LAKEVIEW — Selection of the queen and court of the 1959 Lake County Roundup will be made Saturday, May 23, following a day's activities which include horsemanship tryouts at the roundup grounds and a dinner at an up-town restaurant that evening.

Girls who are candidates for queen are Patricia Oakley, Joy Kerr, Lucille Thompson, Terry Linecum, Roselle Fitzgerald, Welthy Warner, Glenda Branch and Sherrain Arzner. Each girl is sponsored by an organization in the county.

A new addition to the program of activities for the afternoon is a 4-H Gymkhana, which has been arranged by Club Agent Al Haslebach. Four-H horse clubs from all parts of the county have been invited to participate and all events will be on a club basis. Plans call for three events which will be divided into junior and senior divisions. Pole bending and the key-hole race will see individual riders performing against time. Times of individual club members will then be averaged out to pick a mythical winner. The third event is called musical ropes and will be a group activity.

Since competition in the Gymkhana is strictly for the fun of participating, the queen selection committee is considering treats for all those who take part.
