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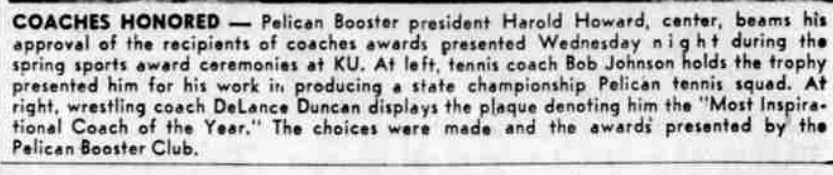
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Twenty or more Klamath Falls race drivers will match cars, wits and driving skills with a number of speedsters from Northern California points and the Rogue Valley as the Klamath Racing Association opens the 1959 "Bard" racing season in the Eberlein Street Speedway Sunday, May 31. Time trials begin at 4:30 p.m. followed by the first of an eight event program at 5:30.

In an all-out effort to provide race fans with an exciting, fast-moving program, the members of the association have divided the local competition into two classes, one, 255 cubic inches engine "specs," and the other, between 255 and 350 cubic inches. The increased engine size guarantees speeds of up to 75 miles per hour; while the division of the two classes provides much closer competition in each event.

The races will begin with the traditional six-lap A trophy dash proving the four fastest cars at the track, then continue with a four lap B trophy dash, four 10 lap heat races, a 20-lap B Main event and conclude with the big race of the day, a 25-lap class A Main.

As an added incentive for some top competition and speed among the entrants a \$450 purse will beckon the racers.
