Training Told Of KF Yanks

Two sons of Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Stilwell of 3806 Clinton Avenue, recently completed phases of airborne training in the armed forces.

They are Aviation Cadet Donald D. Stilwell, 20, of the Air Force and Pfc. Robert "Lee" Stilwell, of the Army's paratroopers.

The cadet was graduated from Klamath Union High School in 1956. He entered the service a year ago, was graduated from pre-flight training at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, January 11, is flying T-37 jet training planes at Graham Air Force Base, Florida, and is scheduled to be graduated from the secondary phase of flight training July 14. He will receive an additional six months

of advanced flight training before receiving his wings and a second lieutenant's commission. The paratrooper was graduated last June from Klamath Union High School. Southern Baptists At Meet Trace World Good, Evils

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—A bell tolled somberly, and a voice sounded through the darkened hall:

... crime ... gambling ... alcoholism ... materialism ... atheistic and Communist philosophies ... obscene literature ... indifference to spiritual values ... disintegration of American home life ...

In such terms, Southern Baptists traced the perils of the world Thursday night. But their big convention also saw a bright side.

"This is truly a year of revival," the voice flooded over the massed thousands, and chimes rang. "We thank God for the victories ... We thank God for the working of his spirit ..."

It was a broad-gauged presentation, in stark and dramatic mood, as the denomination's Home Mission Board staged its version of the trials and hopes of America, 1959.

"Southern Baptists ... This Is Your Life," the graphic report was titled.

It ranged from Cuba to Alaska, and to churches and mission sta-

tions across the continent as it portrayed the efforts of Christians and the challenges they face. Missionaries, hospital workers, teachers and others took turns telling of their work.

About 15,000 Baptists, most of them "messengers" from home churches in 45 states, witnessed the presentation staged at the huge Fairgrounds Coliseum with theatrical lighting and sound effects.

Probation Given Medic

WAUPACA, Wis. (AP) — A small-town physician has been placed on probation to satisfy a burglary charge stemming from a compulsive yearning for antiques that led him to loot the homes of patients.

"I feel good about it," said Dr. Ralph Wiley, 42, after the penalty was imposed Thursday. A native of Amityville, N.Y., Dr. Wiley practices at Iola, a village of 867 persons in east-central Wisconsin. As for reaction from his neighbors and patients, Wiley referred to an "understanding between us." He said his problem "was never mentioned" by the villagers. And said there had been no decline in his practice since the charges were made public.

Wiley said he had noticed the antiques when calling on his patients and returned to pick them up when he knew no one was home, always making his stops in the daytime. He said he wanted to start a museum.

The probation was ordered by Circuit Judge Herbert J. Bunde, who said the physician must continue to receive psychiatric help and make restitution.

DEATH PROBED

PORTLAND (AP)—Police opened an investigation Tuesday into the death of Frank E. Hubert, 60, of Portland, on the theory he might have been struck by a hit-run vehicle.

The coroner's office said injuries Hubert suffered Sunday could not have been caused by a fall to the pavement as first believed. An autopsy revealed a brain hemorrhage, hip and multiple rib fractures and blood in the lung cavity.
