The 20-student senior class of Merrill High School will be graduated June 2 at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium with Sharon Kafton representing the class as valedictorian and Gloria Jean Cahan as salutatorian.

Both are top students and both have been ultra-active in school activities. Both plan to attend college.

Miss Kafton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Kafton of Merrill. She maintained a 3.78 grade point average during her four years in high school. A 4.0 score is perfect. She was treasurer and news reporter of her freshman class, secretary and reporter of the Girls Athletic Association as a sophomore and junior, typist and copywriter for the school newspaper as a junior and senior, student council historian as a junior and is secretary this year.

She has been a member of the GAA for four years, the chorus pep club and drill team four years, the triple trio two years, the student council four years and she has participated in the county speech festival four years and in Elks Lodge panel discussions one year.

She won fourth place in the speech festival as a freshman, third as a sophomore and second as a junior. She placed first in the district speech festival this year and third this year in a county conservation speech contest.

She received the Daughters of the American Revolution Citizenship Award, both county and district, and the Outstanding Commercial Student Award from the Underwood Company this year.

She likes youth work and plays the piano. She plans to attend San Jose Bible College in San Jose next fall to major in elementary teaching.
