

Chicago Nudging Indians: Phillies Face Long Season

Cleveland Troubled By Wynn

If the way Cleveland has managed to hold the American League lead is a surprise, imagine where the Indians might be if they could shake loose from Chicago's White Sox, the club they have a tough time beating, and Early Wynn, the guy they can't beat at all.

Half of Cleveland's 14 defeats through the first quarter of the schedule have been from the second place White Sox. And three of those have been nailed by Wynn, who has won seven in a row from the Indians since they traded him away a year and a half ago.

Cleveland's just a game in front of Wynn (7-3) and the White Sox went to work again Wednesday for a 5-1 victory over the Indians.

Baltimore, the only other club with an edge (3-2) over Cleveland this year, missed a chance to close in when Washington's Camilo Pascual beat the third place Orioles 6-0 Wednesday night with a two-hitter.

Wynn, a 39-year-old right-hander, closed in on the top-20 group of all-time winners with his 25th victory, but needed Gerry Staley's relief help for the last two outs.

Wynn is 21st on the all-time list of winners, four shy of Ted Lyons' 260. Wynn is tops among active pitchers, with Milwaukee's Warren Spahn, who won his 232nd Wednesday night, no. 25 in the all-time rankings.

Roberts' Big Year In Doubt

After the opening game this looked like it might be the year Robin Roberts completed his comeback, but now it's already a long, long season for Philadelphia's right-handed veteran.

Roberts was The Associated Press comeback-of-the-year choice in the National League last season when he won 17 games for the last place Phillies. When he beat Cincinnati's Don Newcombe 2-1 opening day after a five-inning no-hit duel, there were thoughts of the old Roberts, who had been a 20-game winner for six consecutive seasons before becoming the NL's biggest loser in 1956 and 1957.

Now he's 2-4, clobbered once more by the home run ball as he lost his third in a row Wednesday night at Cincinnati 10-4. The club he had held hitless for five innings on opening day chased him within four innings with eight hits, three of them homers, and six runs.

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

A good crowd turned out last night to air its views on big game (deer) management in the Klamath area before members of the Oregon State Game Commission.

Principal, and practically sole, topic of discussion was the either sex deer kill.

The commission came in for general praise for its recently instituted unit area hunts. It was the general consensus of opinion that this was a major step in the right direction and a practice that should be followed out until the whole theory is either proven or disproven.

Strong pleas were made by several attending to call off the doe shoots in the Greensprings area. It was pointed out by commission members that under the proposed regulations only 500 permits are slated for this area. If you subtract the estimated 25 per cent of hunters who will fill with a buck and assume that hunter success will run not over 50 per cent, one member pointed out, then the total kill would not be much over 200.

Potential shortages in winter range browse is forecast for the interstate herd if deer numbers are not kept down. Representatives from the area, from the Interstate Deer Herd Committee and various individuals seemingly agreed that the 4,000 tag issue was necessary. The herd has shown, it was pointed out, a gain of better than 2,000 over last year and is currently better than 4,000 above the recommended limit of 12,000 animals.

Greater feeling for an either-sex system was expressed by those attending than has been shown in recent years. It was also proposed that any either-sex hunts be held at the beginning of the season rather than at the tail end.

Diamond Lake is the scene of feverish activity by both the Forest Service and private concessionaire employees who are engaged in putting all facilities in service for opening day May 30, according to Ray Hampton, lands assistant for the Umpqua National Forest, who visited the area Friday.

The only tournament draw will be made up on Friday, May 29. Possible entrants so far in the tourney are Jerry Jennings, Ray Tice, Bud Case, Earl Brooks, James Norland, Keith Baxter, Jim Johnson, Duane Fitzsimmons, Jan Baxter, Ken Henry and Gary Buchholz.

No trophies will be awarded this year and no entry fee will be charged. Each player is asked to furnish one ball each.

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Haddix In Goldfish Bowl

Historic Job Means Extra Loot

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Harvey Haddix will be living in a goldfish bowl for the next few months.

The little Pittsburgh Pirates lefthander will be the subject of interviews, endorsements, banquets, and even a National League ceremonial because of the 12 innings of perfect baseball he threw at the Milwaukee Braves Tuesday night.

The historic chore will mean some extra money for him too. How much isn't certain at this time, but one unofficial source said it could boost his income this year by \$10,000, maybe more. Television shows doubtless will be after him to tell his story. The razor blade sponsors will probably want him to shave before the cameras.

He was deluged with telegrams Wednesday and he probably gave more interviews in a day than he had in his seven years in the majors.

"Look at my eyes," said Haddix in the Pirates dugout before Wednesday night's game with Milwaukee. "I didn't get as much sleep today as I usually do."

"You probably were the most photographed and talked about man in the country today," said a reporter. Just then another radio man came up and asked if Haddix "was ready." With that he walked over to the corner of the dugout to repeat the story of how he set down 36 Braves in a row without a hit and then lost in a whacky 13th inning.

It wasn't until midday Wednesday that the score was finally decreed to be 1-0 by National League President Warren Giles.

The whole affair was complicated. Joe Adcock hit the ball over the fence with Henry Aaron and Felix Mantilla on base for what should have been three runs. But the big first baseman passed Aaron, who had stopped running because he thought the ball was inside the park and Mantilla had already scored. Umpire Frank Dascoli gave Adcock a double and scratched one of the runs.

Giles said only the run necessary to win the game will be counted. He said Adcock would be officially credited with a double because he had failed to touch all the bases.

Giles said the National League is preparing an "appropriate observance" of Haddix' performance. He didn't indicate the nature of the affair, but hinted it will take place at Pittsburgh.
