An obviously oversized set of bats produced five triples, a double and an out-of-the-park home run to aid the Weed Soss to a 16-9 triumph over the Klamath Kubs in a Northern California League baseball game in Gem Stadium Sunday.

The loss, the second in two starts for the Kubs, plummeted them into the Nor-Cal basement while the victory gave the Soss a 1-1 record to date. Other league action saw the Scott Valley Stars nip the Yreka Indians, 2-1 in a ten inning thriller at SV.

As a prelude to the Kubs-Weed conflict, the "Elbow Benders" of coach Bill Burke and the "Old-timers," led by Harry Peltz, battled through a "titanic" two inning struggle, the score 3-3.

Dunsmuir moved into the league lead by edging Mount Shasta 4-3 in a game played at Mount Shasta.

SV Stars Nip Yreka In 10th

SCOTT VALLEY — Glenn Storti of Scott Valley and Fred Rick of Yreka, a pair of stout-hearted right-handers, locked horns in a tight pitching duel here Sunday afternoon in a Northern California League contest. The Stars finally emerging the victors by scoring a lone unearned run in the bottom of the tenth inning.

Both hurlers went the entire distance, yielding two bases on balls apiece while striking out 11 batters each.

The winning run off loser Rick resulted when pinchhitter Glen Denning, who singled after one out, went to third on three Indian errors on a single play, and scored when Dick Fisher reached out across the plate as Rick attempted an intentional pass, and poked the ball down the third base line, catching the entire Yreka infield off balance.

The Kubs, making their first start before home town fans, jumped off to a 1-run first inning lead then stretched it to 6-1 in the second stanza before the Weed cutting power broke loose.

Weed shortstop Ronny Hilliard, centerfielder Jeff Smith and winning pitcher Norm Swan were the big guns of the day, proving extra-base knocks accounting for three RBIs apiece.

Hilliard singled in the third, smashed a four master in the fourth that cleared the left-center wall by 20 feet and poled a rebounding triple in the seventh.

Smith tripled in the second and again in the seventh while Swan doubled in three runs in the big Weed third frame.

Kubs Bob Lawery, relief pitcher for starter Mike Dolan, centerfielder Floyd Linderman and catcher Rube Johnson each collected a pair of singles while shortstop-hunter Ron Owens blasted the only KF extra-base rap of the day, a double in the sixth.

Credited with the win for the Soss was Swan, although he was relieved in the fourth inning in favor of ex-high school chucker Dave Lemos who finished up.

The loser, Dolan, was also benched in the fourth when Lawery moved in from left field to take over.

Three consecutive raps in the first off the bats of Lawery, Linderman and Johnson gave the Kubs their first marker. In the second they collected five more runs off three walks, a hit batter and singles by Johnson and Dean Dunson. Dunson's hit was a successful pinch hit down between pitcher and third base.

The Kubs managed one run in each the fourth, sixth and ninth frames but a three run sixth inning and four run outburst in the seventh had put the Weed club way out of danger.

The victory gave the Merchants a 2-0 record for early season play while Mount Shasta has won one and lost one.

Winning pitcher Ronnie Curtis set up the victory in the seventh inning when he blasted a triple then scored on a pass ball.

After a refused protest on the play, Joe Fidler singled then scattered home with the winning marker when catcher Marvin Cartwright followed up with another one-base blast.

The loser was Mount Shasta's Dave Ferretto. Both Ferretto and Curtis went the full nine innings.

Dunsmuir will meet the Yreka Indians in a practice game held under the lights in Dunsmuir Thursday night.

Next Sunday the Merchants travel to Klamath Falls for a test with the Kubs while Mount Shasta plays host to the Scott Valley Stars.

Shotput Ace NW Standout

SIoux Falls, S. D. (AP) — Warren Lashua of Whitworth, placing second in the shotput, was the Northwest's outstanding entrant Saturday in the annual NAIA track meet.

Winston-Salem won the meet with 36 points as Elias Gilbert scored a triple victory in the hurdles. He won the highs, the lows and the 440 hurdles.

Humboldt State of California was sixth with 23 1/2 points. Idaho State 11th with 14 and Whitworth 12th with 13 1/2. No other Northwest school scored more than 10 points.

In addition to Lashua, Northwesters who placed included: Gary Fuller, Eastern Washington, 4th in high hurdles; Charles Carpenter, Eastern, 5th in mile; Lynn Romagosa, Lewis and Clark, 4th in 440 hurdles; Sam Guley, Whitworth, and Jim Douglas, Seattle Pacific, among five tied for 6th in high jump; Hiram Crane, Linfield, 4th and Darrell Pearson, Western Washington, 6th in javelin; Don Neu, Willamette, tie for 3th in pole vault.

Wilhelm's 9-0 record and astounding 0.99 earned run average speak for themselves and manager Paul Richards insist the Orioles' second-place standing ought to do the same.

"We can go all the way," Richards has been preaching since the start of the season. "We'll go as far as our pitching will take us."

Well, Sunday Wilhelm's pitching took the Orioles into second place via a 3-0 victory over the Kansas City Athletics. The erstwhile ragamuffins of the league are only one game behind the first-place Chicago White Sox and are a half-game ahead of the third-place Cleveland Indians both of whom split their Sunday doubleheaders.

The White Sox scored a 9-4 victory in their opener but lost the nightcap to the Boston Red Sox, 4-2 and the Yankees bounced back from a 7-5 setback to beat the Indians, 4-3, before 39,823 at Cleveland. The Detroit Tigers made it 23 out of 33 under Jimmy Dykes with a 6-4 win over the Washington Senators.

In the National League, the Milwaukee Braves increased their first-place margin to two games by beating the Los Angeles Dodgers, 8-2. The Chicago Cubs beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-2 and 1-0, the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Philadelphia Phillies, 2-0, after an 11-0 defeat and the Cincinnati Reds defeated the San Francisco Giants, 7-1, after a 3-3 setback.

Cubs 4-1, Bucs 2-0

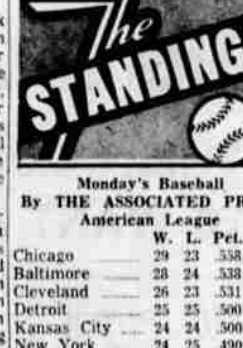
