

# Medford Timber Firm To Finish Lumber Cutting

FORT KLAMATH—Three separate logging operations got underway this spring in the same area, on three U.S. Forest Service timber sales west of Fort Klamath. Now in its fifth consecutive year of logging on upper Three Mile Creek, the Burrill Lumber Company of Medford plans to finish cutting and hauling 27 million feet of pine and fir timber this season, with four million feet of timber left to complete the work. W. B. Crenshaw, Medford, is logging superintendent, and Byrd Weitman, also of Medford, is in charge of caterpillars and loading. The cut logs are loaded on trucks and transported to the Burrill Company mill at Medford.

Fall of 1958 saw the initial logging on the lower Three Mile Creek Forest Service timber sale by W. M. Haymond, logging contractor of Klamath Falls. The unit consists of 6,000,000 feet of pine and timber, and was acquired last year by the Ellingson Lumber Company of Klamath Falls. Jack Adams of Klamath Falls is logging superintendent, and expects that cutting and hauling the remaining half million feet of timber will be completed by fall. Cut logs are hauled by Raymond's trucks to the Ellingson sawmill at Pelican City.

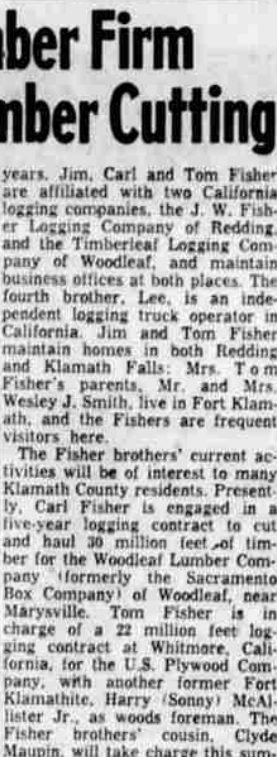
Work of building a four-mile long, 14-foot wide main access road to the Ellingson timber was contracted last year by the J. W. Fisher Logging Company of Redding with road foreman, Clyde Maupin, and a seven-man crew working on the project until halted by bad weather. The road work was started in the last week of October, 1958, and was discontinued on December 23, with one mile yet to be surfaced.

Maupin, who lives in Redding, came to Fort Klamath in mid-May with an assistant, Frederic R. Moller, whose home is at Strawberry Valley, near Oroville, California. The four-mile road contract called for building and surfacing three miles, the remaining mile of dirt road not requiring surfacing with cinders. One large main 36-inch culvert and six smaller ones were installed last year, and on finishing the one mile surface job on May 27, Maupin said there was yet some blademwork to be done. By mutual agreement, Raymond and Maupin have arranged to have the work done by Jack Adams, with the J. W. Fisher Logging Company and W. R. Raymond to share cost of the four days work. Following inspection and approval of the main access road by Robert N. Latzy, forest service timber sales administration officer of Fort Klamath, Maupin and Moller left Thursday, May 28, for their homes in California.

The four Fisher brothers are well known in Klamath County logging circles, and in the Fort Klamath area, where they have had several logging contracts in past years. Jim, Carl and Tom Fisher are affiliated with two California logging companies, the J. W. Fisher Logging Company of Redding, and the Timberleaf Logging Company of Woodleaf, and maintain business offices at both places. The fourth brother, Lee, is an independent logging truck operator in California. Jim and Tom Fisher maintain homes in both Redding and Klamath Falls. Mrs. Tom Fisher's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wesley J. Smith, live in Fort Klamath, and the Fishers are frequent visitors here.

The Fisher brothers' current activities will be of interest to many Klamath County residents. Presently, Carl Fisher is engaged in a five-year logging contract to cut and haul 30 million feet of timber for the Woodleaf Lumber Company (formerly the Sacramento Box Company) of Woodleaf, near Marysville. Tom Fisher is in charge of a 22 million feet logging contract at Whitmore, California, for the U.S. Plywood Company, with another former Fort Klamathite, Harry (Sonny) McAllister Jr., as woods foreman. The Fisher brothers' cousin, Clyde Maupin, will take charge this summer of a five-million feet contract, site of logging operations located 40 miles west of Redding, near Douglas Lake, for the Nettleton Lumber Company, Redding.

The third logging operation in the Fort Klamath vicinity started this spring, when Francis D. Brown and Son, Inc., started work on the Nannie Creek U.S. Forest Service sale of 2 1/2 million feet of pine and fir timber, including Francis D. Brown and his son, Daniel G. Brown, a crew of 25 men started in the woods operation in mid-May, which receives an oldtime method of logging. The trees are cut and hauled by truck a distance of five miles and unloaded into Crystal Creek; then they are rafted and towed by a 40 horsepower diesel tugboat via Klamath Lake to the Klamath Lumber and Box Company and the Diamond Lake Lumber Company in Klamath Falls.

# Extradition Requested

SALEM (AP)—Acting Gov. Walter J. Pearson asked the governor of Wyoming Thursday to extradite Richard Allen Hunt to face trial for shooting an Oregon police chief.

Hunt, 27, was on the FBI's 10 most wanted list when he was arrested Tuesday on an isolated ranch near Thermopolis, Wyo., where he was working as a cowboy.

He is charged with kidnaping Police Chief Ernest McPhee of Harrisburg, who tried to question him about an automobile. McPhee later was released unharmed near Brownsville.

Hunt also is charged with the shooting of Chief Robert Kennow of Brownsville, who sought to purchase him when he fled through that mid-Willamette Valley community.

The extradition requests that Hunt be delivered to Sheriff George K. Miller of Linn County.

# Weed Control Program Slated

TULELAKE—Residents living in the Modoc Weed and Pest Abatement District, can make application for weed control on their ranches at the Tulelake Growers office.

The railroads are cooperating in the weed eradication program by spraying their right-of-ways; and the Modoc Road Department and Siskiyou Road Department are spraying the road right-of-ways.

Growers must give the location and type of weeds to the office, and stake the spots to be sprayed.

# Steel Union Tells Policy

NEW YORK (AP)—The executive board of the United Steelworkers of America says the policy of the union is to be "flexible and reasonable" in contract negotiations in the basic steel industry.

The union's goal is a "fair, equitable and honorable settlement" before the industry contract expires June 30, the 33-member board declares.

The union's position was stated in a resolution adopted unanimously at a special meeting of the board Thursday.

"There is still time to negotiate a fair settlement," a union statement said.

Negotiations are continuing here. Failure to agree on a new contract by the June 30 deadline would almost certainly bring a strike by 500,000 union members.

Industry leaders said privately that the union's emphasis on reasonableness was at odds with its demands, which they called "Astronomic."

R. Conrad Cooper, chief industry negotiator and executive vice president of the United States Steel Corp., issued a statement denying that the companies might make a last-minute pay increase offer to prevent a strike.

# Board Of Health Plans Program

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Board of Health will launch next month a pilot program to test the hearing of pre-school age children.

The board said tests will be made in eight counties—Clatsop, Wasco, Jefferson, Deschutes, Crook, Sherman, Umatilla and Baker.

The purpose of the program is to discover hearing defects so they can be treated before children enter school.

"The first five years of life are considered to be the most important years in the development of speech and language," the board said. "Children with serious hearing losses or who lose their hearing very early in infancy are often retarded in their ability to communicate with others."

# China Group Urged By Solon

WASHINGTON (AP)—A proposal that a 30- to 50-member trade commission go to Red China to look into trade possibilities came Thursday from Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore).

He said he told the House this country would be foolish to pretend Red China does not exist.

"Communist China is a reality and will be a potent economic, political and military force for a long time to come," Porter told the House.

He emphasized that trade does not mean recognition. While the United States continues an embargo against Chinese trade, other nations including the Western allies have profitable two-way dealings with Red China, he added.
