

Crowning Of Rose Queen To Take Place In Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—This city tonight crowns the 1959 Rose Festival queen at ceremonies in the Civic Auditorium.

Likenesses 33 times as big as the natural faces of the 11 princesses will be flashed in full color on a huge screen.

Color moving pictures of the 11 teen-age ladies, one of whom will be queen, also will be presented to aid the judges.

Oregon, from its vivid flowers to Mt. Hood, is in the background of the films.

The 2½-minute sequence on each girl will be presented just before she appears in a pink dress and with a rose corsage.

The festival was greeted Tuesday night with a rush of merriment emanating from the Merry-

khana Parade through the downtown area.

Smoke puffed as shots exploded and some spectators bowed before spraying water from the gala floats. It was a fight-back parade of gags and demonstrations.

Miss Raindrop—Celeste Mykol—rode dressed for bathing on the Rainmakers' fire engine. Her court of dewdrop girls were about her.

The parade's grand marshal, one of the most beautiful ever, was South American beauty Luz Marina Zuluaga, the reigning Miss Universe. She is from Colombia.

A police escort led off followed by a band, a color guard, a drum and bugle corps. Mayor and Mrs. Terry Schunk followed.

More floats, more bands, more frivolity, antique cars, fit-tailed convertibles, the Portland Zoo miniature locomotive, clowns, calliopes and can can girls were there.

A stage coach and covered wagons added the Western touch and a Coos Bay pirate ship represented the marine air.

The festival's Grand Floral Parade is Saturday and will bring the celebration to a climax.

River Worker Rites Slated

HERMISTON, Ore. (AP)—Funeral services will be held here Friday for E. P. Dodd, a long-time worker for Columbia River Basin development.

Dodd, 89, died in a hospital here Monday night.

His many occupations included newspaper publisher and editor, farmer, real estate operator, legislator and justice of peace. In all these lines he boosted irrigation, reclamation and river development.

Dodd was born to pioneer parents in Idaho's Boise Valley. He grew up on the banks of an irrigation canal built by his father.

Dodd started his work in behalf of irrigation in 1897 when he purchased the daily Pendleton Tribune after being graduated from the University of Indiana. As editor and publisher he championed irrigation for Morrow and Umatilla counties.

Dodd became secretary of Oregon's first county irrigation association and later was secretary of the first state irrigation association.

Army Imposes Speed Limits

PORTLAND (AP)—Army Engineers Tuesday imposed speed limits for the four-mile stretch of the Columbia River from the lower end of Suavies Island to below Vancouver, Wash.

Col. Walter L. Winegar, the Portland district engineer, set the limits at five knots upstream and eight knots downstream.

He acted after a section of revetment was torn out Tuesday. He also ordered a 24-hour patrol for the damaged levee of Columbia County Drainage District No. 1.

Winegar said 2,300 feet of the 2,600-foot rock revetment was ripped away, apparently by four Canadian Navy vessels steaming to Portland for the Rose Festival. Army Engineers spent \$35,000 to build the revetment five years ago.

Capt. J. C. Pratt, the Canadian squadron commander, expressed regret for any damage. There were six ships in his squadron.
