Small Advance On Mart Led By Railroad Shares

By ELMER C. WALZER UPI Financial Editor NEW YORK (UPI) — Railroad shares led a small advance on the stock market during the week. The carrier group came to the rescue of the general market after it had gone through several periods of unsettledness. On Monday the tobacco were driven down in recurrence of cancer stories. On Tuesday the sugars got a heating when Cuba passed an agrarian bill that would confiscate American holdings. On Wednesday the electronics hit an air pocket when a leading brokerage house took Raytheon off its selected stock list. On Thursday the rails got into action. They carried their rise further on Friday and closed the week at 159.67 up 3.27 points for their average which was at its best level since Aug. 9, 1956. Industrials finished the week at 634.74 in their average, up a tiny 0.21 point. Utilities lost 0.84 to finish at 91.26 and the 65 stocks used in the three averages rose 0.74 to end the week at 216.43. Volume fell off which was considered a good sign. Sales totaled 15,999,910 shares for the week, a daily average of 3,193,982 shares. In the previous week sales totaled 18,115,455 shares or a daily average of 3,623,091 shares. Agricultural Service Reports Big Increase In Red Wheat Exports

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) Saturday reported a "substantial increase" in Soviet wheat exports into free world markets. It estimated the wheat imports in 1958-59 to these markets would reach 35 to 40 million bushels or more. This compared with the previous post-World War II record of 26,500,000 bushels, set in 1951-52, and 1957-58 movement of about 16,000,000 bushels from Russia to the West. The agency said these Soviet wheat exports were in progress despite continued large shipments to Communist-controlled East Europe. The agency said the Soviet Union appears to be making a considerable effort to establish permanent cash markets in free world importing countries. The success of this effort will depend mostly upon Soviet production and export policy, and East Europe's import needs. FAS said there appears to be little reason to expect east Europe's import needs to rise above current levels. Therefore, unless Russia uses the wheat domestically or stockpiles it, it is likely to sell its surplus to free world markets. The agency noted that while the Russians have not publicized their wheat export intentions, trade developments in recent months have indicated clearly that a substantial rise in exports is taking place. It cited wheat shipments to France, Japan, Algeria, The Netherlands, Portugal, Switzerland, Afghanistan, Iraq, and Egypt.

Council Fears Tyke Deaths

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Harmless-looking transparent bags have become death traps because of a penchant youngsters have of pulling the bags over their heads and courting death by suffocation. More than two dozen tots have met their death in this manner already this year. The National Safety Council fears the death toll may rise to 100 before the year is out. The bags are the type used largely by dry cleaning establishments for returning cleaned apparel. The material also is used for covering pillows and crib mattresses. Legislation has been pressed to have the bags perforated or clearly marked "dangerous." The Kordite Corp. of Macedon, N.Y., claiming to be the nation's leading manufacturer of plastic garment bags, announced Friday it is supplying labels to cleaning establishments to be slipped over the hangers of clothes being returned in the bags. The labels read: "Caution. For safety reasons keep plastic bags away from children as you would matches or medicine." But some officials hold that responsibility rests with the parents—to keep the bags out of children's reach. A number of the victims have been infants less than a year old.

Hoffa Offers Strike Aid

BOSTON (AP)—James R. Hoffa, president of the Teamsters Union, says that if the steel workers go on strike the members of his union will offer their support. Speaking Sunday before 2,500 Boston Teamsters at a communion breakfast, Hoffa said he told officials of the steel workers union: "We will support you because after the employers destroy you they will destroy us. It is a common fight." In his speech, Hoffa criticized the press, radio, TV, the AFL-CIO and the Kennedy-Ervin labor bill. His union has been suspended from the AFL-CIO. "For the last two years you have witnessed the greatest exposure of this country," Hoffa said. "The radio, television, the press are trying to tell you that the Teamsters are a menace to the country." He said that perhaps the reason he receives what he described as a poor press is that in some communities his truck drivers make more than newspapermen. Referring to the Kennedy-Ervin bill, Hoffa said: "After 24 months of hypocrisy the senators and Congress sit up and say 'We want to protect the working man against Hoffa.'" "I say it is their desire to destroy organized labor." Hoffa pictured Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) as a man "who couldn't find his way out of a four-room apartment with 12 doors when it comes to labor. What does he know about labor?"

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Actress Marie (The Body) McDonald and TV executive Lou Bass surprised their friends by getting married in this desert resort over the weekend. They had been dating about eight months, but both said the decision to get married Saturday was made on the spur of the moment. The ceremony was performed in the chapel of the Flamingo Hotel. Miss McDonald has been appearing in a show at the hotel. It was the third marriage for the shapely 35-year-old actress and the first for Bass, 38. Her former husbands are actors' agent Vic Orsatti and millionaire shoe manufacturer Harry Karl. She married and divorced Karl twice.

A buyer's limiting payment for lambs to a designated average weight, and not paying the lamb producer for any additional weight. 2. A buyer's subtracting weight from the true and actual weight of the lamb. The department said these practices result in the issuance of incorrect scale tickets, invoices, and other documents relating to purchases and sales and in misleading market information. The department said it believes such practices are prohibited by the act. The department's livestock division also has received numerous complaints from lamb producers about methods used in price discounting for excess weight.

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Of the nine crops, changes upward are indicated for four: Green lima beans, 1 per cent more than last year; snap beans, 5 per cent; sweet corn, 12 per cent; and winter and spring spinach, 22 per cent. The department said the changes indicated for all crops except green peas and spinach are based on reports from processors on intentions to plant. These acreage intentions may be subject to some changes before planting is completed. The acreages for green peas and spinach are estimates of planted acreage. The department estimated the total acreage for the nine processing vegetable crops at 1,522,310 acres.
