Investigators Probe Mishap

McCRAE, Ga. (AP)—Who took the lock off the switch that caused derailment of a freight train and dumped two car loads of dangerous chlorine gas in this southeast Georgia community? Investigators were trying to answer that question today as wrecking crews completed removal of the debris.

The tank cars containing 16,000 gallons of gas were placed on flat cars and carried out of the area. Residents breathed easier for the first time since Sunday night.

D. D. Strench, division superintendent of the Southern Railway in Atlanta, said the wreck "apparently was caused by someone tampering with the switch at a main line and an auxiliary track."

Officials found a lock which kept unauthorized persons from tampering with the switch lying beside the switch.

The tank cars containing the gas and 17 loaded with pulpwood tumbled off the tracks and ended in a tangled heap of metal and wood. A warehouse was damaged.
