

Beavers Clobber All-Stars

CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon State College's 1959 varsity football team defeated the Alumni All Stars, 38-16, Saturday before 6,017 persons despite a fine passing performance by Joe Francis of the Green Bay Packers.

Francis, who played three seasons for Oregon State before entering the professional ranks, completed 11 of 25 pass attempts, two for touchdowns. The passes gained 212 yards.

But the varsity, led by sophomore tailback Don Kasso and senior fullback Jim Stinnette, scored once in each of the first three quarters and twice in the fourth.

It was the third period before the alumni could score—on a 41-yard field goal by Sam Baker, place kicking specialist for the Washington Redskins.

In the fourth quarter a 67-yard pass play from Francis to fleet Sam Wesley gave the alumni their first touchdown. Francis flipped 9 yards to Ken Carpenter of the Saskatchewan Roughriders for the other.

Kasso, a 183-pounder from Berkeley, Calif., scored twice, once on a one-foot smash in the first quarter and another on a six-yard end sweep in the final period.

Stinnette, a Corvallis native, plunged one foot to score in the second. Earl Harbin, a sophomore tailback from Honolulu, went two yards to the end zone in the third. Aaron Thomas, a junior end, scored the final touchdown on a six-yard end-around play.

Ron Miller, junior wingback who couldn't win a letter last season, reeled off the days longest run, 53 yards, to set up the varsity's last score. Ralph Carr, who played his last season in 1953, hauled him down on the 12-yard line.

Stinnette carried the ball 66 yards in 11 tries. Kasso made 47 net yards on 9 tries.

Wesley caught two Francis passes for a total of 76 yards.

After the game coach Tommy Prothro said of his varsity:

"It's hard to tell how significant this was. We were up against some good men, but I'm not sure about the condition of all of them or that they were at their best. There's no question but that this was much more helpful than an intersquad game. You need real opposition."

Big Field Entered In Hardtop Program

A field of approximately 30 Klamath and California "hardtops" will roar into the first of the Klamath Racing Association programs slated for the Eberlein Street Speedway when they take the starting flag in time trials beginning at 4:30 this afternoon.

The first race of the eight event program gets under way at 5:30. In addition to the regular racing events set for today and future cards, special events have been planned by promoter Earl Sheridan.

The association, in an all-out effort to provide fans with more thrills and closer competition, has made two sweeping changes in its planning for the 1959 season.

First, the local cars have been divided into two groups, one formed of cars with 235 cubic inches displacement or less and the second for cars boasting from 235 to 280 cubic inches. The second innovation is one that attracts more entrants for each race; a fat purse of \$450 has been arranged for the first program with a like schedule planned for ensuing events.

Heading the list of local aces to flash their wares around the quarter-mile clay oval is 37-58 champion Bud Cook with his speedy Hudson, K-4. Casting an eye on Cook's crown is Dale Hankins, the number two man last year, who also races a Hudson. Close on Hankins' heels are Dale Himelwright, K-35, Wes Bishop, K-10, Hal Stewart, K-35, Kenny Kimes, K-48, among others.

Mutterings from the pits and garages prove that the local drivers are planning a few surprises for the past year's high point men, promising no more runaways nor parade races.

A newcomer to the area is veteran Brookings' driver, Johnny Jones, whose equipment and driving tactics have gained him the reputation as the track villain and despite the attempts of track officials to stem any rough driving or "nerfing," drivers are making plans for chilly welcome for Jones.

In charge of racing for the 1959 season are starter Bud Lorey, an experienced hand, timer, Mel Hearn, pit steward, Lige Chambers, and Verne Toombs, track engineer. Toombs is a veteran in regards track surfaces and promises one of the speediest surfaces the racers have yet competed on in Klamath Falls.

In addition to the local entrants a large contingent of cars and drivers is expected from Northern California and the Medford-Grants Pass area. Heads of the various associations in all areas are working toward establishing a racing circuit enabling local and foreign cars to compete on all the tracks. This plan would provide more competitors for each race program.

Nor-Cal League Underway

The Klamath Kubs, Klamath Falls semi-pro baseball team, gets its first chance to prove itself when they tangle with the Yreka Indians in Yreka at 1 o'clock this afternoon in the Northern California League opener.

In other Nor-Cal action Mount Shasta plays at Weed and the Scott Valley Stars perform at Dunsmuir.

All games count in Nor-Cal league standings. The season will conclude league play on August 9, while the All-Star game is slated for Sunday, July 26, in Weed.

The Kubs will open before home-town fans next Sunday when they host the Weed club at Gem Stadium. The game will be prelude by an "Oldtimer's Game" pitting squads headed by Harry Pelts and Merrill's Al Keck.

For this afternoon's Yreka test Klamath manager Irv Whit will suit 18 players including outfielders Floyd Linderman, Whit, Dave Cohen, Bill Worlein and John Bianchi, infielders Dean Dunson, Don Dexter, Kenny Young and Ron Owens, while Ron Johnson will probably start as catcher, with the pitching chores a toss-up between left-hander Bob Lowry or right-hander Bob James.

"We haven't decided on any set lineup at this point, at least not one that will remain constant throughout the season. We are expecting some boys home from college that will be strong contenders for spots," commented manager Whit.

"This is a fast league whether the average fan knows it or not. There will be some mighty good baseball played this year. How will we do? It's hard to say now—but I think we have a pretty fair chance," stated Whit.

All games played in Northern California will start at 1 p.m. Klamath Falls time. Games will start in Gem Stadium at 2 o'clock.

Collegian Captures BA Title

SANDWICH, England (AP)—Deane Beman, a boyish-looking crewcut collegian from Silver Spring, Md., became the 11th- and youngest American winner of the British Amateur Golf Championship Saturday. He beat greying Bill Hyndman 3 and 2 in the 3-hole final over the Royal St. George's links.

Beman, 21, is a student at the University of Maryland. He interrupted his studies to come to Britain with the U.S. Walker Cup team. He is married and has a daughter. He never has won a major tournament in the United States although he reached the quarter-finals of the 1958 U.S. Amateur Championship.

Hyndman, 43, is a Philadelphia insurance agency owner who never had time to play much big time tournament golf until he was nearly 40. He was runner-up to Harvey Ward in the 1955 U.S. Amateur, a Walker Cup player and represented the U.S. in the World Amateur Team Championship in Scotland last year.

The slightly-built Marylander took the lead on the first two holes Saturday and never let Hyndman catch him.

He was 2 up after nine holes, still 2 up after 18 and 3 up at the 27-hole turn. Hyndman made a belated bid when he won the 31st and 32nd, but the college kid didn't panic and clinched the match when he executed a fine chip shot to win the 33rd.

Beman's perfect putting and a dozen delicately hit chip shots were the decisive factors.

Klamath Falls baseball fans get their first taste of summer baseball this afternoon when Hi Hatfield's American Legion nine hosts the Central Point Cheney Studs in a doubleheader slated to start at 1 p.m. in Gem Stadium. The twinbill, a non-counter, so far as league action is concerned, gives the local Legionnaires a chance to rectify a split decision handed them yesterday afternoon in Medford at the hands of the same ball club.

The KF squad nailed coach Bill Askwith's Central Pointers with a 6-1 defeat in the first game Saturday, a seven inning affair, then stood by and collected only one base hit while losing the second encounter of the day, five innings, 8-0.

Both days' doubleheaders are charged up as merely practice games although both are working in the same league. League play begins for the Klamath Falls team on June 19 when they host Lakeview in a single game in Gem Stadium.

Prior to that time the KF's will meet the Klamath Kubs here and mix with Redmond twice in Redmond. The Legion-Kub game is scheduled as a Little League benefit test, all proceeds to go toward the Little League Ballpark construction plan.

Saturday afternoon KF starting chucker John Webb turned in an effective performance in spacing six hits so that the Studs could count only one run over the seven inning distance. The run scored when an infield error combined with a pair of base knocks. Webb allowed no walks and fanned seven Studs.

The loser, Central Point's Bill Ahnors was tagged for seven KF hits, walked three and fanned four batters.

Dave Saks, the chunky KF catcher, led his mates at the plate rapping out two hits in three at-bats, one a powerful triple which combined with centerfielder Rich Depey's double in the third inning to help the Legion nine score four runs.

Second sacker Smiley Herrera, third baseman Estin Kiger, first baseman Don Gresdel, and Webb, each added singles for the Klamath Falls cause.

Big gun for CP was catcher Ed Allen, who poled two singles in three trips.

In the five-inning clash KF leftfielder Blake Griggs caught hold of one in the fifth inning for a clean single thereby spoiling a no-hit ballgame for winner Bob Samples.

Samplers, a JV chucker for the Crater Comets, whiffed seven Klamath Falls batters and walked only three while blanking the KF nine.

Charged with the loss in the second game was KF pitcher Pat Carney, who, although he allowed only two hits, saw some sloppy fielding result in four errors, which cost him the game.

The Cheney nine erupted for six big markers in the first inning as four walks off Carney combined with two KF errors and a hit by Bill Ahnors.

The Central Pointers notched two more in the third off another walk, an error and one more safe hit.

Probable starting pitcher for today's games are Bob Wilkinson and Denny Salvadori, or Gary Bebbler.

Hatfield noted that all boys who have turned out for Legion play so far will undoubtedly get a chance in this afternoon's action.

\$100,000 Collected By Dancer

NEW YORK (AP)—Sword Dancer, classy 3-year old who had been flirting with the big \$100,000-plus races all spring, finally grabbed a big one Saturday when he drew away in the stretch and beat 10 older horses in the Metropolitan Handicap at Belmont Park.

He is the first 3-year old to capture the rich mile since Greek Ship, also owned by the Brookmeade Stable, did it in 1950. With Willie Shoemaker in the saddle, Sword Dancer finished three and a quarter lengths ahead of Myron N. Goodwin's Jimmer.

Jimmer was two and a quarter lengths ahead of Mrs. Ada L. Rice's Talent Show, who nosed out Edward Potter Jr.'s Plion for third money.

Sword Dancer, nipped by Tomy Lee in the Kentucky Derby and also second in both the Preakness and Florida Derby, stepped the mile in a scorching 1:35 1-5. Only two Mets have been run faster, both in 1:35—Jack High in 1930 and Midafternoon in 1936.

Clairborne Farm's Nadir, the 2-1 favorite with Eddie Arcaro up, was last all the way and pulled up lame.

Sword Dancer, who ran with Oligrachy as an entry and carried 114 pounds, paid \$7, \$4.10 and \$3.30.

The victory boosted Sword Dancer's total to \$215,640.
