

Seattle Sud Fireman Extinguishes Solons

A man who is credited with putting out almost as many conflagrations as the Seattle Fire Dept. was hard at work again Tuesday night.

Fireman Bill Kennedy, the old man of the Seattle pitching staff at 37, saved another Pacific Coast League game for the Rainiers in a relief role as the Suds dumped

the first-place Sacramento Solons 3-1.

The Solons, even with the loss maintained their two and a half game lead over the second-place San Diego Padres, who bowed 5-3 to the Portland Beavers.

In other league action, the Vancouver Mounties stung the Salt Lake City Bees 7-0 and the Phoenix Giants whipped the Spokane Indians 5-3.

Jay Hook, who had given up five hits through 8-2-3 innings, was the beneficiary of Kennedy's relief. Kennedy, a 6 foot 3 inch, 210-pounder, came in with two men on and two out and the count 3-0 on Sacramento's Clay Dalrymple.

Kennedy walked Dalrymple on a 3-2 pitch, then whiffed pinchhitter Cuno Barragan to save Hook's fifth victory in nine decisions. Seattle won it in the sixth with two runs on Elmer Valo's double and singles by Dee Fondy and Ed Winkler.

The third-place Beavers combed Bill Werle and Pete Wojey of the Padres for 12 hits, including Jim Greengrass' solo home run in the eighth. Steve Jankowski smashed out a two-run homer for the Padres in the sixth.

The Phoenix victory was somewhat of a birthday celebration for Benny Valenzuela, who turned 26, and the little third baseman had a lively night, belting out a solo homer and a double in four trips. Billy Wilson and Sal Taormina both got solo homers for Phoenix in the sixth.

The Mounties also got 12 hits in beating Salt Lake City, while Vancouver's Fred Besana was twirling a five-hitter. The big left-hander didn't give up a hit until Dick Barone beat out a bunt in the fifth frame. Joe Taylor got his 10th homer of the year, a two-run affair, in the third inning for the winners.

Seattle (AP) — University of Washington basketball coach William H. (Tippy) Dye was scheduled to arrive in Seattle Wednesday after being interviewed by University of Wichita officials who are searching for a Director of Athletics.

Dye met with Dr. Harry Corbin, president of the Missouri Valley Conference school, members of the athletic policy committee and the coaching staff Tuesday.

"He was getting acquainted with us and we were getting acquainted with him," a spokesman for the school said.

Wichita is seeking a successor to Robert Kirkpatrick, who has resigned effective July 1.

University of Washington officials said Dye was "shopping" for the job. Some time ago Dye said he hoped eventually to move into athletic administration. A year ago he was interviewed for athletic director at Iowa State.

Dye came to Washington in 1950. His teams have won two Pacific Coast Conference titles, one Western Regional NCAA title and placed third in the NCAA championships in 1953.

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Knuckler 'Chased' By Bugs

CHICAGO (AP) — Knuckleballer Hoyt Wilhelm finally has been chased from the mound—but it took a swarm of gnats to do it.

It happened in the first inning at Comiskey Park Tuesday night. After the bug battle on the mound delayed the game 16 minutes, Wilhelm returned to pitch Baltimore to a 3-2 victory over the Chicago White Sox and into second place.

The seven-hitter marked the eighth triumph without defeat for Wilhelm, 35, who had a 3-10 record last year and was picked up from Cleveland for the waiver price.

Wilhelm never will forget that first inning.

"It's the strangest thing that ever happened to me in a game," he said. "There was a cloud of gnats over the mound so thick that they were flying in my mouth. I never should have pitched a ball until they cleared away. But I went ahead and walked (Nellie) Fox. After I threw two balls to (Earl) Torgeson I had to quit—I was chased by the bugs."

What followed sent the 17,654 fans into hysterics.

Orlando Coach Al Vincent charged to the mound with a towel and tried to bash the insects away.

Sox bat boy Johnny Rosich rushed out with two bug bombs. He and Umpire Hank Soar began spraying the air.

Baltimore Trainer Eddie Weidner joined the battle, rubbing insecticide ointment over Wilhelm's face and arms while Soar sprayed his uniform with the bug bomb.

But the gnats kept dive bombing. The ground crew lit papers and went after the swarm of bugs like the charge of the Light Brigade. It didn't work.

Finally, Sox President Bill Veeck had a fireworks bomb placed on the mound. The explosion was deafening, the white smoke suffocating.

The gnats gave up. Apparently shaken by the battle, he walked Torgeson and hit Sherman Lollar with a pitch. With the bases filled, Larry Doby forced Lollar at second. Fox scoring on the play. It was the first run off Wilhelm in 22 1-3 innings.

"I was so good up with ointment and stuff, I had to keep using rosin and dirt on my hands to keep from losing the ball," he said.

After it was all over, Veeck laughed: "Since I probably will be accused of having something to do with those bugs, I might as well say now I have had them in a bottle and have been training them for several years for just such an occasion."

IOC Act Shameful, Says Dorn

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States should withdraw from the 1960 Olympic Games if the Nationalist Chinese are not allowed to compete, in the opinion of Rep. Francis E. Dorn (R-N.Y.).

Dorn's statement followed an accusation by the U.S. State Department Tuesday that the International Olympic Committee had bowed to "Communist pressures" in expelling Nationalist China from membership.

Dorn called the expulsion of Nationalist China "shameful," and that IOC President Avery Brundage of the United States should resign his position in protest.

"The United States must not allow a friend of many years to be pushed aside by Communist blackmail," said Dorn. "We must prove to all our Allies that the United States will support every one of our friends."

The State Department, in a formal statement read by Department Press Officer Lincoln White, declared, "It is evident that Communist pressures have been directed to obtaining the expulsion of the Chinese Nationalists."

The department said that it assumed the action was "a prelude to pressures directed to obtain the later readmission of the Chinese Communists."

Expulsion of the Nationalist Chinese from the IOC took place at the IOC meeting in Munich last Friday. The action had been requested by the Soviet Union and approved on the grounds that Nationalist China "no longer represents sports in the entire country of China."

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Babe Ruth Pitcher Spins 'No-No' Game

A trio of pitchers hogged the limelight in Babe Ruth action Tuesday night when a pair of games initiated Gem Stadium into the 1959 league season but one of the pitchers, Sherm Allen, of the M. L. Johnson squad outshone them all by twirling a five-inning no-hit, no-run game.

The sturdy righthanded KU freshman, who has spent most of his previous baseball career at shortstop, came within two batters of pitching a perfect game, only two of the 16 batters he faced having reached first, via walks. Neither of the two were allowed to reach second, however, as Allen struck out 12 and made one assist while his squad was beating Superior Troy, 4-0.

In the first game of the evening, Merrill, behind the one-hit pitching of Rich Carleton, disposed of the Henley Sporting Goods nine 10-0 in four innings; the game being terminated because of the 10-run margin rule.

In addition to his superb performance on the hill young Allen scored the first M. L. J. run as he smashed a long triple off ST twirler David Spencer in the third inning and then romped home when an error was made on the relay of the throw from center.

In the fifth inning Allen blasted a double that scored teammates, Bruce Campbell, centerfield, and first sacker Jim Jackson. Campbell had gotten on via an error while Jackson received one of the six walks given up by Spencer.

Spencer, in being charged with the loss, fanned 11, and, although he walked six batters, stayed out of trouble except for that caused by five miscues on the part of his support.

The only other hit of the game was collected by M. L. J. third baseman Ted Steiner, a sharp single in the first.

In Carleton's Merrill victory the ex-Husky hurler fanned nine Henley would-be hitters over the four inning distance, walked seven and allowed only one hit, a single by Henley second baseman Chuck Phillips in the first.

The loser was the Sporting Good nine's Mike Tacchini who was pulled in the fourth inning after hitting a batter, walking one and allowing a single off the bat of shortstop Larry Chance followed by a double by third baseman Ray Rankin. His successor, John Crumrine, who started behind the plate, gave up another single and three walks before retiring the side.

Merrill scored six runs in the inning, which, added to a pair in each the first and second stanzas was enough to call a halt to the game.

The big Merrill hitter was Rankin who collected a pair of doubles in three trips but the longest blow of the test was first baseman Ed Parnell's first inning two run triple.

The two Henley Sporting Good pitchers issued 10 free passes between them.
