Pathologists have determined that the tumor removed from Mrs. Truman's breast was not malignant. And their second grandchild was born Tuesday in New York. Truman was so elated he scheduled a press conference today to discuss his feelings about Mrs. Truman's operation and his new grandson. The tumor was removed by surgery Monday. "Thank God," exclaimed the 74-year-old Mrs. Truman when she heard the report. "I did not want to go through the rest of my life having people feeling sorry for me."

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP)—As a patrolman was making out a report Monday on a man's death leap, he got a cryptic phone call from a driver on the Pulaski Skyway. "Tell my wife I'm sorry," the voice said. Then the phone went dead. Patrolman John Schroeder sped two miles in his squad car to the Skyway telephone. He grabbed a man atop the guard rail 100 feet above the ground. Police identified the man as John Dundas, 35, of Jersey City. He was booked on a charge of attempted suicide. Then Schroeder went back and finished up his paper work on Vincent Crown, 41, Jersey City. Crown had jumped 50 feet from a viaduct between Jersey City and Hoboken.

### Group Mulls Ike's Choice

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's nomination of Ogden R. Reid to be ambassador to Israel was left dangling today in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. The committee concluded hearings on the nomination Tuesday, but returned today to closed hearings on President Eisenhower's \$3,500,000 foreign aid bill. There were some prospects a vote on Reid may be delayed until the committee's regular routine meeting next Tuesday. Reid is a former president and editor of the New York Herald Tribune. Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont), Assistant Majority Leader, voiced hope the nomination can be taken up in the Senate later that week for a vote on confirmation. Reid won the open support Tuesday of Sens. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) and William Langer (R-ND). The six Republicans on the committee are expected to support Reid to a man. They would vote to pick up only two other votes—in addition to Morse's—for a majority of nine in the 17-member committee.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Lansing, Mich., will have some hats for its 100th birthday party after all. The Michigan city had complained that it couldn't get any novelty hats because hat manufacturers were working overtime to fill orders for Oregon's Centennial.
