

# Powerful Champs May Get Last Laugh; Newcombe Holds Giants, Earns Victory

## Yankees Roaring, Climbing

The joke was good while it lasted, but it's the New York Yankees, no longer the stumbling, cellar-dwelling world champions, who are having the laugh now.

Laugh? They're roaring, so to speak, and the rest of the American League is discovering it was a mistake not to throw dirt in on the champs when they had 'em in a hole.

Nobody spurted while the Yankees sputtered (except for Detroit's Tigers, and they were in the same fix as New York). Now, after winning eight of their last 10 games, the champs have shot within 4½ games of the top.

They nailed their third straight Friday night with a rollicking, 11-1 romp at Cleveland as the Indians dropped their sixth straight.

The Injuns, led the league by two games when the skid started. Now they're 1½ games behind Chicago's leading White Sox, who defeated Boston 5-2, and are in a virtual tie for second with the Baltimore Orioles, who won 6-1 at Kansas City.

Detroit took fifth place from Washington by beating the Senators 7-6, skidding the Nats to seventh as the Yankees muscled into sixth in the jam-packed run on the leaders.

The Yankees swung for 17 hits six for extra bases, against loser Gary Bell (4-5) and three relievers. Gil McDougald hit his first home run of the season and Elston Howard his seventh.

a. Bell is automatically entitled to three bases?

b. He should get two bases?

c. He is out?

Answer: C—Bell is out. The batter is entitled to three bases only if he has touched the base.

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## Big Don's Revival Seems Set

Big Don Newcombe, once the best pitcher in baseball, finally is on his way back.

It was Newk who won the first Cy Young Award and the National League's Most Valuable Player Award with 27 victories in 1956 for Brooklyn's last pennant-winning club. But the last two years, and the start of this season, were nightmares for the proud right-hander.

He had only an 11-12 record in 1957. Last year it was worse, 7-13 at the end of a season in which he had been traded by the Los Angeles Dodgers to Cincinnati.

This spring, after he finally admitted he had been bothered by arm and shoulder trouble, it looked like more of the same. He lost his first three straight. Newcombe's won four straight, putting away a 5-4 record Friday night by checking San Francisco's slugging Giants 7-2 on three hits.

### Dodgers 5, Braves 1

The defeat left the second-place Giants 2½ games behind Milwaukee, beaten 5-1 by Dodgers. The Chicago Cubs beat Pittsburgh's third-place Pirates, who had won six straight, 10-5. The St. Louis Cardinals won 4-1 at Philadelphia.

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox took a 1½ game edge by beating Boston 5-2, after the New York Yankees handed second-place Cleveland a sixth straight defeat 11-2. Baltimore gained a virtual tie with Cleveland by beating Washington 7-6.

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's season on buck deer will extend from Oct. 3-25, final game regulations for this year's big game season announced Friday by the state Game Commission.

The regulations, following generally tentative rules announced previously, marked the opening of the general elk season in all areas at Oct. 31.

The elk season will close in the north and south coastal areas Nov. 11 and in the Cascades, the Northwestern and the Southeastern sections Nov. 22.

The antelope season will run from Aug. 15-19 and the archers' season will run from Sept. 5-27.

## Race Car Injures 22 Fans

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. (AP)—A race car smashed into the bleachers, injuring 22 persons among a crowd of 500 at a small dirt track Friday night. The accident occurred during the first race on the program, for a purse of \$10.

One of those injured seriously was Ronnie Lee Neidel, 8, son of the wrecked car's driver, Albert M. (Bud) Neidel, 30, St. Joseph. The father suffered a bruised shoulder and shock. Of the 22 injured, 21 were hospitalized. Many were children.

Neidel's modified stock car and one driven by Jerry Hayes, Topeka, Kan., sideswiped on a turn of the quarter-mile Beverly Speedway while doing about 70 miles an hour.

Neidel's car shot off the banked turn, over an eight-foot embankment and fence. It did a half-flip in the air and smashed into the bleachers upside down.

The car slid along the bottom row of seats, sweeping spectators before it. It hurtled across a space between bleacher sections and crashed to a halt against the next section.

Screams of the injured added to the panic. Frantic parents sought their children, many of whom were sitting on the bottom rows of the bleachers.

Ambulances shuttled the injured to hospitals. The track is about half a mile outside the city along U.S. 169 and police had to struggle to keep the road open as motorists swarmed to the scene.

Extra doctors and nurses were called in to help at Sisters Hospital and Missouri Methodist Hospital.

The track owner, Ardale Chambers, was out of town. His wife said the track carried insurance only on race drivers, none on spectators.

### Al Cantello Tosses Spear For Record

COMPTON, Calif. (AP)—Unheralded Al Cantello of the U.S. Marine Corps bettered the world record in the javelin throw Friday night at the 20th annual Compton Invitational Relays.

Cantello threw the spear 282-¾ inches. The mark surpassed the recognized world record of 281-2½ set in the 1956 Olympics by Egil Danielsen of Norway.

The javelin was weighed and found to be regulation. But it was impounded for a still further weighing before an application for recognition is filed.

The Texas quartet of Wally Wilson, Drew Dunlap, Hollis Gainey and Eddie Southern swept the mile relay in 3:08.7, breaking the intercollegiate mark of 3:09.1 set by a Texas team last year.

In the 440-yard dash, a world record was hoped for from record holder Glenn Davis of the Ohio Track Club. The record is 54.7. Instead, Mike Larrabee of the Southern California Striders won in 46.1, and Davis ran fourth, unofficially in 46.5. Sandwiched in between were Chuck Carlson of Colorado and Eddie Southern, Colorado at 46.3 and 46.4.

World record holders Parry O'Brien won the shot put with 62 feet 7 inches, and another record maker, Bob Gutowski, took the pole vault at 15 feet 3¼ inches.

Cantello, a lieutenant from Norristown, Tenn., stationed at Quantico, Va., was a stranger to most fans on hand. His best previous javelin throw was a modest 249-3¼. He's 28, 5-7½ and weighs 163 pounds.

## Calhoun, Tiger May Go Again

NEW YORK (AP)—On the theory that one good fight deserves another, Dick Tiger and Rory Calhoun probably will do it again, July 16 at Syracuse, N.Y.

Calhoun closed strong to get a draw with the British Empire middleweight champion Friday night at Madison Square Garden.

By winning the tenth round on all three official scorecards, Calhoun escaped defeat.

Referee Mark Conn had it 5-3 in both rounds and points. Judge Bill Reicht had Tiger a 6-3-1 winner and Judge Bill Forst thought Calhoun deserved an edge 5-4-1.

The AP cards were 5-3 with Tiger the winner 6-5 on points because of a decisive edge in the fourth.

"I thought I won," said Tiger, a Nigerian whose British title, of course, was not at stake. "I will be better next time. I came here expecting tough fights. I welcome them."

Calhoun, 163½, likewise thought he won. His manager, Frank Bachman, said Tiger hit on the break which the new comer claimed is legal in England. Tiger complained about Calhoun's low blows which drew a warning from Conn in the ninth.

Tiger, 163½, has been in America only 12 days. The Tiger's real name, incidentally, is Thetu (pronounced l-hate-you).

Teddy Brenner, Garden Matchmaker, said Tiger and the White Plains, N.Y. scrapper might fit into a July 16 date at Syracuse. However, it isn't definite yet.

## Fresno State Edges Huskies

SEATTLE (AP)—Fresno State College edged Washington's Huskies, 3-2, Friday night to take the first game of the best-of-three NCAA District 8 baseball playoffs here.

Fresno State, designated the hometown by a flip of a coin, won it in the last of the ninth when Leroy Gregory slashed a punch single to drive in one of two men who had walked.

Washington left-hander Daryl Burke had held Fresno State hitless after the second inning, but lost control in the ninth and walked the first two batters.

They were sacrificed along by Jerry White, who was safe on a bad throw to first. Augie Garrido was thrown out at home in an attempted steal from third.

Burke was then relieved and Gregory came in for Fresno State. He fouled off several pitches before getting the game-winning single.

Fresno State had scored first in the game when catcher Jim Garrett drove in two runs with a double in the second frame.

Jerry Thornton got both of Washington's runs. He scored in the sixth when he reached first on an error, was advanced to third with a walk and a sacrifice and came home on an infield out.

Thornton scored the tying run in the eighth, again on an infield out.

The second game of the series was scheduled for Saturday afternoon, with a third game following immediately if necessary.
