

Tigers Sixth: Giants Shutout

Detroit Rattles Ladder

It looks like the Detroit Tigers have had their fill of the American League cellar, leaving it as a booty prize in a two-game Boston-New York series opening tonight at Yankee Stadium.

The Tigers, who closed a 38-day stay in eighth place by plunking the Yankees into the cellar last week, slipped back to the bottom by losing the first game of a Sunday doubleheader at Cleveland. But they gave it back to New York's world champions by winning the nightcap.

Monday night they jumped to sixth place for the first time since the second day of the season with a three-run seventh-inning rally that beat Kansas City 4-3.

It was the only game scheduled in the AL, but shook up the middle of the standings. While slipping Boston to seventh, the Detroit victory also dipped Kansas City to fifth as idle Washington moved up to fourth.

Tigers 4, Athletics 3

Gail Harris' two-run homer capped the Detroit rally that cracked a 1-1 tie and Ray Narleski then came on in the ninth to save rookie Jerry Davis' first major league victory.

Dick Williams, who had three of the As' eight hits, singled and scored on Harry Chitt's pinch triple that chased Davis (1-1), a 26-year-old right-hander. Narleski put the lead run on base by walking Hal Smith, then struck out Bill Tuttle and ended it by getting Whitey Herzog on a pop up.

Hector Lopez gave the As the lead with a solo home run in the fourth, but contributed an error as the Tigers broke through the shut out pitching of Rip Coleman (0-3) in the fifth. Detroit, out-hit 8-6, tied it on Red Wilson's single. Lopez' error and an infield out, then won it in the seventh on a walk, an infield out, Rocky Bridges' single and Harris' fourth homer.

THORP, Wash. (AP) — Bobby Gregerich is a 450 hitter for the baseball team and a good basketball player at little Thorp High School, but his best compliment of the season came from the teacher of his woodworking class.

Jean Borotra Still Playing

PARIS (AP) — France's old-time tennis hero, Jean Borotra, still is bouncing around the clay courts of Roland Garros Stadium where he dominated French international tournaments in the 1920s.

The 60-year-old veteran, who admits "I only play well about half the time," teamed with youthful Marie-Odile Bouchet to reach the third round of the mixed doubles of the French Tennis Championships.

His precise placements combined with his partner's vigor for a winning combination.

"Doubles are the only big-time competition for the 'Bouncing Basque,' who still favors long flames and now has to pause between games to wipe off his glasses.

Borotra says he will keep playing until a doctor tells him to quit. His record stretches back to 1924 when he first won the French and Wimbledon titles. In the years since, he has played 30 Davis Cup matches for France. He helped France win the cup six years in a row from 1927 to 1932.

As recently as two years ago he won the singles title in his tennis club's tournament.

Dodger Registers 2 Hitter

Is this the year Johnny Podres finally gets the breaks and becomes a big winner?

The stocky southpaw is remembered as the youngster who pitched the Brooklyn Dodgers to their only world championship and as a one-time National League leader in shutouts and earned-run average. Yet he's been a tough luck guy more often than not.

He shut out the New York Yankees 2-0 with an eight-hitter in the seventh game of the 1955 World Series, and he led the NL with six shutouts and a 2.66 ERA in 1957 (after a hitch in the Navy). Last year, however, was his first without serious injury and he hit his major league high with 13 victories. But he also had his low in defeats with 15—five by one run, two by a pair of runs—as the Dodgers finished seventh in Los Angeles.

Now he's back trying to beat the tough-luck jinx again, and at the moment he's the ace of the Dodger staff with a 5-2 record after pitching the best game of his career Monday for a two-hit, 8-0 victory over the San Francisco Giants. It was his third straight success.

Podres had a no-hitter for 7 1/3 innings, then gave up consecutive singles by Daryl Spencer and Bob Schmidt. The Dodgers' third double play saved his shutout.

That pushed Los Angeles within .002 percentage points of idle third place Pittsburgh. Both are 3 1/2 games behind first place Milwaukee, beaten 7-3 at Philadelphia. The Chicago Cubs belted St. Louis 9-4 in the only other game scheduled.

Bums 8, Giants 0

Podres, 26, got all the help he needed for his 14th shutout on a pair of two-run homers by Gil Hodges against losing lefty Mike McCormick. Dick Gray also homered as the Dodgers collected nine hits against the second place Giants.

Podres, regaining confidence in the change-up that made him the World Series hero in '55, faced only 29 batters, struck out seven and walked three. It was the third career shutout over the Giants by Podres, who has pitched seven three-hitters.

Gamblers Disappear From Bowling Scene

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gamblers who once infested the nation's bowling alleys practically have disappeared from the lanes, national match game bowling champion Billy Welu said today, because the top-level bowlers are concentrating on earning an average of more than \$30,000 a year.

"In the old days, the top bowlers spent their time looking for pigeons they could clip in privately-arranged matches," Welu explained. "In these times, with bowling having grown so large, there is simply too much money available in tournament winnings."

The answer now—for the pros as well as for you average bowlers—is concentration.

"I can't pay attention to my game properly if I'm worrying about someone on another alley and how he is doing against me in a private side bet," said the six-foot-four-inch Texan. "I have to concentrate solely on my own game, rest between shots and contemplate my next shot, I can't allow anything else to distract me from my battle with the alley."

The average bowler, meaning you or me, can take a lesson from this, he insists.

"Most average bowlers like to have a number of side bets," he said. "Well, if you only bowl once in a while, this is part of the enjoyment of the game. But if you are really serious about improving your scores, knock off the side bets. You can't do yourself justice if you are racing from one alley to another between shots to see how the other guys are doing. You have to relax and concentrate only on your own game."

This is Welu's secret formula as he prepares to square off against such aces as bowler of the year Don Carter, World Invitational champ Eddie Lubanski, Masters champion Ray Bluth, National Doubles champion Tom Hennessey and Eastern king Lou (Wrong Foot) Campi in the Champions' tournament at Madison Square Garden on Wednesday night.

This is a round-robin tournament in which each contestant rolls a two-game series against each of his five opponents. The winner will drag down \$1,000 and 40 per cent of the net gate. That ain't hay, but it is typical of what has happened since bowling came out of the basement establishments of a generation ago.

In addition to his "cut out the betting" tip, Billy says that most occasional bowlers make two other major mistakes.

"The first is that they approach the foul line too fast," he argues. "The second is that they throw the ball instead of rolling it. This isn't a difficult game. Simply approach the foul line in an accentuated walking pace and then let the ball roll off the fingers naturally. That's about all there is to it."

Considering that the 220-pound Welu has the slowest, most deliberate and easiest approach and delivery in the game, and considering the way he makes it pay off, the man undoubtedly has something.

Department Recommends 16 Cal Hunts

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The Fish and Game Department has recommended 16 either-sex deer hunts in scattered parts of California for 1959, about the same as the past two years.

The department's new director, William E. Warne, is taking the view that more widespread either-sex hunts are necessary from a deer management standpoint.

In a letter transmitting his recommendations to the Commission President Thomas H. Richards Jr., Warne said flatly: "...The facts logically point to the desirability of taking both sexes of deer over a large part of the state for the welfare of the deer themselves..."

Despite his belief, he recommended "only a limited number" of antlerless hunts, tagged to specific quotas of permits and deer "in order to control hunting pressure and harvest."

"This will avoid excessive harvest in any area as well as any unseemly slaughter," he said.

The commission meets here Thursday and Friday to decide. The recommended either-sex hunt areas:

Region 1—Tehama, Modoc, Lassen; region 2—Bachachi Ranch; Region 3—East Bay archery, Adelaida; region 4—Fresno County, Mineral King, Monache; region 5—Los Angeles County (gun and archery); San Diego, Camp Pendleton, East Walker, Southern Mono, Buttermilk.

NY, Williams Still Not Out

BOSTON (UPI) — Ever think you'd see (1) the New York Yankees in the cellar and (2) Ted Williams batting less than his weight at this stage of the season?

Williams, 40-year-old Boston Red Sox slugger, says don't count either out.

"The Yankees have had a few tough breaks and lost some close games," the six-time American League batting champion said today.

"But they've got some great players and they're still going to be a threat in that pennant race."

"I certainly think that before the year is over New York is going to give somebody a scare."

Asked if the Yanks were all right, Williams replied with authority. "No, sir," and, laughingly added, "and I certainly hope old Ted isn't done yet either."

Williams missed the first month of the campaign with a pinched nerve in his neck. He returned to action during Boston's recent home stand but had his troubles catching up to the pitchers. His batting average is a puny .163, compared with a 340 lifetime mark, and the thumper is still looking for his first home run.

"I'm feeling better," he said, "but I don't think I'm as sharp as I can get. The Red Sox have been hurt partly because I haven't been doing very well, but I'm sure I'm going to do better and in turn the whole club will be better."

Pressure Win Ends Old Jinx

MEMPHIS (AP) — Don Whitt, 23-year-old flash from Johannesburg, wound up second. Al Balding of Markham, Ont., Canada was third.

Whitt, in trouble all the way and in danger of losing his lead, fired a clutch birdie on the 18th hole to wind up tied with Player and Balding with a 72-hole total of 272.

In the playoff, Balding was jostled out on the first hole. His second shot left him a 20-foot putt that he missed to go par 4. Whitt and Player were down in birdie.

On the second hole, Player's approach went into a sand trap. He blasted out but missed a 10-foot putt and went bogie 5. Whitt was in on 2, down in 2.

"I knew I had to make that birdie on 18," said Whitt. "when my approach popped up there about three feet from the pin, I got that lucky feeling. Boy, it's nice to win one."

Whitt came close to not winning one with a 34-37-71 over the 6,501-yard, 34-hole Colonial Country Club course. Player and Balding shot 3-under 67s to overtake him.

Lionel Hebert of Lafayette, La., boosted by a spectacular hole-in-one on the par 3 15th, finished with 272, tied with Art Wall Jr. of Paco Manor, Pa. They drew \$1,400 each.

The pace was too much for big Tom Veach, of Milwaukee, the 265-pound rookie pro who led the first two rounds with sub-par scores.

Veach spent much of his time in the rough and blew to a 38-40-78 that built his 72-hole total to 296 and cut his prize money to \$510.

Fiery Temple Lodges Beef

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—Outspoken Cincinnati second baseman Johnny Temple, irked at a \$75 fine levied against him last week, complained Monday about the umpiring to Warren Giles, president of the National League.

"I'm being fined for doing nothing," Temple wrote in a 330-word letter to Giles, in which he claimed umpire Frank Dascoli refused to let him discuss a ruling during the first game of a two-night doubleheader at Los Angeles last Wednesday.

Temple was fined Friday for arguing with Dascoli at homeplate after Frank Robinson had been called out on strikes. Temple claimed that Robinson held up his swing and that Dascoli should have checked with the first base umpire before calling it a swinging third strike.

"He waved me away as if to say, 'Get away boy—you bother me,'" Temple wrote.

The fiery second sacker also charged he had been fined more for opinions he wrote in his newspaper column than for his exchange with Dascoli.
