White Sox Grab League Lead; Giants Narrow Brave Margin

Chicago Winner In 17th

"What we need," said Manager Al Lopez the other day in appraising his Chicago White Sox, "is a spurt. And we could get it with some big hits at the right time."

Al should have spoken up sooner. The White Sox have taken him at his word. They jumped past idle Cleveland into the American League lead by winning their second in a row Thursday, defeating Baltimore 6-5 in the majors' longest game of the season with the big hit at the right time—Earl Torgerson's two-out homer in the 17th inning.

It was their sixth victory in seven games, all being decided by one-run decisions. Both marks are tops in the AL.

While taking a half-game (.007 percentage points) lead over the Indians, the White Sox also shoved third place Baltimore 1½ games back. Fourth place Kansas City fell 2½ games behind when Boston ended the A's winning streak at five 5-2. The New York Yankees slipped Detroit to sixth by bombing the Tigers 14-3.

Chicago 6, Orioles 5
The White Sox did things the hard way, blowing a 2-0 lead, battling back for a 4-all tie on Larry Doby's single in the eighth, and then matching a 13th-inning Oriole run with Torgerson's single and one of five Oriole errors.

The Birds, helped along by three Sox boots, chased starter Dick Donovan with four hits and four runs in the third. But relievers Barry Latman, Gerry Staley, Rudolfo Arias and Turk Lown then blanked the Birds on two hits for the next nine innings. Bob Shaw (3-2) finally won it. Jerry Walker (4-2) was the loser.

Boston 5, KC 2
Gary Geiger drove in three runs for the Red Sox, one with his third homer. Jerry Casale (3-4) went all the way for Boston, giving up seven hits. Rip Coleman (1-4) lost.

Yanks 14, Tigers 3
The Yankees, who have won six of their last seven, made it two in a row over the Tigers. The Yankees smacked 15 hits, 10 for extra bases — seven doubles and home runs by Hector Lopez, Elston Howard and winning pitcher Whitey Ford. Jim Bunning (5-4) was a quick loser, trailing 7-1 when he left after three innings.

Orlando Powers 2 Homers

Say hey! Look at Orlando Cepeda muscling in on Willie Mays' racket!

The Giants' big first baseman has left Mays behind in home runs and RBI—and it all began after he was benched with a .287 average.

Since getting back into the starting line-up May 18, Cepeda has been hitless in only three of 18 games, smacking six homers, six doubles and two triples and driving in 23 runs. He's hit at a .427 clip in that span.

The 21-year-old Puerto Rican really went all out Thursday, driving in seven runs, five with his 11th and 12th homers, and powering the second place Giants from behind for an 11-5 victory over Milwaukee that cut the Braves' lead to 2½ games once again.

Both homers — the second a whale of a wallop estimated up to 500 feet — came off Lew Burdette, the lanky right-hander who hadn't lost to the Giants in five years.

The Giants pounded Burdette (8-4), and two relievers for 15 hits. Gordon Jones (3-2) worked one inning of relief for the victory, although Stu Miller blanked the Braves on three hits over the last five frames.

Pirates 9, Cards 3
A two-run triple by Bill Mazeroski clinched a three-game sweep for the Pirates as they scored four in the third inning against Ernie Broglio (0-4). Ron Kline (4-3) was the winner. Stan Musial of the Cards tied Honus Wagner's National League record with his 631st double.

Cincy 5, Dodgers 3
The Reds scored three runs in the first against southpaw Danny McDevitt (3-5), then put it away with a 4-0 lead on doubles by Johnny Temple and Vada Pinson in the second. Joe Nuxhall (3-3) finished with an eight-hitter.

Cubs 3, Phillies 2
A one-out triple by George Altman and Sammy Taylor's sacrifice fly won it for the Cubs against Gene Conley (2-3), who allowed only five hits. The Cubs were shut out on one hit until Taylor homered in the sixth. Walt Moryn added an inside-the-park homer in the eighth for a 2-all tie after the Phils, blanked on four hits for six frames, chased Bob Anderson in a two-run seventh. Don Elston (4-1) won it with 3 1-3 innings of hitless relief.

Klamath Oval Squad In Junior Olympics

A 23-man squad representing five Klamath County schools left this afternoon from the Modoc Field house for Grant High in Portland where they will compete in the Junior Olympic Track Meet Saturday, June 6.

The squad, divided into two classes, 14, 15 year olds and 16, 17 year olds, will compete with picked teams from all over Oregon.

Entrance of a squad representing all the Klamath County schools is a project of the Pelican Booster Club. KU track coach Jim Inglesby was the originator of the plan and director in charge of selecting the team. The Boosters hope to make the Junior Olympics participation an annual event and thereby restore track and field events to its one-time popularity among high school athletes.
