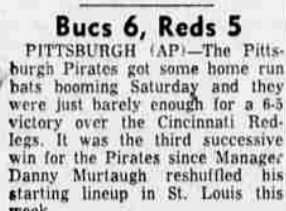
Jones, using both his fast ball and curve with fine effect, struck out 9 Dodgers and walked only 3, in going all the way for his fourth victory against five losses.
