

Massive Official Rites Mark Funeral Of Dulles

WASHINGTON (AP)—The body of John Foster Dulles was laid in its final resting place Wednesday in a massive official ceremony seldom matched in the history of this country.

Hundreds of U.S. officials and many from abroad watched as Dulles' casket was committed to a simple grave on a hillside in quiet Arlington National Cemetery.

A 2 1/2-hour ritual was climaxed by a 19-gun salute, three rifle volleys, and the sounding of taps by a lone bugler. Dry-eyed and composed, Mrs. Dulles received the flag which had covered the casket during the funeral.

Then President and Mrs. Eisenhower once again expressed condolences to Mrs. Dulles, whose husband died of cancer Sunday after six years as secretary of state.

Today the galaxy of foreign leaders—including some who fought Dulles during his long diplomatic career—prepared to go their separate ways.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Britain's Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd, French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, scheduled a meeting with Eisenhower before returning to their Geneva conference temporarily recessed for the funeral.

Germany's Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, diplomatic representatives from 26 countries, and Washington's elite from the administration, Congress and the Supreme Court joined in the elaborate proceedings which started in the National Cathedral and moved to the cemetery in a 100-limousine cortege.

The cathedral—a huge, Gothic church atop a Washington high point—was filled with nearly 3,000 mourners for the Presbyterian funeral service led by the Rev. Dr. Russell P. Barnes, Secretary of the World Council of Churches. Dulles had been a Presbyterian lay leader.

At Mrs. Dulles' request there was no sermon and no eulogy.

At the cemetery gate there was another solemn service. While the procession waited, an Army band played "God of Our Fathers" and six servicemen moved the casket from the motor hearse to a black caisson drawn by six gray horses. Led now by companies of ser-

vicemen on foot, the cortege moved at slow pace through the cemetery's winding roads.

At the grave site—on a hillside partly shaded by a yellow poplar tree—hundreds more gathered to witness the final military rites. Dulles was a major in World War I.

Members of Dulles' family and a few others, including President and Mrs. Eisenhower and Vice President and Mrs. Richard M. Nixon sat under a canopy by the grave. Others remained standing to the rear, sweltering under a 30-degree May sun.

Eisenhower sat stiffly and solemnly through the reading of passages from the Bible. Mrs. Dulles remained calm.

Then came the firing of arms, the bugled taps, the folding of the casket flag and its handing by the clergy to the widow. The tribute to Dulles had come to an end.

Record In Tact; Ballot Is Cast

Rocket Bases In Albania, Bulgaria, Slated By Reds

MOSCOW (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev says the Soviet Union is ready to set up rocket bases in Albania and Bulgaria to match any the United States may establish in Italy or Greece.

The Soviet premier, visiting Albania, repeated an earlier Soviet proposal for a ban on nuclear weapons in the Balkan peninsula to make it "a peninsula of peace without any missiles or nuclear weapons."

He warned Italy and Greece that U.S. rocket bases on their territory "will attract our rockets as a magnet."

"These bases are clearly spearheaded against the Soviet Union, against Albania and other Socialist (Communist) countries," he said in a speech Tuesday in Tirana, the Albanian capital. His remarks were reported by Tass, the Soviet news agency.

If Italy and Greece go ahead with NATO plans to locate bases

for American-supplied missiles on their territory, Khrushchev declared, "it will compel us to build up forces for a worthy reply."

"Perhaps," he said, "we shall have to reach agreement with the government of the People's Republic of Albania to put something here to counter them."

Albania has a common frontier with Greece and is only 100 or 30 miles across the Adriatic from Italy. The Italians have agreed to accept American intermediate range missiles which can carry nuclear warheads and are expected to begin getting them by early July.

There has been no word of a similar agreement between the United States and Greece, although the two nations have agreed the Greek army will get American training in the use of nuclear weapons.

The Soviet Union, said Khrushchev, could establish bases for intermediate and even close-range missiles in neighboring satellites that could "blanket" both Italy and Greece.

"Now there are missiles which strike targets not hundreds but thousands of kilometers away," he continued. "As to locations to install these rockets, we have a wide choice in the matter."

Khrushchev tempered his warnings with the declaration "We consider the international situation is not a bad one. One might even say it is good."

"We are fully confident, meaning the Soviet Union," he said, "that by following correct policy it is possible to do away with armed conflicts."

But Khrushchev said the Western proposals at the Geneva foreign ministers conference "offer no basis for agreement."

Once again the Soviet premier plumped for a summit meeting and said it was immaterial to him where it was held.

"To us the main point is that the meeting be useful and that world peace be consolidated," he said. "To achieve this end we are ready to go to the end of the earth."

Khrushchev injected a tribute to John Foster Dulles in his speech, calling him a "distinguished politician" and expressing "sincere condolences" on his death.

State-Supported Schools Set Higher Tuition Costs

PORTLAND (AP)—Students at Oregon's state-supported institutions of higher learning will pay a bigger chunk of the cost of their education, the state Board of Higher Education ruled Tuesday.

The ruling—in line with a recommendation by Gov. Mark Hatfield and the 1959 Legislature—will become effective with the fall term.

Resident Oregon students will pay \$11 a quarter more or \$33 more in the course of the academic year, while the increase for non-resident students is \$21 or \$63 for the academic year.

Chancellor John R. Richards said despite the increase, Oregon student fees still rank about average for those of state schools around the nation.

The increase included an added \$1 per term for the building fee. The new schedule upped fees from \$74 to \$85 at the University of Oregon, Oregon State and Portland State; from \$84 to \$73 at Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon and Eastern Oregon; from \$190 to \$201 at the medical and dental school; from \$69 to \$89 for medical and dental technology; and from \$58 to \$69 for nursing at the medical school.

Two years ago the state institutions raised fees \$6 at the suggestion of the Legislature, which cut the appropriation by the same amount.

The board had met to review bids on \$9,055,000 in bonds to finance campus expansion, which would be repaid from student fees and board and room without appropriated funds.

'Beer' Deleted From Contract

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The San Francisco Board of Supervisors hunted through the fine print in a hurry Tuesday and struck the word "beer" out of a catering contract.

Marguerite Pratt, a citizen, pointed out the board was about to permit the sale of beer in four city parks patronized almost exclusively by teenagers. But Rose Schuman, who is to manage the four concessions, said it wouldn't have made any difference.

"I have no license to sell beer," she said, "and I wouldn't sell it on a bet."

APPEAL FOR MOSLEMS

Minnesotan Who Vanished, Ready To Start Life Anew

SILVER LAKE, Minn. (AP)—Earl Zrust, whose yearning to get away from it all set off a nationwide search, is back home and ready to get back in business.

"I started 12 years ago with nothing, and I guess I'm going to have to start from scratch again," he said.

Zrust, 30, disappeared with his wife and five children last December and was missing until three weeks ago when he was located working as a bricklayer in Reno, Nev.

He said he hopes to start several masonry projects next week in the area, but won't get back into the homebuilding business he left abruptly five months ago.

Since his return to his hometown, Zrust has been busy with his attorney trying to straighten out the financial tangle that resulted from his unannounced departure.

"While his disappearance caused a lot of anxiety and some inconvenience, it didn't really hurt anyone," said Joe Geysen, feed mill operator and mayor of this town of 600.

"Some of the folks here are a little hesitant to break the ice with Earl, but after they start talking with him, he's just the same as always," Geysen said.

The four houses Zrust had un-

der construction when he left were completed by a local lumberyard. One of them was being built for Geysen.

Zrust hasn't mingled much with his old friends since his return, but his family apparently has picked up most of the loose ends. They were in church last Sunday and were at a school picnic a few days after they got home.

Zrust said he left because the pressure of the construction business was "making me nervous."

He said working for someone else, as he did in Reno, had its advantages. "But you don't have the freedom you do when you're working for yourself. Now I'm getting anxious to get back to work."

Demo Revolt Threatens Farm Bills

WASHINGTON (AP)—A revolt among potent House Democrats against mounting farm subsidy costs threatened today to delay indefinitely House action on pending new agricultural legislation.

The uprising developed in the House Rules Committee, which has the power—frequently exercised—to block House consideration of virtually any piece of important legislation.

Caught in the threatened blockade were two major farm bills approved by the House Agriculture Committee and ready for House action.

One would increase the government price support level for small livestock feed grains such as oats, rye, barley and grain sorghums. The other, regarded as a key farm measure, would attempt to stem the costly and mounting wheat surplus by raising price supports in return for reduced plantings.

The Rules Committee attitude appeared to make certain continuance of a wheat program under the present law for another year. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson is required to announce marketing quotas and acreage allotments for the 1960 wheat crop not later than Monday.

There remained a possibility that if Congress were to change the law within 10 more days, the changes could be made to affect next year's crop. But the Agriculture Department would need all the time beyond that to prepare for a July 23 referendum among the farmers.

Chairman Harold D. Cooley (D-N.C.) of the House Agriculture Committee said that despite the delay he would push for House action on his committee's bill. He expressed hope a House vote can be set for next Thursday.

But Rules Committee action has been put off at least until next week.

Reports that farm legislation is in trouble in the House were confirmed by Reps. Richard Bolling (D-Mo) and Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. (D-Mass) both Rules Committee members.
