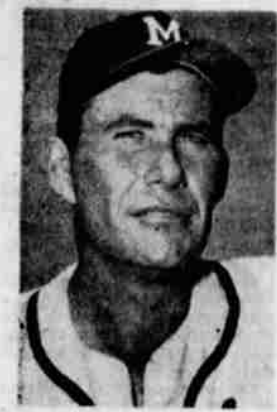


Killer, Adcock Lead Nat, Brave Wins

Sluggers Upsets Strategy

When it comes to spectacular hitting, Joe Adcock's your man. The big Milwaukee first baseman was the last slugger to walk-off four home runs in one game in the majors, jolting them against the Dodgers back in Brooklyn in 1954.

power guy in a regular scheduled major league game ever to reach the center field seats at New York's Polo Grounds, belting a 475-foot drive.

Then, just last Tuesday, it was Adcock who hit the rbi, rule-book double for the Braves' lone hit as they beat Pittsburgh and Harvey Haddix 1-0 in 13 innings.

Friday night, Adcock did it again. This time he reached across the plate to hit a wide pitch as Philadelphia right-hander Gene Conley tried to give him an intentional walk in the ninth. The ball bounced to second base, enabling Hank Aaron to come sliding home for a 6-5 victory that gave Milwaukee a three-game lead in the National League race.

St. Louis took care of the second-place San Francisco Giants 4-2. The Chicago Cubs claimed third place by beating Los Angeles 9-4 after Cincinnati had spilled Pittsburgh 8-5.

Joe Adcock Foils Phils, Ex-Teammate

MILWAUKEE (AP)—One of baseball's rarest plays—a batter reaching out and hitting a ball—pitch on an intended base on balls—gave the first place Milwaukee Braves a 6-5 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies Friday night.

The unorthodox play came in the ninth inning with the score tied and Joe Adcock at bat. This was the same Adcock who on Tuesday night had spoiled Harvey Haddix' bid for a no-hitter after pitching 12 perfect innings.

Adcock, the 6-4 first baseman, fooled everyone—a crowd of 20,334, his teammates and the Phillies—by tapping an intended pitchout from Gene Conley.

The ball dribbled toward the hole between first and second. Base runner Hank Aaron recovered from his surprise and raced home from third to beat easily a throw from the Phil second baseman Sparky Anderson.

"We'll take 'em any way we can, but Adcock certainly surprised me," Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney said later. "With only one out, it was good strategy to fill up the bases and I didn't even give a thought of Joe getting a ball good enough to hit."

But Joe was alert. He figured the pitch close enough to hit. And he was right.

"I don't know how far off the plate the pitch was," Adcock said. "But I was ready for anything. I hoped to get it out of the infield. But things worked out okay, anyway."

Conley could do little except shake his head.

"The pitch was just a little too close, about a foot from the plate," he said.

Tri-City Facing 'Curtains'

Tri-City drew its largest home crowd of the Northwest League baseball season Friday night, but it was just barely more than the attendance minimum the Braves say they need to stay in business.

A total of 2,925 fans were on hand as the Braves defeated Yakima, 14-11, in a wide open ball game at Kennewick.

Officials of the Braves said last week it was curtains for professional ball in the Tri-City area unless the club drew an average of 2,000 fans for each of the six games in its current homestand.

Civic organizations immediately began a "Save the Braves" campaign, which apparently worked Friday night.

The Braves didn't play as if they were on the verge of oblivion.

They wiped out a three-run Yakima lead in the bottom of the first frame by scoring five runs, followed it with two in the second inning, iced it with six more runs in the fifth, then added a single tally in the seventh for good measure.

Walt O'Neil blasted a three-run homer in the first inning to give Yakima its shortlived lead.

A pair of two-run homers by Herb Anderson and Cal Bauer and Jerry Clifford's double provided Tri-City's five runs in the first.

In other Northwest League games Friday night, Lewiston bopped Wenatchee, 13-2, and Eugene took the first game of a doubleheader from Salem, 1-0. The second contest of the bargain bill was called at the end of the ninth inning because of the curfew with the score tied, 4-4.

Lewiston's Bronces threw a 19-hit barrage at Wenatchee for their lopsided victory.

The Lewiston attack included homers by Chico Heron, Roger Herrscher and Milt Campe.

Bob Wadsworth went the route for the Bronces, giving up five hits to notch a victory after three straight losses.
