Eisenhower Lauds Dulles As Champion Of Freedom

WASHINGTON (AP) — "Brave in living, brave in dying, Champion of freedom, foe of tyranny. Truly great." Those are President Eisenhower's words of tribute to John Foster Dulles.

And further, best expressing the President's personal sorrow, he spoke of his heartfelt loss of "a dear and close friend."

Eisenhower's eulogy came Sunday as cancer took the life of his former secretary of state.

Today the President and his wife shunted aside engagements they had planned before Dulles' death.

The President postponed indefinitely a trip arranged for this morning to the Agriculture Department's research center at Beltsville, Md. Mrs. Eisenhower put off a White House garden party which about 700 residents of Washington homes for the aged were to have attended this afternoon.

Wednesday the President and the first lady will attend funeral services at Washington's Episcopal Cathedral and final rites at Arlington National Cemetery.

Eisenhower spent 20 minutes with Mrs. Dulles at her home late Sunday afternoon after he had returned to the capital from his Gettysburg, Pa., farm.

Less than six weeks ago he had announced with tears in his eyes, that cancer had forced Dulles' resignation from the Cabinet. Only last Tuesday he had conferred on Dulles the Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest award to civilians.

It was at his farm about 6:30 a.m. Sunday that the President received word that Dulles was dying at Walter Reed Army Hospital. Eisenhower's own physician, grade are invited to attend.

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Man On Relief Dead At 92

NEW YORK (AP)—A 92-year-old Staten Island man, accused of cheating the New York City Welfare Department of \$14,000 in relief checks while amassing \$30,000 in blue chip securities, died Monday night in a hospital.

A hospital spokesman said James Flaherty apparently died of malnutrition.

Dist. Atty. John M. Braisted Jr. said Flaherty's death ruled out any action by his office. The case was referred to Braisted eight days ago when Flaherty was taken from his furnished room to the hospital and his assets were uncovered.

At that time, the Welfare Department attached the securities on a court order. The stocks are being held in the sheriff's office.

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—The ballot boxes in the Connecticut House of Representatives were stuffed Monday when the members voted on a judicial appointment.

Clerks discovered that 182 "yes" ballots and 103 "no" ballots had been cast by House members in confirming the appointment of Margaret Connors Driscoll as a new judge of the state's juvenile court.

The ballots totaled 285 and there are only 279 members in the House of Representatives.
