**WALL STREET** — The stock market closed sharply lower today. Selling snowballed in the final half hour in heavy trading. Volume for the day was estimated at 2,600,000 shares compared with 2,500,000 on Friday. Pivotal issues were down from fractions to about 2 points. Numerous stocks were unchanged and there were scattered gainers. Tobacco continued their retreat on further warnings about cigarette smoking. Liggett & Myers was down about 2. Losses of more than a point were shown by American Tobacco, Lorillard and Reynolds. Union Carbide and Du Pont were 2-point losers. Allied Chemical held a small gain. American Cyanamid was off about a point. Zenith dropped half a dozen points. Garrett Corp. was up more than 2. North American Aviation rose more than 2 and Foster-Wheeler dropped about 6 following news North American had given up plans to acquire Foster-Wheeler.

**YREKA**—Klamath Forest Supervisor Charles A. Yates has announced that notice has been mailed to prospective timber sale bidders listing those 1959 sales which will be "set-aside sales." Proposed Water Program Faces Severe Test Today

**SACRAMENTO (UPI) —** Gov. Edmund G. Brown's proposed water program faced a severe test today from both north and south. The governor's bill, which would put the state in the water business backed by a \$1,750,000,000 bond issue, went before the Assembly Water Committee for a crucial hearing. Assemblyman Carley V. Porter (D-Compton), chairman of the committee, admitted half in jest and half seriously that almost every one of the 80 lower house members had amendments and changes to propose to the measure. Porter conceded that if any amendments are adopted to the bill which would weaken the guarantees northern senators wrote into the bill earlier in the session, it will face tough going when and if it goes back to the Senate for ratification. One Senate leader, who asked that he not be quoted by name, said that the governor's bill "will go down the drain" in the Senate if southern assemblymen try to weaken protection the north insists it must have. What is at stake is the north's demands that if it is going to export surplus water to the south it should have binding guarantees that it always will have the water it needs for its ultimate development or in time of drought. The south, on the other hand, is reluctant to vote for a water program unless it is assured that it has firm guarantees it will get water from the Feather River Project and that the north will not "turn off the faucet." Brown repeatedly has insisted that his bill, SB1106 by Sen. Hugh M. Burns (D-Fresno), is fair to both north and south and offers both sections of the state adequate guarantees. Among probable amendments to be offered before the Water Committee are proposals to write a 160-acre limitation, a public power preference, a further guarantee that the watershed protection act will be applied to the water program, and some southern efforts to nullify or at least weaken some of the policies written into the bill by northern senators. Porter, who has agreed to carry the bill for the governor on the Assembly side, said he personally believed the bill is in good shape in its present form and that he does not favor any amendments. Other developments in the Legislature: By a vote of 56-11, the Assembly approved and sent to the Senate a bill backed by Brown, which would permit the Highway Patrol to use electronic devices to catch speeders. Assemblyman William Biddick Jr. (D-Stockton) said it was time to stop playing cops and robbers with speeders on the highways and use effective radar devices to apprehend them. Narcotics: The lower house approved and sent to the Senate on a roll call of 53-22 a bill which increases the severity of penalties against narcotics violators. Main feature of the bill, backed by Elks clubs all over the state, is to repeal the present minimum sentence for a narcotics offense of up to one year in county jail and substitute a 5-to-life penalty although first offenders still could get probation. Taxation: The Assembly voted 42-18 in favor of a bill to give county supervisors authority over determining freeway routes and sent the measure to the Senate. The bill by Charles W. Meyers (D-San Francisco) provides the Department of Public Works could not acquire property for a freeway unless supervisors approved the route. Taxes: The administration decided to adopt an all or nothing approach in the Senate and hold a hearing in Senate Finance Committee Thursday on the governor's bills to raise taxes on banks and corporations, horse racing bettors, beer drinkers and heirs. Compensation: The Senate gave final approval and sent to the governor a bill agreed upon by management and labor lobbyists to increase benefits for temporary and permanent disability. Maximum temporary disability benefits under the bill would be increased from \$50 to \$65 a week and for permanent disability it would go from \$40 to \$52.50 a week. Death and burial benefits also would be increased under the program which is financed by employer contributions. Obscenity: The Assembly refused to revive a bill by Assemblyman Louis Francis (R-San Mateo) to write a new and stricter law controlling obscenity and pornography. The bill was killed earlier in the session by the lower house Criminal Procedure Committee. Car lots: The Assembly voted 32-23 in favor of a bill to close new and used car lots on Sundays and sent the bill to the Senate.
