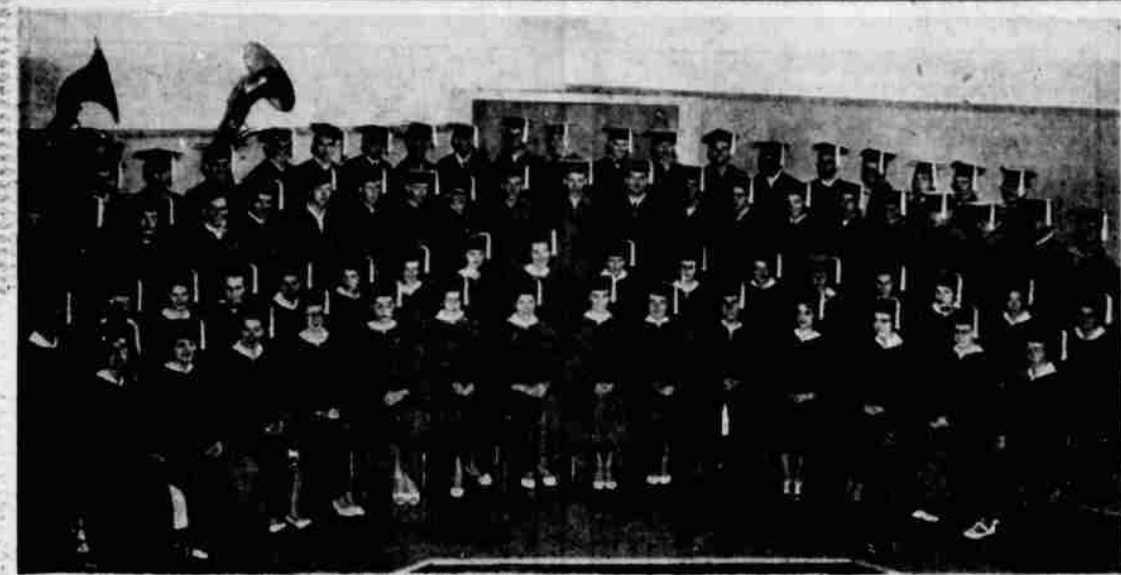




1959 LAKEVIEW HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATING CLASS

Seventy-Two To Graduate At Lakeview

LAKEVIEW—Seventy two students will form the 70th class to graduate from the Lakeview High School. Commencement exercises for the 1959 group will be held on Monday evening, June 1, at the Arthur D. Hay School starting at 8 o'clock, according to an announcement by Superintendent H. B. Ferrin.

Dr. James Millar, director of Good Citizenship Foundation, Portland, will be the commencement speaker and his subject will be "Tomorrow is Today."

Roseburg Family Informed 'No Record Of Citizenship'

ROSEBURG, Ore. (AP)—"When you live here all your life, then find out you don't belong, it kind of shakes you up a bit," commented Harold Mobley here Thursday on his plight as a man without a country.

Mobley, his sister and his father had believed they were citizens of the United States until the U.S. Immigration Service notified them otherwise.

The Immigration Service also registered Mobley; his sister, Mrs. George Hughes of Roseburg; and his father, Clarence Mobley of Albany, Ore., as aliens and fingerprinted them.

The revelation meant Mobley no longer could be a registered voter, although he had voted in elections from 1932 to 1957. He had to resign his membership in the Elk's Lodge, which requires U.S. citizenship, and his commission as a Notary Public.
