New Store To Open In Eugene

Home Appliance Company which is owned by Dick Finch and Randall Gifford of Medford will open its fifth retail outlet early in June. Dick Krois, who has been with the company since it was established and has managed the local store since it opened in July, 1956, will go to Eugene to open the new store at 12th and Willamette.

On June 1, Krois will be succeeded as manager here by Fred Floetke who has been with the local store almost since its opening. Floetke was born and reared in Klamath Falls and has many years of experience in the service business. He operated his own appliance service shop prior to joining Home Appliance. He is married and has two children.

Harold Howard, who has been with the company since it started, steps into the newly created position of assistant manager.

Krois and his wife, Imogene, have four children. Their oldest boy, Richard, has just finished boot camp with the Navy and will be stationed at Whidbey Island. Tom has been attending KUHS and Garry and Jean Ellen have gone to Fairview School. The family will move to Eugene at the close of the school year.

The other Home Appliance Company stores in the chain include two at Medford and one at Ashland. Krois formerly managed the Medford Home Appliance Bargain Store and then the Ashland store prior to coming here.
