Trips To Visit Prisoner Leads To Altar For Lawyer

LEAVENWORTH, Kan. (AP) — The first time lawyer Marjorie Sue King visited client Emory N. Brown in federal prison, an assistant warden told her: "There is no need for you to go see Emory Brown; there's nothing you can do for him now." "He was so wrong," said Miss King Wednesday.

That was after the 35-year-old Atlanta attorney had married ex-convict Brown, 38, at the home of a judge here. The romance began six years ago in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta. Brown was sentenced March 24, 1947 at Tampa, Fla., to 20 years in prison for bank robbery, five years for taking a stolen car across a state line and six months for contempt of court. All three charges grew out of the \$9,000 holdup of a bank at Lake Alfred, Fla., in 1945.

After pleading unsuccessfully to have the sentence set aside, Brown hired Miss King, a member of an Atlanta law firm. Miss King frequently visited Brown in the prison and they fell in love. In 1953, Brown was transferred to the federal prison here. He enrolled in a law course taught by Dist. Judge Joseph J. Dawes of Leavenworth.

Once he told the judge: "When I get out I'm going to get married. I would like you to perform the ceremony." Dawes agreed but he had forgotten until Monday when Brown and Miss King showed up at the courthouse a few hours after Brown's release from prison. The judge waived Kansas' three-

day waiting period and performed the wedding ceremony.

The bride's mother, Mrs. Ralph King, and one of her law partners, Marie Leachman, witnessed the wedding.

Thursday, the couple began a honeymoon trip in a new, expensive auto. It was the bride's wedding present to her husband.

Killer's Fate Up To Court

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The setting of a new execution date for Charles Starkweather, admitted slayer of 11 persons, rests today with the Nebraska State Supreme Court. The court was to be in session and Attorney General C. S. Beck planned to ask the seven judges to act swiftly in setting the new death date.

The doors of the federal courts slammed shut on Starkweather Thursday when three judges of the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals turned down his appeal for a hearing on his request for a writ of habeas corpus.

The federal judges also refused to extend a stay of execution granted Starkweather May 22 so that he might bring his application before the appeals court.

Starkweather heard the news of the action on a radio in his penitentiary cell. When Acting Warden John Greenholtz visited him shortly afterward, the condemned youth had nothing to say.

His father, Guy Starkweather, who was instrumental in winning the stay of execution, said he did not know what, if anything, might be attempted next in Charles' behalf.

He expressed interest at the suggestion that an application might be made to the Lancaster County District Court for a writ of habeas corpus.

The question, he said, was where he could find an attorney to handle the case. The attorneys who argued before the appeals court were prominent Omaha and Lincoln lawyers appointed by the court for that appearance only.

Starkweather was convicted of first degree murder in one of 11 slayings he has admitted. His partner on a murder tour in January, 1958, 15-year-old Caril Ann Fugate, is serving a life term for her part in the same slaying.

Orb's Fate Said Mystery

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Scientists may never learn what caused Discoverer III's failure to orbit. But the rocket-satellite apparently was burned up when it re-entered the atmosphere and the four mice aboard were cremated, the Air Force said Thursday.

The mice, carried in a capsule, were to have been the first creatures retrieved alive from orbit. The 78-foot projectile was launched Wednesday.

The Air Force said the missile, because of an unknown malfunction, re-entered the atmosphere several thousand miles from this West Coast missile base. The experiment was aimed at developing techniques man will use in space flight.

Negroes Rap Hilton Hotel

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Two Negro ministers have charged the Statler-Hilton Hotel here with refusing them rooms after first taking their reservations.

The Rev. J. Lowell Ware of Birmingham, Ala., and the Rev. C. H. Williams of Detroit, Mich., asked \$15,000 damages each in a suit filed here.

They say the hotel accepted their reservations for the June, 1957, National Baptist Convention here, then refused the rooms when the men appeared.

The ministers charge the hotel with breach of contract and assert they were inconvenienced by having to take rooms at Negro hotels eight miles from the convention site.

The hotel has not filed an answer.

X15 Glide Flight Scheduled Today

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — The Air Force hoped to launch the experimental X15 rocket plane on its first gliding flight today.

Test Pilot Scott Crossfield will be in the cockpit when the rocket plane — designed for altitudes up to 100 miles — is dropped loose from its mother B32 bomber at 38,000 feet.

The flight was scheduled for early morning. It was postponed from Thursday.

Convicts Foiled In Escape Try

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP) — Two convicts were foiled in their plot to escape from San Quentin Prison in the tank of a Napa State Hospital fire truck which was repaired here.

Associate Warden Louis Nelson said the plot was discovered Wednesday, just as the truck was to return to Napa. Tank cover bolts had been filed smooth, then replaced but held only by tape.

Inside the tank, 6 feet long, 4 wide and 2 deep, were clothing, a knife and two oranges. Nelson said Robert Logan, 26, Los Angeles robber, and Stan Kearney, 22, Riverside forger, admitted the plot.

Debbie Scoffs Wed Rumor

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Debbie Reynolds says she can't understand the fuss over a diamond brooch given her by a wealthy Texan.

"All this excitement is completely unnecessary," the actress told newsmen Thursday. "I'm not engaged or in love with anyone."

The actress returned Thursday from a 10-day trip to New York, where she plugged three movies and a new record album. She said Bob Neal, heir to a coffee fortune and a family friend for eight years, escorted her to plays while she was in New York.

In New York, Neal confirmed that the brooch was just a friendship token. He said he and Debbie never discussed an engagement or marriage.

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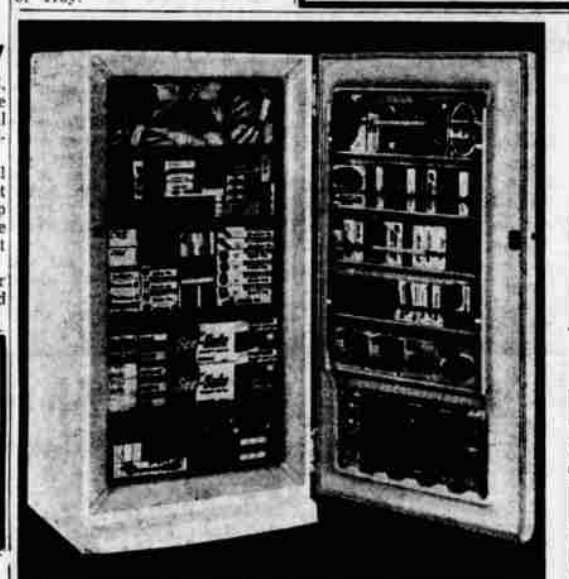


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
