Klamath Juvenile Officer Clarifies Local Picture

Hearing for nine juvenile law violators completed a few days ago brought to 92 the number of cases heard by Juvenile Judge Charles H. Foster so far this year. Compared with the total of 99 cases before the judge during all of last year, the juvenile picture in Klamath County would not look encouraging.

This, however, is not entirely correct, says Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews. There are many angles to the juvenile picture, and all must be considered.

Cases handled by the juvenile office here include delinquencies, dependencies and traffic violations. Only a small minority of these go before the judge. Most of them are handled in the office by Mathews, counselors Rosemary Lusk and Gene Olp, and Traffic Counselor Jacquelyn Wade. The total of all cases processed last year, including those that went into court, was 1,081. How this year will end is uncertain, of course, but a projection of experience so far indicates 998 cases this year at the rate things are going.

theft and vandalism created intense, concerned public interest. In all, 29 youths from 14 to 19 were arrested or questioned at length.

Of those 29, all boys, three were sentenced to county jail from district court, seven were sentenced to MacLaren School for Boys, 17 were placed on probation, and two were released without formal charges.

Those youths, incidentally, appear to be doing very well. The three boys sentenced to the county jail were model prisoners, Sheriff Red Britton said, and they since have been released to obtain jobs.

Of the 17 on probation, only two have reappeared to answer charges. Both these boys were involved in cars, one driving and another in a car without a responsible adult present—a violation of Judge Foster's strict probationary terms. But the juvenile office considered mitigating circumstances in both cases and, as Mathews

said, "we're not too upset about them."

Another reason more cases have appeared in court is a slight switch in juvenile policies. "We get cases into court more quickly with a less formal type of probation," Mathews said. "No doubt the formality of the court carries weight, and helps in putting a stop to some of this nonsense."

Last week 12 cases were heard by Judge Foster. Three of these were dependency cases in which children involved were declared wards of the court. Of nine delinquencies, one girl was sent to the

Villa St. Rose School in Portland and eight cases were continued to the further order of the court.

Traffic, which continues to contribute most of the cases before the juvenile staff, is declining this year. Through April this year, police issued 124 traffic citations, about one a day. Last year the number was slightly higher, 130.

Additionally, the number of repeat violators is dropping a little. Last year 24 per cent of traffic offenses were committed by repeat violators. This year the percentage of repeaters was down to 18.5.

GOP'er Named To Congress

JAMESTOWN, N.Y. (AP)—Charles E. Goodell, 33, a Republican was chosen to succeed the late Rep. Daniel A. Reed in Congress in a special election Tuesday.

Goodell, Chautauque County GOP chairman, drew about twice as many votes as his Democratic opponent, Robert E. McCaffery, in the 43rd District, which is predominantly Republican.

The turnout of about 44,900 was half that for a regular congressional election.

Complete unofficial returns gave Goodell 27,779 votes to 14,309 for McCaffery. The Liberal party candidate, John R. Steinbroner, 41, of Salamanca, drew 322 votes. Goodell will fill the unexpired part of Rep. Reed's term, which runs until Dec. 31, 1960. Reed died in February after serving 40 years in the House.
