

Wilhelm Beats Sox, Gnats; Harvey Haddix Does "Better"

Hoyle Wilhelm and Don Mossi, a couple of relievers gone square, and Tom Sturdivant, an expendable world champion, are pitching the American League tony-turvy.

Wilhelm, the unbeaten right-hander who was waived out of the National League, was upset by a swarm of gnats but won his eighth in a row Tuesday night, hoisting Baltimore to second place with a 3-2 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

That left the stumbling White Sox in third and the Birds just a half-game shy of first place Cleveland, beaten 3-2 by Washington in 10 innings.

Mossi, the lefty who was washed up when Cleveland peddled him to Detroit last winter, beat New York for the third time this season, ending the Yankees' winning streak at four with a four-hit, 2-0 decision although the Tigers had only one hit for eight innings against three pitchers. It was the first shutout by Detroit's staff, and the seventh suffered by the Yankees.

Sturdivant, the big right-hander the Yankees traded to Kansas City last week, gained his first victory with 7 1/3 innings of four-hit shutout relief that beat Boston 5-3. That pushed the fourth-place A's within 2 1/2 games of the lead and also kept the Yankees, who skidded to seventh, from replicating Boston in the cellar.

In the National League, Milwaukee regained a 2 1/2-game lead over San Francisco as Bob Rush beat the Giants 3-0 with a five-hitter. Pittsburgh held third by beating St. Louis 3-0 behind Harvey Haddix's eight-hit pitching after the Cards had pocketed a 3-1 victory in the completion of a game suspended May 3. Cincinnati defeated Los Angeles 5-4. Chicago at Philadelphia was rained out.

Birds 3, Chi Sox 2

Wilhelm, 35, who has a nine-game streak in a carry-over from last season, found himself in the middle of the gnats in the first inning at Chicago after giving up a one-out walk. When all else — burning paper, towels and bug spray — failed, the gnats finally were chased by a firecracker bomb ordered exploded by White Sox president Bill Veeck.

The Bugs did upset Wilhelm enough to end his shutout string at 22 1/3 innings — the White Sox scored on their only other walk, a hit batter and an infield out after the 16-minute delay — but he came off a winner again with a seven-hitter.

The Orioles came from behind against lower Bob Shaw (4-2) on Billy Klaus' tying, two-run homer in the sixth, then won it in the ninth on consecutive singles by Willie Tasby, Gene Woodling and Gus Triandos.

2nd All-Star Game Set, Needs Blessing

The major league club owners have approved the players' request for a second All-Star game this season.

The game, which must receive the blessing of Commissioner Ford Frick to become official, will be played on Monday, August 3, at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

The players will receive 60 percent of the gate and radio-TV receipts, with the remainder going to the club owners, who would use the additional cash to aid youth baseball programs such as the Little League and Babe Ruth loop.

The players may possibly use their share of the cash to set up a pension plan for umpires and help former players not currently benefitted by the pension plan. The players' share of the first game, to be played in Pittsburgh July 7, goes into their pension fund.

Frick is expected to announce his decision next week after conferring with Presidents Warren Giles of the National League and Joe Cronin of the National.

It was Cronin who disclosed the owners' endorsement of the second All-Star game after two National League executives — President Bob Carpenter of the Philadelphia Phillies and Vice President Birdie Tebbetts of the Milwaukee Braves — said the owners had voted for it at a meeting in Columbus, Ohio, two weeks ago.

"The owners have authorized the second game at the players' request," said Cronin, "but as far as we have been informed no details have been worked out."

Giles said he expected to meet with Frick and Cronin in New York some time next week to iron out details.

Frick was not available for comment.

Carpenter appeared surprised at

the secrecy shrouding the second All-Star game.

"Why sure it's so," he said. "The whole thing was approved by all the owners in both major leagues a couple of weeks ago at the baseball meetings in Columbus. The only thing remaining now is to work out a radio and television deal."

It was not an unanimous vote. At least six clubs — Boston, Washington, Cleveland, Chicago and Kansas City in the American League and San Francisco in the National — are believed to be opposed to it. Three of the anti have said, however, they would go along with the majority.

One of the more vociferous objectors was Frank Lane, general manager of the Indians.

"Two All-Star games make as much sense as two Kentucky Derbies or two World Series," he said. "Personally I'm not in favor of it," said Bill Veck of the White Sox, "but I'll be guided by the majority."

"I still go along with one All-Star game," said Tom Yawkey of the Red Sox. "If we have two and each wins one, will we then have a third?"

"Two games are good," said Tebbetts. "The game in Los Angeles isn't going to hurt the game in Pittsburgh. And attendance-wise, it's great."

"We favor the playing of two All-Star games and will continue to do so until it can be shown that such procedure is contrary to the best interests of baseball," said Jim Keelly of Baltimore.

"We voted for it," said Bing Devine of St. Louis. "We see no reasons to kill the idea unless we try it."

"I can't see where it would detract from the national pastime," said Joe Brown of Pittsburgh. "It would be of added benefit to the players. We won't know the consequences unless we try it."

Champ Joe Brown Risks Crown Tonight
