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2 Plywood Firms Slate Cutback

PORTLAND (AP)—Two more major plywood producers have announced production cutbacks. U.S. Plywood Corp. said it would drop production to 85 per cent of capacity at Eugene, Roseburg, Willamina and Mapleton.

Carolina-Pacific Plywood Co. said it would shut down its White City plant near Medford from June 19 to 29 and its Grants Pass plant, operated by a subsidiary, Custom Plywood, June 26 to July 6.

Most other major plywood producers in the Pacific Northwest last week cut back production even more.

All said that demand was not keeping up with production.

Dip Reported In Union Dues

NEW YORK (AP)—David J. McDonald, president of the United Steelworkers of America, reports that the union's dues payments under the checkoff system are 300,000 under the 1,250,000 peak.

Dues payments went down from 1,000,000 in April to 950,000 last month, he said.

He said he did not see anything significant in this month-to-month fluctuation. Layoffs of local strikes affect the dues total in any month.

McDonald made the report Monday in rebuttal to the steel industry's recent publication of job figures intended to show that total employment in April was almost back to normal.

McDonald's report was issued as contract negotiations in the basic steel industry continued here.

The talks, which have been held off and on since May 5, continue today.

No break in the deadlock over contract terms was indicated after Monday's session of four-man teams representing the union and the 12 largest steel companies.

The union has demanded a substantial increase in wages, a cut in the 40-hour work week and other benefits. Basic wages now average \$3.03 an hour.

House Okays Korea Taxes

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House has voted again for continuing corporate and excise tax rates that were set during the Korean War as a temporary measure.

The one-year extension, passed by voice vote Monday, now goes to the Senate which is expected to pass it with little controversy.

It was the sixth time the House has voted for an extension since 1951, when the regular tax rates were increased.

Unless the bill is passed, corporate income tax rates automatically will drop from 52 per cent to 47 per cent on July 1 and excise tax rates will be reduced on cigarettes, whisky, beer, wine and new cars and parts.

The lower rates would yield about three billion dollars less a year.

Firemen Quell Port Blaze

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (AP)—A riverfront disaster on the southern fringe of this city was averted Monday night as firemen repelled flames before they reached two liquefied gas tanks and four gasoline trucks.

Firemen from East St. Louis and four nearby communities brought the flames under control 2½ hours after the fire started in a wrecking company yard.

The flames reached the MacArthur Bridge, 80 feet above the yard, filled with old timber and plumbing fixtures. Underpinning of the bridge was damaged and the bridge was closed.

"If those tanks and gasoline trucks had blown it would have torn up a chunk of ground a mile wide," said East St. Louis Asst. Fire Chief William Eckles.
