Mrs. Ambord and Mrs. Yaden were each dressed in blue suits with white accessories. Both mothers had corsages of pink and white carnations.

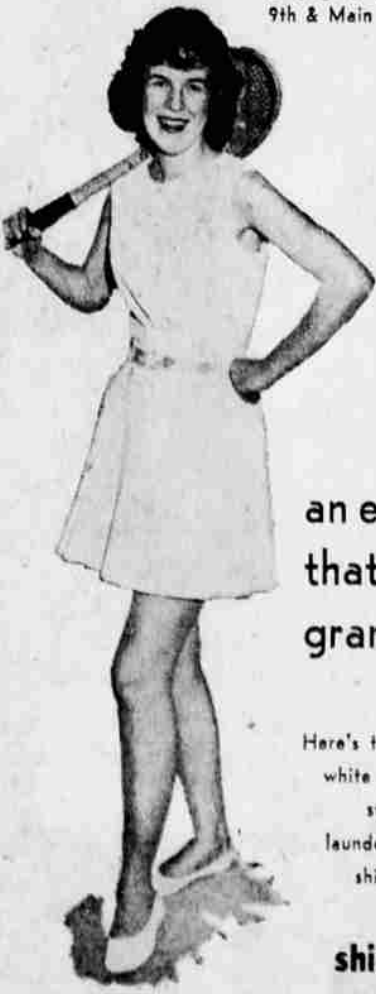
