"Only 24 tourists a day through an area leave more money in one year than a business with a \$100,000 payroll."

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Grand Jury To Mull Case

A Tulelake man accused of using a pickup truck without the owner's permission was held to the Klamath County Grand Jury Friday.

William T. Reeves, 33, Route 2, Tulelake, waived a preliminary hearing in district court on the charge brought by Ed Johnson of Tulelake.

State police said Reeves was involved in an accident on Route 66 near Mac's Store May 15 while driving the pickup. Johnson later signed a complaint charging Reeves with taking the truck without permission.

Reeves was returned to the Klamath County Jail in lieu of \$1,500 bail.

In other district court action, Raymond Monroe Faithful, 24, 441 Trinity Street, was released on probation for the remainder of an eight-month term for petty larceny.

Faithful had been sentenced January 9 for stealing tools from a truck owned by Gail Ridenour of Chiloquin. That incident occurred on Christmas Day, a few weeks after Faithful finished a four-year probationary term for assault with a dangerous weapon.

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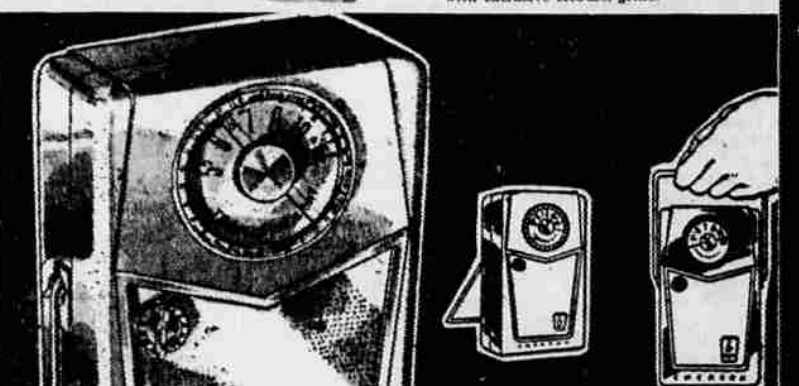
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
