Worthy Matron Gladys asked the conductress and associate conductress to escort the associate matron and associate patron to the east, where Nina Hall was pre-

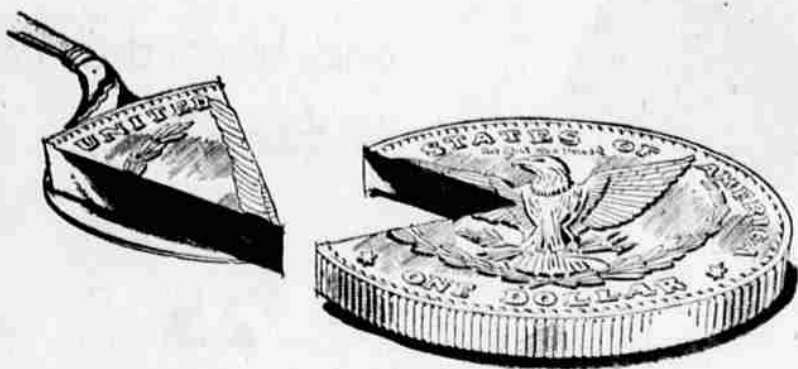

A small piece of preserved ginger chopped and mixed with cream cheese makes an interesting tea sandwich filling; use nut bread for these.



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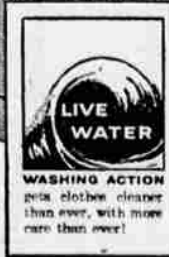
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
