

Race Leader Blasts Book

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — "The Three Little Pigs" would vanish from state bookshelves in Florida if a Miami segregationist had his way.

David Hawthorn says clever integrationists are using the old folk tale to brainwash youngsters with a version picturing a black pig as superior to a white pig.

Hawthorn hasn't impressed Florida legislators with his efforts to get a bill introduced to ban the book from schools and libraries.

"I wouldn't touch it with a ten-foot pole," one lawmaker said Monday.

A copy of the book displayed by Hawthorn showed on its cover a white pig, a black pig and a white and black pig dancing a jig.

As Hawthorn sees it, the big bad wolf eats the white pig and the black and white pig. That leaves the black pig who has built a house of brick.

"The book follows the same old brainwashing routine," said Hawthorn, president of the Dade County Property Owners Assn., an organization which has fought efforts to integrate white neighborhoods in the Miami area.

"It shows a white pig and a mulatto pig who are destroyed and the black pig survives."

Vacation Itinerary Opened By Klamath County YMCA

Two trips already planned are to Mt. Lassen near Redding and to points of interest along the Pacific coast.

Boys who sign up must provide food and sleeping bags. They will camp under the stars and will cook their own meals.

Y Family Nights will continue on schedule on the first and third Fridays of each month. Locations will shift, if weather permits, to local parks and ranches. Those planning to attend should call headquarters before 5:30 p.m. on the day of the gathering.

Hi-Y Leadership Training Camp will be conducted August 23 to 28 at Salem's YMCA on Silver Creek.

The fifth annual Y Family Camp is scheduled for Lake of the Woods over the Labor Day holidays, September 5, 6 and 7 at the Rogue River Council of Boy Scouts' Camp McLaughlin. The YMCA is renting the camp site for the occasion.

The adult health department in the local headquarters building is fitted with steam rooms and a special exercise section. It will be open to the public six days a week from 9:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. Robert Johnson will be available for massaging. Persons wishing his services should call headquarters for appointment.

Town Swept By Sadness

IRON RIVER, Mich. (AP) — Sorrow burdened this northern Michigan mining community today in the wake of Monday's underground "belching hell" disaster that killed five men.

Thanks was also given that the tragedy was no worse.

Survivors' accounts of the peril deep within the Inland Steel Co. Sherwood iron mine in nearby Mineral Hills indicated that but for warnings, including the tell-tale odor of gas, the death toll might have been far greater.

The five who died were trapped by sulphurous gas and flames that shot out from the collapse of a walled-up excavation room.

Seven others were injured while 25, some crawling in pitch-black darkness up a 225-foot incline 1,200 feet below the surface, escaped without injury.

Howard Group, 30, Crystal Falls, whose father, Everett, escaped, died in a hospital at nearby Stambaugh Monday night. Gas fumes had seared his lungs.

The other victims, all veterans of the iron ore mines, were Ingvar Wester, about 48, Iron River; August Zuckal, 51, Caspian; Einar Johnson, 59, Crystal Falls, and Carl Anderson, 40, Iron River.

All were residents of the cluster of mining towns in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Sax Rohmer, Writer, Dead

LONDON (AP) — Sax Rohmer, creator of the mystery story villain Dr. Fu Manchu, died Monday night after a long illness. He was believed to have been about 70.

The evil doctor, who set the pattern for oriental evildoers in 20th century fiction, made his debut in 1913 in "Dr. Fu Manchu."

In the next 44 years Rohmer turned out a long series of Fu Manchu stories. The last, "Re-Enter Fu Manchu," appeared in 1957.

Films and radio added to the writer's fame.

Rohmer's real name was Arthur Sarsfield Ward. He was born in England but lived in America for many years and called New York City his home.

Martin Son Visits PNW

PORTLAND (AP) — The son of Ken Martin made his first visit to Portland Tuesday since his father, mother and three sisters vanished some six months ago.

Don Martin, 28, came here from New York City where he is a Navy corpsman on duty with a Marine reserve unit at Fort Schuyler and a night student at Hunter College.

Martin was reluctant to discuss the disappearance of his family, who failed to return from a trip into the mountains to hunt Christmas greens Dec. 7. It is believed their car plunged into the Columbia River.

The river yielded the bodies of the two youngest of the daughters in its spring freshet. It was their funeral that young Martin came home to attend, but he missed it because of a mixup on the date.

Martin said he could add nothing to what he had said previously of the disappearance and offered no theories.

"The only thing I'd like to say is thank you to the people who have helped in the search for all their work and all their help and prayers," Martin said.

Martin, staying with Mrs. Herschel A. Dorsey, said he will visit the empty home of his parents at 1715 NE 56th Ave. Mrs. Dorsey is his father's sister.

He also visited his grand-children, the Rev. and Mrs. E. R. Martin of Portland.

Martin said after his current Navy hitch he will re-enlist. He said he had no plans to return to Portland to live.

PROPOSES CANCER "CRASH"

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Steven V. Carter (D-Iowa) has proposed a 500 million dollar "crash program" to find the causes and cures of cancer, heart disease and other ailments. Carter, who has been treated for cancer himself, said an estimated 26 million persons now living in this country will die of that disease alone "if we do not push back the barriers of the unknown."

Oldest Conclave Delegate Tells Of Clubs' Purpose

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The hair is gray and bobbed. The eyes close frequently to rest.

But the words are sharp when you ask her: "What's the main value of the General Federation of Women's Clubs?"

"Arousing public opinion," said Anna Kelton Wiley, 82, of Washington, D.C.

"The federation helped create the Women's Army Corps. We've maintained a stand for reciprocal trade. We've worked for the Indians."

The federation, she said, helped her late husband, Dr. Harvey W. Wiley — first chief of the U.S. Bureau of Chemistry — get the Pure Food and Drug law through Congress in 1906.

Mrs. Wiley is perhaps the oldest delegate at the federation convention opening today — but one of the liveliest.

She planned to attend every one of the convention doings, ranging from a Hollywood banquet Monday night through a Lawrence Welk concert Wednesday, and daily business sessions winding up Friday. This is her 23rd convention.

She has been president or chair-

man of 12 organizations, chairman of Indian welfare and legislation for the general federation and still holds office in two groups.

She had been Dr. Wiley's secretary when they married — she at 33, he at 66. Chemist-physician Wiley was known as the only man ever to get a four-year degree from Harvard in six months.

"For 23 years, he struggled to get the pure food law passed," she recalled. "It was called the grease bill. Every time it came up they laughed at him."

"He said the federation of women's clubs was the predominant cause of getting the law enacted. On every congressman's desk was a pile of telegrams that high" — she indicated several inches.
