

Dulles Enjoyed Position As Secretary Of State

Editor's Note: This is the second of three articles on John Foster Dulles by an Associated Press writer who knew him as a lawyer, a senator, a campaigner, and finally as the chief architect of American foreign policy in perhaps the most crucial period of world history.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some boys want to be firemen when they grow up. Some want to be atomic scientists.

John Foster Dulles, after a brief flirtation with the idea of becoming a locomotive engineer, fixed his eyes firmly on the job of secretary of state. He made it at the age of 64 and loved every minute of it—until fatal illness struck him down.

Nothing short of his imminent death discouraged Dulles. He was in agonizing pain on his last trip to Europe. But he kept going, usually with the familiar smile on his lips, sometimes with a lawyer's hard-bargaining glint in his eyes, endlessly seeking a shield against the horror of nuclear war.

It will be for history to say how successful his efforts were. But Dulles' warm friend, President Eisenhower, who relied wholeheartedly on his advice, has noted time and again that no American soldier died in combat since the Korean War was stopped in 1953.

Dulles never lacked critics. He brought lightning down on his head from Moscow to Oshkosh, even before he took office, by threatening "massive retaliation."
