies of a recent Roseburg newspaper story on the goats. He said a number of professors are interested in knowing why townspeople remarked "the goats are down" last Sunday.

The people here know why. It rained Monday.

Rapid Transit Plea Issued

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown wants to see a speed-up of rapid transit planning to avoid "hopeless traffic congestion" 10 years from now in California's largest cities.

The governor Monday endorsed, again a bill by Sen. John F. McCarthy (R-San Rafael) to finance a rapid transit tube across San Francisco Bay if the area's residents vote a master bond issue to build the rest of the system.

Brown said he understood that the bill, blocked early this month in the Senate Transportation Committee, would soon be given further consideration.

He said he was also watching "with great interest" intensified efforts to develop a rapid transit system in the Los Angeles area.

Quoting Director of Public Works Robert Bradford, the governor said that "all of our freeway plans are based on the presumption that rapid transit will be a reality in the Bay Area and in Greater Los Angeles within 11 years."

"The state highway planners predict hopeless traffic congestion at peak commute hours by 1970 if a successful means of mass movement of workers to and from the job is not provided by that time."

Concert Set By Symphony

The Portland Symphony Orchestra, under direction of its new conductor, Piero Bellugi, will perform in Mills School Auditorium in Klamath Falls Monday evening, June 29, during one segment of its concert swing through the state.

Bellugi made no mention of selections to be performed. He recently signed a two-year contract with the Symphony Society. He will make his first appearance with the Portland Symphony on the road tour.

He conducted the Oakland, California, Symphony orchestra last year.

The tour will begin June 27 in Roseburg. Concerts are scheduled on following nights in Medford, Klamath Falls, Ontario, Pendleton and The Dalles.

Tickets will cost \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Arrangements for advance sales have not been made. More information has been promised by the Oregon Centennial Commission, which is sponsoring the tour. B. K. Swartz, curator of the Klamath County Museum, is in charge of local arrangements.

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Lumber Workers Return To Job

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP) — About 50 men were back at work Monday as lumber production began on a small scale at the former Ohio Match Co. plant here.

The new owner, Diamond Gardner Corp., said a smaller night shift would be put on next week.

About 270 workers were laid off when the plant was sold last month. Many of the men who began work Monday were former Ohio Match employees.

The International Woodworkers of America, which represented the displaced men, said the firm's policies on rehiring would determine the union's stand.

GRAY MARKET NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Thieves carried away more than a ton of liquid mercury Tuesday from a factory after smashing through 14-inch concrete walls to get at it. The mercury, valued at \$7,300, was stored in 33 metal flasks at the Troy Chemical Co. Detectors said the thieves might try to dispose of the loot on a flourishing gray market.
