

Decision Due On Missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower reportedly wants a quick Pentagon recommendation on whether to keep the Nike-Hercules or Bomarc missiles — or both — as anti-aircraft weapons.

Senate sources who reported this today said the President had instructed Secretary of Defense Neil H. McElroy to back up his recommendation with solid evidence.

The sources declined to be quoted by name. One of them said Eisenhower's instructions to McElroy stemmed from a meeting Tuesday between the President and GOP congressional leaders. Sen. Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass) was quoted then as telling Eisenhower that the Senate would "resolve the matter for you" if the President didn't act this week.

After Tuesday's meeting, Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois quoted Eisenhower as saying there is no need for an immediate decision on the missiles.

A major row over the nation's aerial defense weapons has been going on for some time. It centers around claims by the Army and Air Force that each has a superior missile for shooting down attacking aircraft.

The Pentagon has not yet come up with an answer as to which claim is correct.

The Army is backing its short range Nike-Hercules missile, now a mainstay of the aerial continental defenses. The Air Force is pushing its Bomarc, a missile with a range described as something over 400 miles.

Congressional critics have charged that there is costly waste in developing the two missiles as rivals in the air defense program.

Air Examiner Asks Boost

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Civil Aeronautics Board examiner has recommended that trunk-line plane passengers pay an extra \$1 for their tickets.

If the recommendation is approved by the full board, the fare increases would be used to help the nation's 12 long-haul airlines pay for new jet age equipment.

CAB Examiner Ralph L. Wiser made his recommendation Wednesday after one of the longest hearings in the board's history, starting in May 1956.

The proposed increase was described as temporary, but Wiser's long decision gave no prospective date for ending it.

Wiser said the boost, along with some small but unspecified rate increases, would allow the airlines to realize fair earnings.

The surcharge would represent an over-all 12 per cent average increase the level of domestic fares before Feb. 10, 1958, when the airlines got temporary increases. Wiser recommended these temporary increases be continued past their July 31 expiration date, along with an earlier \$1 surcharge permitted before 1955.

Airlines affected are America, United, Eastern, Trans World, Braniff, Capital, Continental, Delta, National, Northwest, Northwest and Western.

Business Aid Laws Signed

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield signed into law Wednesday two Senate bills designed to develop a better climate for business.

One exempts goods in transit through the state from taxation and the other permits lending agencies to join together into a credit corporation to lend risk capital to business.

Other bills signed will:

Permit cities to issue bonds to build off-street parking facilities, with the bonds to be paid off by nearby property owners.

Permit the state Department of Education to accept any kind of federal aid to education.

Permit a committee to decide when the governor is physically or mentally incapable of functioning in office.
