Northern California League baseball opens the 1959 season on three fronts this weekend. The Klamath Kubs, who will not return to Klamath Falls until the closure of the school term, are in a six team Little League Jamboree held in Gem Stadium Tuesday night. A hearty crowd of parents, friends and local Little League enthusiasts stayed until the last man was out as the teams squared off in a series of three, two, inning games.

Following the presentation of the six teams, resplendent in new uniforms, the introduction of coaches, an award of gift to Park and Recreation Director Bob Bonney on the behalf of both the Little League and the Babe Ruth Leagues by Gene Favell and Jack Kemmiller, the game got underway.

In the first game the Park-Cabinet-Moyina Heights team and the squad sponsored by Car-Ad-Co battled to a 7-7 tie in the two inning test. According to pre-arrangements the innings were terminated when either or both teams had scored seven runs.

The second game saw Hal's Sport Shop stage a five run rally to stop the Bend Portland nine 5-1.

In the evening's finale Weyerhaeuser-Don's Men Store garnered a pair of runs in the last of a thrilling second inning to nip Johnsonville 2-1.

All boys who finished first, second or third, in either age group, in the 100 yard dash or the 220 are invited to the Monday tests, according to KU track coach Jim Inglesby, chairman of the affair.
