

Nation To Pay Homage To John Foster Dulles

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A funeral of high state ceremony and a hero's burial await John Foster Dulles Wednesday in the nation's final tribute to the man who guided U.S. foreign policy through six years of cold war.

A bereaved President Eisenhower personally directed that a first-of-its-kind "official" funeral be held for the former secretary of state.

An official funeral is just short of the state funeral reserved for presidents and vice presidents, and presidents-elect and vice presidents-elect.

Dulles succumbed quietly in his sleep at 7:49 a.m. e.d.t. Sunday after a three-month battle against cancer. His death at Walter Reed Army Medical Center brought expressions of sympathy pouring into Washington from the Free World's leaders.

The President, openly showing his grief, declared a period of national mourning. He ordered all flags flown at half staff until the 71-year-old statesman is buried.

The chief executive, who had a close personal as well as official relationship with Dulles, also can-

celled most of his engagements through Wednesday.

At Geneva, the Big Four foreign ministers agreed to recess

were devoted to helping lay the groundwork for their meeting. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter will fly home Tuesday for the funeral services. British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville also will attend and West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano probably will.

There was even a possibility, an American spokesman said, that Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, an implacable diplomatic foe of Dulles, would be present.

The funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. e.d.t. Wednesday in Washington's huge National Cathedral with burial in Arlington National Cemetery, the hallowed resting place of the nation's heroes.

The body will lie in state at the cathedral's Bethlehem Chapel from noon Tuesday until noon Wednesday. An honor military guard will be posted.

Dr. Roswell P. Barnes of New York, a secretary of the World Council of Churches, will lead those officiating at the services, along with Dr. Paul Wolfe of the

Brick Presbyterian Church of New York, and Dr. Edward L. R. Elson of the National Presbyterian Church of Washington.

DUDLEY, England (AP)—Edward France climbed into a cage with three zoo lions Sunday and kicked one of the beasts on the nose.

France, a 17-year-old butcher's apprentice, said he acted on a sudden impulse. Fortunately the lions had just been fed. Keepers said otherwise he probably would have been killed.

Police Kill Contractor In Gun Duel

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—A crazy drunk brick contractor killed one man and held four persons hostage all night. Then he fought off a company of officers today for two hours before police raked him with submachine-gun bullets and killed him.

He was gray-haired Frank Windsor, 68, who held a bitter hatred against Dallas County Sheriff Bill Decker.

The man slain by Windsor was M. G. Hassels, a painter.

All four hostages escaped the little wooden house on a gravel road in southwest Dallas. Three fled after police softened up Windsor with tear gas. Courageous police pulled another from the building.

Mrs. C. E. Campbell, a neighbor, said Windsor had been "crazy drunk" since Friday.

He lived in an apartment in the little house in which the owner, Mrs. Ione Dickinson, also lived.

Mrs. Dickinson said Windsor had some drunken belief that by holding the hostages he could force the sheriff to come out to the house.

The landlady said he held a grudge against the sheriff because of past evictions.

Held with Mrs. Dickinson were Mr. and Mrs. Les Doughter and a man named Webb.

The Doughters were neighbors. Hassels came to the house about 8 a.m. today to ask for a key to another house owned by Mrs. Dickinson. He was to do some work at one of her houses.

Windsor shot him. The man sprawled on the lawn, and Windsor forced the Doughters to drag the body to the front porch.

The gunman held his hostages in terror with a .38 revolver and a 22 rifle.

Police riddled the little house with rifle and submachinegun fire after the hostages escaped.

Recall Vote Slated Today
LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—The controversy over school integration in Little Rock reaches another critical point today with a school board recall election.

At stake were all six seats on the board — now evenly divided between segregationists and moderates.

The election—expected to draw a record vote of 30,000 — was looked on as a test of strength between adherents of Gov. Orval E. Faubus and citizens protesting the firing of 44 teachers and administrators by the three segregationist board members.

Also in the background of the clash are conflicting opinions over the governors closing of the city's four high schools to prevent integration.

A majority vote will determine whether each member will be continued in office or ousted.

If any board member is voted out, a replacement will be named by the Pulaski County Board of Education.

The 44 teachers and administrators were fired May 5. The firing list was presented by the segregationist board members.

The three moderates then walked out of the meeting, saying that left no quorum.

U.S. Defense Hit By Navy As Obsolete

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The growing battle over continental air defense systems was heightened today by Navy criticism of both the Army and Air Force anti-aircraft missiles.

A House appropriations subcommittee made public testimony by a top Navy witness, who told Congress that 25 billion dollars has been poured into a "Fortress America" air defense network that soon will be as obsolete as the French Maginot Line.

Rear Adm. J. T. Hayward, assistant chief of naval operations, testified that in his opinion no more money should be spent on the Air Force's Bomarc anti-aircraft missile. He said the same reasoning applied for the Army's Nike-Hercules program.

Hayward said the present air defense system didn't provide enough warning time to deter an enemy attack. Modern missile technology soon will outdate such a fixed warning and defense system, he said.

The admiral's views received support Sunday from Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.), a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee. The committee voted to cut \$17,300,000 from the Army's \$22,400,000 Nike-Hercules construction plans.

Stray Canine Probe Slated
ST. LOUIS (AP) — Several St. Louis County agencies plan investigations into the stray dog problem today as a result of a fatal attack on a little boy by a dog pack Saturday.

Mark Douglas Draper, 2½, son of insurance man Douglas G. Draper, was killed near his suburban Hazelwood home.

Shortly after the incident dozens of armed men searched the area for stray dogs. Police asked them to disperse, fearing an accident or the slaying of a harmless pet.

The boy's body was found by a neighbor, Mel Jones, in a field between the two homes.

The pack of 8 to 10 dogs charged Jones but he beat them off with an iron pipe.

The St. Louis County Animal Protective Assn., which received the bodies of 11 dead dogs and two captured ones, said all but one were "a mangy foul lot—obviously strays and nearly wild."

Jones, who pulled the boy's chewed body away from the snarling pack, identified five of the dead dogs as the boy's assailants.

The father of the victim said he had reported packs of dogs in the neighborhood. He said he had thought about shooting at them but didn't want to cause any trouble.

Dulles Death Halts Talks On Germany

GENEVA (AP)—The East-West talks on Germany will be suspended Wednesday and Thursday while the Western foreign ministers fly to Washington for the funeral of John Foster Dulles.

U.S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter will take with him British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville. They leave Geneva Tuesday night after a brief session of the Big Four conference. They will return Friday in time for a Big Four meeting that afternoon.

Western diplomats speculated that Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko also might go to the funeral, but there was no word from Soviet headquarters to confirm or deny this.

U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Andrew H. Berding said he thought it possible Gromyko might fly to Washington.

Gromyko agreed in a telephone conversation with Herter to the two-day suspension of the conference. He said he fully understood Herter's wish to attend the funeral and expressed condolences on the death of the former secretary of state.

The recess comes during a critical week for the conference.

The Western ministers, apparently with some agreement or encouragement from Gromyko, are planning to engineer a gradual shift from the formal debate over the mutually rejected Soviet and Western plans for Germany to active negotiations on more plausible issues.

Herter, Couve de Murville and Lloyd's deputy, Sir Anthony Rumbold, arranged a morning meeting today to consider concrete ways of carrying on secret talks with Gromyko on arrangements for a summit meeting and other related problems.

Leaders Of World Express Sympathy

LONDON (AP)—Millions of ordinary people around the world, remembering John Foster Dulles for his leadership in the fight against communism, today mourned his death.

Western statesmen recalled his emphasis on "face to face diplomacy" and grieved for the loss of a personal friend.

The Kremlin's leaders were silent, but Communist organs revived old criticisms of the former American secretary of state.

Sir Winston Churchill called on the world to keep in mind the example Dulles set for those "who put their trust in freedom and fair dealing."

French President Charles de Gaulle messaged President Eisenhower he deeply felt the great loss Dulles' death causes "for yourself, for your country and all men attached to freedom."

Chancellor Konrad Adenauer told West Germans they had lost a friend who made their cause his own.

Britain's Prime Minister Harold Macmillan remembered Dulles for his "signal force of character," which supported the highest ideals.

The official Soviet news agency reported the death in a 32-word dispatch without comment. Moscow radio reported it as the 14th item in a 17-item roundup of domestic news.

But the East German news agency, ADN, said Dulles' name was "linked inseparably with the creation of a new war danger in Europe through the armament of Bonn." Broadcasts from other Communist states maintained that tone.

Former British Prime Minister Anthony Eden said he and his wife were deeply grieved. Italian Premier Antonio Segni said he hoped the Dulles spirit would bear fruit in the Geneva conference. West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt called Dulles a faithful friend who could always be counted on.

Austrians, remembering Dulles' part in bringing them a treaty of independence in 1955, expressed sadness. Chancellor Julius Raab said Dulles' death was a "great loss for the entire free world."

French Premier Michel Debre's message to President Eisenhower said Dulles left behind "an imperishable message of energy, of confidence in man and of faith in the future of liberty."

President Sean O'Kelly of Ireland declared Dulles' loss will be felt wherever liberty is cherished.

In Canada, Prime Minister John Diefenbaker said the death removed from the councils of the world one whose influence for peace was world-wide.

Japanese Premier Nobusuke Kishi and Foreign Minister Aichihiro Fujiyama called Dulles a true friend of Japan. Fujiyama will fly to Washington for the funeral.

Indian Prime Minister Nehru named Dulles a "great servant of state."

On Taipei, one of President Chiang Kai-shek's closest advisers said the only comfort was the knowledge that Secretary of State Christian A. Herter would continue Dulles' policies.

Rites Marred; Dad Kills Son
FALLS CITY, Tex. (AP) — A weekend wedding party in this south Texas farming community turned from gaiety to tragedy as the bridegroom's father died and his grandfather was charged with murder.

Sheriff Harper Morris said it happened this way:

After Harry Pawlick was married Saturday, his father, Henry Pawlick, 48, gave a wedding party in the Community Hall.

The elder Pawlick decided his father, Leon Pawlick, 76, should attend the party. When he went to Leon Pawlick's farm home, he was struck in the stomach by a shotgun blast.

Morris said the pair had been feuding since an argument years ago over farming practices.

Michigan Soil Good For Growth

\$300,000 Fire Destroys Klamath Drug Firm

An army of men and equipment from four fire departments in Klamath Falls, Oregon Technical Institute, and the South Suburban area battled a fierce fire that all but destroyed the Pay Less Drug Store at 808 Main Street and the Derby Cafe next door Sunday morning.

But Noel Flynn, manager of the large chain-owned drug store, said he will get a store opened and operating at temporary headquarters soon—possibly as early as today.

Fire, smoke and water damaged nearly all the merchandise the store displayed on the main sales floor contributing to much of the \$250,000 or \$300,000 damage that Flynn believes was caused. Both the drug store and the cafe were insured.

But a fire resistant storeroom built recently in the rear of the store housed merchandise that escaped all except partial damage by intense heat radiated by the fire in the main floor.

Firemen of the Klamath Falls Fire Department were called to the scene at 3:29 a.m. A merchant policeman discovered the fire which started in the Derby Cafe operated by Mr. and Mrs. Mike May of Klamath Falls.

When they arrived, firemen found flames confined to the building's interior. The fire had broken through an open attic that spread

over the cafe and the store. It broke through the roof shortly, creating an air supply and adding to the firemen's troubles.

Men crawled onto the roof and chopped holes through a tarpaper roof. They quelled flames in the attic and checked the blaze in the cafe and on the sales floor of the drug store. Fire had burned through the ceiling and had started numerous fires below.

By 6 a.m. city, suburban, Air Force and Oregon Technical Institute firemen believed they had the fire at the mop-up stage. Then they noticed smoke pouring from the floor of the Pay Less store.

Fire had burned through a floor in the rear of the cafe, where the blaze apparently started, and spread through three tiers of flooring in the drug store.

These three flooring layers, indicating three separate times the building was remodeled, made the firemen's job immensely complicated. They first tried chopping holes in the floor, to find subsequent floors up to 18 inches apart, with fire lodged in the deepest portions.

A Klamath Falls logger, Jim Colahan, fetched his chain saw and attempted to saw holes in the floor with his 30-inch chain blade. The layers were too deep.

Firemen solved the problem by flooding each floor layer completely with water. They were able to
