Big Ten, Rose Bowl Face End

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—The Big Ten will end its 13-year Rose Bowl football hookup today unless there is a last-minute switch in conference strategy.

As far as meets the eye, the Rose Bowl agreement has been killed in a standoff 5-5 vote by the individual Big Ten schools. Today's joint meeting of faculty representatives and athletic directors appears destined to deliver the fatal blow.

If the delegates from each school vote as instructed, the Big Ten will refuse to renew the Rose Bowl contract because a tie is as good as a no vote.

However, Rose Bowl proponents may try a delaying action.

Virtually all Big Ten football coaches and athletic directors favor the Rose Bowl. The opposition has developed at top faculty level, the same group which spurned postseason football competition before the present Rose Bowl pact was signed.

It was regarded as significant that a special meeting of faculty representatives has been set for July 25 in Chicago without any particular agenda.

If Rose Bowl action is shelved today, the matter might be carried over to the July 25 meeting. Meanwhile, an effort would be made to induce a bare winning majority in behalf of the Rose Bowl.

Vazquez Snares Los Angeles Bout

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Mexico's Mauro Vazquez, 20, climbed off the canvas Thursday night to score a split 10-round decision over veteran Cisco Andrade, 35, and rack up his 25th straight victory.

Vazquez, 133½, went down for a three-count in the third from a powerful overhand right by Andrade, 135, Los Angeles, but came back in the fourth to trade punches before 9,142 wildly cheering fans at Olympic Auditorium.

The Mexican put up a desperate fight in the 10th round which won him the frame and probably the fight. It was a nip and tuck battle the whole way between the young fighter and Andrade, once a high-ranked lightweight.

Referee Frankie Vann scored it 96-92 and Judge Joey Almos 95-92, both in favor of Vazquez, while Judge Tommy Hart had it even at 94-94. United Press International gave the nod to Vazquez, 94-93.

Danny Murtaugh, Pirates Find Curfew Lecture, Shakeup Pays

Pittsburgh Manager Danny Murtaugh might be wondering why he didn't speak up sooner. His lecture on curfew and all didn't sink in until he shuffled the lineup, but then his sixth-place Pirates got the idea.

Thursday night they put aside a slump that had draped them with four defeats in five games and scored a 12-hit, errorless 7-2 victory at St. Louis.

Murtaugh, who reminded his Bucs of the club's 2 a.m. curfew after they lost the Tuesday opener at St. Louis, shook up the lineup after they were whipped again Wednesday. He replaced shortstop Dick Groat with Dick Schofield and made Rocky Nelson his first baseman in place of the alternating Ted Kuszewski and Dick Stuart.

The worst skid of the year came to an end in the only other National League game scheduled when the Philadelphia Phillies, who had lost eight in a row, won 3-0 at Chicago behind Ruben Gomez's four-hit pitching.

Alex Miteff, Bethea Meet

NEW YORK (UPI)—Heavyweight Wayne Bethea of New York gets his big come back chance tonight as substitute in a 10-round fight with Alex Miteff of Argentina at Madison Square Garden.

Their bout — the first at the Garden in two months — will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC.

It will be 27-year-old Bethea's first important match since he was knocked out in the first round by contender Sonny Liston at Chicago last Aug. 6. Wayne scored minor victories earlier this year over Warnell Lester and Rudy Watkins.

Miteff, 24, is favored at 2-1 because of his combined boxing and punching ability. The former Pan American amateur champion had two bouts this year. He lost to contender Zora Folley of Chandler, Ariz., and he knocked out Harold Carter.

Miteff and Folley were slated for a return bout tonight, but Folley injured an arm in training. Bethea was called in as a replacement.

Betha, an aggressive but light-hitting mauler, won 19 of his 30 bouts, seven by knockouts. Miteff scored 10 kayoes while winning 17 of his 21 starts. He punches well to both body and head.

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Major Leagues Open Gate To 3rd League

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Baseball's major leagues have opened the gate for the formation of a third loop with major league status.

Operating heads of the 16 National and American League clubs agreed unanimously Thursday "to favorably consider" applications for major league status by "an acceptable group of eight clubs which could qualify."

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick says his personal belief is that such a league is inevitable and that it certainly will come within five years.

An even more optimistic report came from William Shea of New York's Major's Committee on Baseball. He said: "We ought to be ready in four or five weeks to do something. The third major league should be in the formative stage by that time."

Frick's statement, at the wind-up of a hastily called meeting, said, "There is no existing plan to expand the present major leagues." By that he meant expansion of the National and American leagues to 10 or 12 club organizations.

"The approach is to a third league," he said.

The statement from the club owners loosed a flood of speculation.

One was — How about ball players?

A third major league would need 200 players under the present player limit rule.

To that, Frick said, "The players will develop if you have the jobs for them."

He said there was no discussion in the meeting of player talent or a possible "share the player" plan with a new league.

Another question was — How about the cost and the effect on the minors?

One of the qualifications set up in the meeting Thursday was that the new league would be responsible for all territorial provisions and financial obligations necessary to set it up.

The best guess was that would cost many thousands of dollars to recompense the top minor leagues for cities taken from them. It undoubtedly would mean a wholesale realignment of the minors.

Among the cities which have been suggested as possible members of a new major league are New York, Buffalo, New Orleans, Dallas-Fort Worth, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Montreal, Seattle, Mexico City and Toronto.
