In Washington this morning a delegation of what the correspondents describe as "some farmers and some congressmen" made a four-pronged proposal to aid the poultry business. They urged that the Department of Agriculture take these steps:

1. Buy up egg-laying hens to reduce the supply of eggs.
2. Purchase shell eggs for (free) distribution to the needy.
3. Buy broilers for (free) distribution to the school lunch program.
4. Provide export subsidies to promote sale abroad of American hens.

Hmmmmmmmm.

Let's do some supposing.

Suppose these proposals had been adopted (fortunately they weren't); the agriculture department turned them down. But . . . if they had been adopted . . . here's about what would happen:

1. Poultrymen would start raising all the hens they could to sell on a SUBSIDIZED market. That would UP the poultry supply.

2. Poultrymen would start producing all the eggs they could to sell to the government for SUBSIDIZED distribution to the needy.

3. Poultrymen would start raising all the broilers they could for sale to the government for SUBSIDIZED distribution to the school lunches.

4. Poultrymen would start raising all the hens they could for sale abroad under a SUBSIDIZED export distribution program.

The eventual result?

The eventual result would be ruin of the poultry business and/or impoverishment of the taxpayers—depending on which happened first.

All this sounds like a slam at America's poultrymen. It isn't so intended. Poultrymen are just as good business people and just as good citizens as anybody else.

But—

If such a program were initiated, the poultrymen would HAVE TO GO ALONG WITH IT—just as the wheat growers have had to go along with a similar program of subsidized overproduction which has stuffed the warehouses with a surplus of wheat that hangs over the markets of the future like a dark thundercloud.

Let's put it this way:

If a similar proposal were made as to newspapers and the newspapers were silly enough to accept it, it wouldn't be long until America was stacked three feet deep with surplus (subsidized) copies of newspapers.

We'd just let our presses run . . . and run . . . and RUN. We wouldn't want to. But we'd HAVE to. Under the circumstances, we couldn't afford not to.

In the long run, it would ruin our business. And . . . we love our business. Otherwise, we wouldn't be in it. We'd hate to see it ruined.

But—

Subsidized surpluses would eventually ruin us.

When will all this silliness end?

Not—

I think—

Until the voters begin to vote against the subsidy spenders.

Fury Of Tornadoes Pummels Five States

Another outbreak of stormy weather lashed the central part of the country Tuesday night and more showers and possible storms appeared in prospect today.

Tornadoes struck areas in five states, mauling at least nine persons and destroying or damaging several homes. The twisters which skipped across areas in southern Oklahoma and northwestern Wisconsin were the worst. Smaller tornadoes struck sections of Indiana, central Kansas and in suburban areas northwest of Chicago. No injuries were reported.

The tornadic storms were part of a wet belt extending from Oklahoma northeast through the middle Mississippi Valley into the Great Lakes.

Eight members of two families were injured and their homes destroyed by a tornado that hammered the small towns of Graham and Clematoc, in southern Oklahoma.

Three twisters raked northwestern Wisconsin. One pounded the Fairchild area, injuring one person. Another struck 60 miles south at Trempealeau, while a third flattened a grain and storage shed near Eau Claire.

Heavy rains fell throughout the storm belt.

Thunderstorms also erupted in the Gulf Coast states northward into Tennessee, with heaviest falls in northern Alabama.

Cool air from Canada extended southward through the Dakotas into northwest Minnesota, and Nebraska and was expected to reach into the great lakes region during the day.

Showers were indicated across wide areas from the Great Lakes and Ohio Valley into western sections of the Atlantic Coast states. In the South, showers were forecast from eastern Texas across the Gulf Coast states and into the southern Atlantic Coast states.

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Car Accident Proves Fatal To Logger

A Yreka logger, Earl Leo Brower, 58, died early this morning in Klamath Valley Hospital from injuries he received when his car overturned and plunged over an embankment Monday night on Highway 97 north of Spring Creek Hill.

Brower was a tractor driver for a logging company operating near Yreka. A passenger in the northbound vehicle, Skeeter Q. Warren of Klamath Falls, was not injured. He told Oregon State Police officers Brower was driving Warren was jailed and charged with drunkenness.

An unidentified motorist spotted the accident and called police and Peace Ambulance at 8:30 p.m. Brower was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital and, under sedation, was unable to give officers his account of the accident. He died of unspecified injuries, at 3:18 a.m. today.

Officers said the car skidded along the highway's shoulder for 200 feet before diving across the road and overturning.

Brower was born March 8, 1901, in Lewiston, Idaho. He leaves a daughter, Betty Jean Hecker and a son, Leo Ray Brower, both of Yreka.

The body was taken to Ward's to be transferred today to Girdner's Funeral Chapel in Yreka where services will be conducted sometime tomorrow. Interment will follow in Evergreen Cemetery in Yreka.

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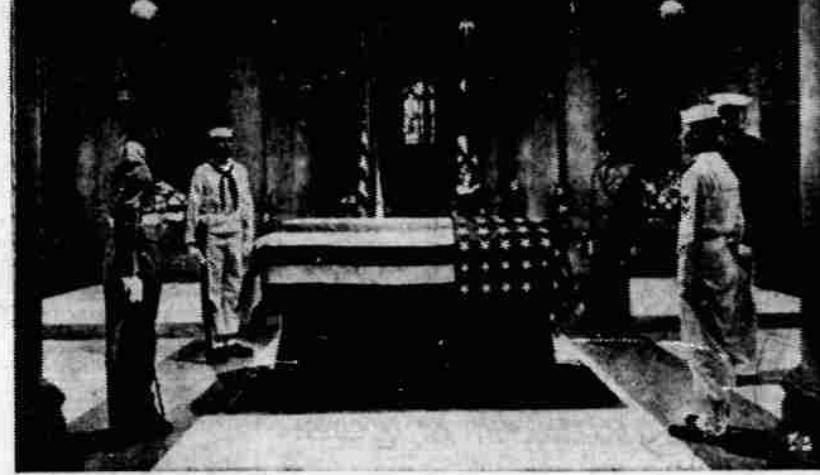

Allies Drop Golden Gate As Site For Summit Talks

GENEVA (UPI) — The Western Allies have abandoned San Francisco as the site for a summit conference in favor of Vienna, it was reported today.

The Western powers have just about made up their minds to holding a heads-of-state parley in Vienna, probably in the first 10 days of September, reliable conference sources said. Russia is expected to go along with the choice. A final decision will not be made until the end of the present Geneva foreign ministers' conference.

The San Francisco-for-the-summit boom reached its peak about three weeks ago. Nikita Khrushchev was known to want to visit the United States. New York was ruled out on grounds of security difficulties. The Soviets had indicated they did not object to San Francisco.

But the French and Western Germans raised strong objections centering mainly on the difficulty of summit press coverage in San Francisco.

General Charles de Gaulle announced flatly that if a top level meeting were held on the American West Coast, it would be attended by Premier Michel Debre rather than himself. That apparently killed the idea.

Geneva, with its ample hotel and communications facilities, also has been considered seriously as a site. But many diplomats felt it would not provide an atmosphere conducive to successful negotiations. They cited the Swiss city's long record of diplomatic failures, including the 1955 summit conference.

The supervisors had denied Brewer's request for a \$125,000 building, but permitted the smaller amount with the understanding that the juvenile hall be constructed adjacent to the Siskiyou County General Hospital, to permit use of the hospital kitchen. It has been urged by the grand jury that construction of the hall be started immediately.

Brewer stated that present plans for the hall include four security cells, girls' and boys' dormitory, living quarters for supervisory personnel, space for a future kitchen, and office space. In the event it is decided that the probation office should be moved there, Brewer also said that a special room for smaller children will be provided next to the supervisory personnel quarters.

An anticipated yearly savings of up to \$12,000, may be realized if the probation office is moved from the courthouse to the juvenile hall, by a reduction of personnel which would otherwise be required.

Presently being considered for the building is an all-steel outer shell costing approximately \$25,000, which with the interior completed and wiring installed, will leave only \$25,000 for building the four maximum cells.

Brewer also stated that no recreation or outdoor playground will be provided unless local service clubs can be urged to contribute equipment and work. Brewer further said that dormitory equipment will be purchased from government surplus, whenever possible.

In an effort to keep costs of construction at a minimum, full use will be made of the county carpenter and other employees of the county.

According to Brewer no definite date for construction of the hall has been set, but it is hoped that it will be started by the latter part of August or early September.

In the feeding of juveniles, Brewer stated that at first they will be brought food on hot-tray servers from the hospital kitchen to their quarters.

Brewer further indicated in food cost savings can perhaps be achieved on a similar program such as practiced in Shasta County, where the juveniles raise most of their own vegetables at a county farm.

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Ordinary Citizens Pay Dulles Honor

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation and the world paid last tributes to John Foster Dulles today.

Diplomats from around the globe joined President Eisenhower in a funeral service which packed the great Washington Cathedral to capacity.

Leaders of the East and West stood side by side to pay their respects to the former secretary of state who died Sunday at the age of 71. For one day, at least, they paused in their cold war to honor the man whose pastor in the service called him the "Mr. Valiant" of the Free World's quest for peace.

They gathered in the vaulted sanctuary of the cathedral to participate in the simple rites of the Presbyterian Church, of which Dulles was an elder.

From the Far East, from Russia, Europe and Latin America came dignitaries — a chancellor, a prime minister, nearly a score of foreign ministers and others of high station — to join hundreds of American leaders and friends at the Dulles family.

From the cathedral the body of the man who had traveled more than a half million miles in the cause of peace then was borne to a grave in the hallowed soil of Arlington National Cemetery.

There, a 19-gun salute and the sounding of "taps" ended the saga of John Foster Dulles.

Before the services, Dulles had lain in state in the Bethlehem Chapel of the cathedral for 34 hours. In that time, more than 20,000 persons filed in solemn respect past his closed coffin.

James Berkeley of the cathedral staff said it was "the biggest crowd of people that has passed through here on such an occasion since the Woodrow Wilson funeral in 1924."

At the request of his family, there was no sermon or eulogy for Dulles. There were prayers, readings from the Old and New Testaments, songs of Dulles' favorite hymns sung by the cathedral's famous boys choir with the congregation joining in, and a reading from John Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" by Dr. Russell P. Barnes of New York, U. S. secretary of the World Council of Churches.

"Then, Mr. Valiant for truth said, I am going to my father's and though with great difficulty I am not hither, yet now I do not regret me of all the trouble I have been at to arrive where I am. My sword I give to him that shall succeed me in my pilgrimage. . . my marks and scars I carry with me to be a witness for me that I have fought his battles who now will be my rewarder."

An hour before the service began, the flag-draped casket bearing Dulles' body was borne from the chapel to the main part of the cathedral. There, the coffin lay bathed in soft golden light at the foot of the steps of the choir.

All of the 2,318 seats in the vast Gothic cathedral were reserved. Original plans to set aside about 400 seats for the general public were abandoned because every seat and all available standing room was needed to accommodate the important guests.

There were Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of West Germany, Australian Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies, U. N. Secretary-general Dag Hammarskjold, NATO Secretary-general Paul Henri Spaak, Madame Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the president of Nationalist China, and numerous foreign ministers, including Andrei Gromyko of Russia, who arrived by plane this morning from Geneva. There were members of the diplomatic missions in Washington, the Cabinet, the Congress and the Supreme Court.

President Eisenhower arrived with Mrs. Eisenhower, their son, Maj. John Eisenhower and Mrs. John Eisenhower. They sat in front-row, red leather, upholstered arm chairs in the left of the cathedral.

Then came the secretary's family — the widow who had traveled many thousands of miles with him and was at his side when he died; two sons and a daughter; his brother, Allen W. Dulles, head of the Central Intelligence Agency, and other members of the family. They sat in the front row to the right in plain wooden chairs with straw seats.

More than 100 uniformed servicemen, representing all of the branches of the military, served as ushers.

Dr. Edward L. R. Elson, pastor of the National Presbyterian Church here where both Eisenhower and Dulles worshipped, read from the New Testament.

After a hymn, Dr. Barnes read from "Pilgrim's Progress." And then, instead of eulogy or sermon, Dr. Barnes, offered a long "personalized prayer."

He then paid his tribute to his dead friend. He voiced thanks that Dulles, in following his faith in God, had shown "unfettered devotion to justice, freedom and peace." Dr. Barnes recalled Dulles' "unflinching courage" which enabled him to carry out his diplomatic duties and meet disease and suffering "without fear or frenzy but rather with calmness and steady vision."

He offered thanks to God for giving Dulles humility which "kept him warm hearted in countless little acts of kindness" and for "all that was noble and beautiful as devoted husband, father, brother and friend."

They will meet with the Soviet Union's Andrei Gromyko, Britain's Selwyn Lloyd and France's Maurice Couve de Murville.

Herter and the other three foreign ministers flew to Washington from Geneva for the funeral of John Foster Dulles today.

Western diplomats had seen the visit as an opportunity for such a conference as the foreign ministers arrived at the airport.

The Geneva negotiations have been pretty much on a dead end in efforts to resolve East-West differences.

Announcement of plans for the White House conference came shortly after disclosure that Eisenhower will be host at a luncheon Thursday for the foreign ministers and high officials and dignitaries of other countries who are here for the Dulles funeral.

The President met for 45 minutes this morning with West Germany's Konrad Adenauer, also here for the funeral.

James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, announced plans for the luncheon.

Before the conference with Adenauer the President had a 30-minute conference with Australia's Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies, who was in this country on other business as well as to attend the Dulles funeral. Menzies favors an East-West summit meeting.

Italy's Foreign Minister Giuseppe Pella, flew in shortly after midnight for the funeral.

Others in Washington or on the way included the foreign ministers of Belgium, Austria and Japan, and Mme. Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Nationalist Chinese generalissimo.

Paul Henri Spaak, secretary general of the North Atlantic Treaty organization, also was on hand to pay tribute to Dulles, whom he called "a great secretary of state and a great man."

Later in
