Retarded Boy Admits Arson Of SF School

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A mentally retarded boy insisted today that he touched off a \$300,000 fire which gutted an elementary school although his father said tearfully he could not have done it. Arson inspectors placed Magid Bateh, 12, in the Youth Guidance Center pending further investigation of the blaze which charred the Jefferson Elementary School early Sunday.

Magid's father, Elias, pleaded in vain late Monday with Judge Melvyn L. Cronin for his son's release. "This is not right," the grocer cried. "My boy was with me Saturday night. How could he have set the fire?" Cronin reminded the distraught father of the boy's confession and of the fact that preliminary investigation indicated the fire was set late Friday.

Magid, an "ungraded" pupil because of his mental deficiency, told investigators he broke into the school to destroy a spelling paper in which he had made an error. He was quoted as saying he touched a match to the paper in the principal's office and fled.

Early investigation showed the fire apparently started in the principal's office and smoldered undetected for more than 24 hours. Principal Elnora Fuller said the boy was "an unfortunate child under psychiatric care who invents wild and weird stories. His school work is ungraded because he is not conscious of grade levels."

As juvenile officers led the boy away, the father looked after him in stunned silence. "This cannot be," he said finally. "I came to take my boy home."

A court attaché placed a gentle hand on his shoulder. "That cannot be," he said.

McCLOUD—The Siskiyou County Board of Education met at Yreka the evening of May 28. Members signed audio-visual department contracts for all school districts; approved applications for life diplomas for the following: Dorothy J. Johns, health and development grade; Jack M. Gibson, Yreka, special secondary to teach exceptional children; Robert B. Manley, Mt. Shasta, general pupil personnel services; Edward Marin, junior college; Bessie Waters, general elementary.

Solons Mull Jobless Pay

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—A bill boosting unemployment insurance benefits from the present ceiling of \$40 a week to a top of \$55 a week moved to the Assembly floor today. The Finance and Insurance Committee approved the measure Monday night after the powerful Teamsters Union split openly with the AFL-CIO over the bill.

Vern Cannon, representing the teamsters, charged that C. J. Haggerty, a top executive in the AFL-CIO, negotiated a "package deal" with employers on unemployment insurance benefits without consulting the teamsters.

Haggerty denied the charge and said he was "shocked and amazed" by Cannon's complaints. Neither employer nor union spokesmen were completely satisfied by the committee's action on the bill since it changed the terms of the AFL-CIO and management agreement.

As finally approved by the committee, the bill excludes public employees and employees of non-profit institutions from benefits. Employers will bear the full cost of the increase, estimated at \$43,400,000 a year.

Teamster spokesmen claimed the bill was unfair since only those workers earning in the neighborhood of \$100 a week would receive increased benefits from the bill, a charge disputed by the AFL-CIO.

Group Kills Utility Bill

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—A bill which its author said would mean at least 100 million dollars a year saving to consumers was killed Monday by the Senate Public Utilities Committee.

The bill by Sen. John Holmdahl (D-Oakland) would have prohibited utilities from claiming credit for a tax they don't actually pay and would have forced them to take advantage of tax benefits when they exist in federal law. Holmdahl said some utilities are taking advantage of last tax write offs for depreciation but are keeping a separate set of books to show the Public Utilities Commission to justify their rates.

"At least 100 million dollars a year of the consumers' money is involved," Holmdahl declared. The bill was sidetracked for at least two years when it was sent to an interim study on a motion by Sen. John Thompson (R-San Jose).

DUNSMUIR—Sidney Hoyt, two and one-half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Hoyt of Mount Shasta, is under observation in the Mount Shasta Hospital after suffering a fracture in his upper leg and other injuries when he fell from a moving automobile just north of Dunsmuir on Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Hoyt, mother of the boy, was driving when the boy apparently opened the left rear door and fell out. There were two other children in the back seat, police said. The car was southbound and no other cars were following closely or a greater tragedy could have resulted, police said.

The Dunsmuir officer said when he arrived on the scene, two southbound truck drivers had stopped their rigs and were directing traffic. They continued to assist until the ambulance arrived.
