Delbert Pilliard was born in Auburn, California, attending schools there and graduated in 1934. His ambition was to study law, but as it was when the depression was at its height, he was unable to continue his schooling. So, for four years he worked and attended business college. He worked mainly as a heavy equipment operator.

In 1934 he went to Sacramento where he was affiliated with the Farm Credit Association, traveling to Bakersfield and Chico until 1949. In that year, he first joined with the Crocker Anglo Bank at Red Bluff, as assistant vice president, and in 1952 he was promoted to his present status of vice president.

In 1955 he was transferred to Stockton where he started the first office of Crocker Anglo, and in September, 1955, he left the bank and went into a large cattle and farming operation near Chico.

In February, 1957, he rejoined the bank, coming to Yreka as manager of the Crocker Anglo Branch. Pilliard who is a strong believer in working and helping out in community and civic affairs, tells that one achievement that he had a part in and that gives him the "happiest and most gratifying satisfaction" was back in 1950, when he was named as general chairman of a committee to raise \$110,000 to construct a wing on the St. Elizabeth Hospital in Red Bluff. This project lasted three years, and his greatest inspiration during that trying time, for at times it seemed as though he and his committee would fail, was derived from one of the sisters at the hospital. He said that they would call on her, utterly discouraged, and five minutes after being with her, all were fired with a new zest and enthusiasm, and they would start out again. The proudest moment came when the wing was completed, and dedicated in 1953.

Del is a past president of the Chico Kiwanis, past president of the Chico Kiwanis, and past lieutenant governor for Kiwanis from Marysville to the Oregon line.

He will be officially installed as president of the Yreka Chamber of Commerce on June 11, and the evening prior, June 10, he will be installed as first vice president of the Yreka Lions Club.

His hobbies are fishing and hunting. He also likes to get out on a Sunday and herd cattle with his many farmer friends.

Pilliard married his wife, Anna, on July 11, 1937, and they have two daughters, Delanne, 17, and Elizabeth, 15. Delanne's name is a composite of his and his wife's name. She was graduated from Yreka High School on June 4.

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—The old adage "the show must go on" took a back seat to graduation exercises Wednesday night.

Ethel Merman, star of the current Broadway hit musical "Gypsy," closed the show for one night and flew here to see her daughter, Ethel, 16, receive her diploma from suburban Cherry Creek High School.

Paper Firm Plans Plants

LONGVIEW — First phases of construction of new plywood and lumber mill plants of the Long-Bell Division of International Paper Company are scheduled to begin within the next week or 10 days, it was reported today.

The new manufacturing plants will be in the Chelatchie, Washington area. Plans for the new plants were announced in March.

At that time, J. D. Leland, IP vice president in charge of Long-Bell Division's West Coast operations, announced that operation of the company's sawmill and plywood plant in Longview would eventually be discontinued, but that the company's other operations in Longview will continue on the present basis. These include a wood-working factory, wood-treating plant, research and development laboratory, and division offices.

Phone Employee Attending School

R. L. Steele, line assigner for Pacific Telephone, has been attending special training classes in Portland on advanced line assigning, according to Manager T. W. Cole.

The classes extend over a 40-hour period, and cover technical problems relating to telephone service. Power supplies for PBX customers, requirements for special service lines and special rearrangements of telephone lines for better usage are just a few of the items covered in the week-long session.

Water Works Grant Okayed

The federal House Appropriations Committee approved a grant of \$522,000 Tuesday for construction of water works in the Klamath Bureau of Reclamation Project next fiscal year.

The money eventually will benefit about 150 farmers who lease tracts annually from the Bureau of Reclamation in Sumps 2 and 3 a few miles south of Tulelake.

Donald Gray, project manager, said the money will be used for improving irrigation and drainage in the land reclaimed from the Tule Lake bed.

Construction will begin probably late in July on a plant to drain water from Sump 2 and on irrigation canals and lateral canals in the sump. Remaining funds will finance preliminary studies and surveying of proposed additions to water works in Sump 3.

The project will require several years to complete in both sumps. The tracts measure about 16,000 acres. They are planted primarily in grain. New facilities will make crop diversification possible.
