

3-month Recovery Period Seen By Governor's MDs

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP) — Ailing Gov. Earl K. Long, though still can't be counted on of the Louisiana political po-pouri today.

Attending doctors at the John... daily Hospital here said the 63-year-old Long might recover, possibly, within a three-month period.

It was the first official speculation on how long the governor might be out of action.

Physicians added to the bright picture by reporting that Long had quieted down and his thinking and speaking were very clear.

At the same time, Mrs. W. M. Knott of Many, La., the governor's sister, indicated his inclination was to be in touch with the political scene in his state.

"He knows what should be done," said Mrs. Knott, who is visiting him regularly. "His friends are cooperating."

In the Louisiana capital city, Baton Rouge, legislators split in their camps of opinion on Long's political future.

But Rayburn, the administration Senate leader, was quick to add that he would step up only if Gov. Long was unable to return.

There was also reports that the governor's nephew, Sen. Russell Long (D-La.), wanted to succeed his uncle in office. But again, the feeling was the senator wouldn't be interested unless the governor was out of the picture.

Looters Chased By Troops During Ecuadorian Strife

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador (AP) — Machinegun fire cracked through this big port city in the early hours today, with troops chasing looters after two nights of rioting blamed by the government on Communists.

Civilians fought army forces in the streets again Wednesday night and set fire to a security police building before the crowd of 10,000 was dispersed. The renewed rioting grew out of funeral services for six of eight persons killed in clashes between troops and civilians Tuesday night.

Military authorities ordered a 10 p.m.-5 a.m. curfew for the city of 275,000, Ecuador's largest. President Camilo Ponce Enrich put the nation under martial law.

The Communist party openly challenged the martial law decree and appealed for "a great front of popular and democratic unity to prevent dictatorship."

The army general staff in taking over command of the country appealed to students and workers to remain calm and not be led astray by agitators.

The general staff said in a communique that it had proof of a "dangerous subversive plot that may threaten the very existence of the Ecuadorian nation." It blamed subversive elements, "some of them in the service of foreign interests."

Ranchers, U.S. Agencies Involved In Range Dispute

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Rangeland disputes, which provoked gun-fights in pioneer days, again are stirring Western ranchers.

In the past trouble stemmed from arguments between individual stockmen over range ownership and usage. Now the arguments involve ranchers and federal agencies.

The issue today is how many sheep and cattle will be permitted to graze on vast tracts of land which the federal government leases to ranchers.

When Dave Little took over his father's sprawling southwestern Idaho livestock operation in 1942, he grazed sheep on 18,000 acres of the Boise National Forest.

This year, the Forest Service announced it is cutting his allotment to 1,050 acres because the land is being overgrazed.

"That puts me out of the sheep business," Little told a reporter. The Emmett, Idaho, rancher is one of many stockmen who are up in arms about recent cuts in grazing allotments by the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

The federal agencies say the cuts are necessary for proper use of the land.

"Certainly grazing is a desirable thing, but we can't let one use destroy another," says Howard E. Ahlskog, supervisor of the Boise National Forest.

The Forest Service recognizes five uses of the forests — water, timber, grazing, recreation and wildlife. Stockmen say grazing is getting short shift from the Forest Service and in some cases from the BLM.
