### Moslem Spiritual Leader Graduates From Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—An undergraduate affectionately called "K" by his classmates gets his bachelor of arts degree Thursday at Harvard College's 300th commencement.

"K's" formal title is His Highness the Aga Khan IV, spiritual leader of some 20 million Ismaili Moslems.

It is in his capacity as Imam of the Middle East sect that he has donated to Harvard \$50,000 to establish a 10-year program of scholarships, preferably for students of his faith.

To Aga Khan's gift, Harvard is expected to put in another \$50,000 to make a scholarship fund of \$100,000 available in the next decade for students from Pakistan, India, the United Arab Republic, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Lebanon, Jordan, Iran, East Africa, including Kenya, Tanganyika, Uganda and Zanzibar.

The Aga Khan, 22, who succeeded his late grandfather Aga Khan III as Ismaili Moslem leader while a sophomore at Harvard, announced the scholarship plan in a formal statement distributed by the college news service.

He said he was "particularly impressed" by Harvard's program of studies of Middle Eastern and Asian affairs. He said more students from these regions should be able to take advantage of "Harvard's accumulated stores of knowledge."

### Red Report May Be True, Says Urey

SAN DIEGO (UPI)—Nobel prize winner Dr. Harold Urey, discoverer of heavy hydrogen, said Tuesday night there is a "good possibility" that a Russian report of an eruption on the moon is true.

Urey, professor at large of the University of California at La Jolla, said that within a few days of the Soviet observation late last year "Convair physicist H. P. Pappendiek of San Diego made a similar sighting."

Scientists said the eruption might have been water heated by radioactivity in the moon's conifer and spread into the airless sky.

Because there was no air, Urey said, the water probably was spouted far out into space. He likened the eruption to the action of Old Faithful at Yellowstone National Park.

"I think there is a pretty good possibility that Russia's Kosaroff might have seen a gaseous eruption on the moon," Urey said.

The famous scientist, speaking before the American Rocket Society, said that the United States is not doing enough in the investigation of meteorites.

"They (meteorites) come to us free of charge," he said. "Yet proper chemical analysis has not been made in many cases."

Urey theorized that some of the meteorites might come from the moon. He said they possibly provided a valuable source of information about the moon's surface.

How did meteorites get from the moon to the earth? Urey suggested that chunks of the moon could have been knocked off by dark comets unseen by man because they have no light.

He declined to predict when man might reach the moon, but he said instruments should be landed on it in the next few years.

### French Decision Creates Stir

LONDON (AP) — France's reported decision to bar U.S. stockpiles of atomic bombs from French soil created a storm today in the Atlantic Congress, approaching the climax of its six-day London meeting.

Reaction inside delegations to the congress was split.

The Atlantic Congress is an unofficial assembly of some 650 leading citizens from the North Atlantic Alliance countries.

Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), a member of the 130-member U.S. delegation, said the French decision called for delicate negotiations with the British and the French.

LONDON (AP) — Actor Sonny Hale, 57, a British stage and screen favorite for more than 25 years, died today of a throat infection.

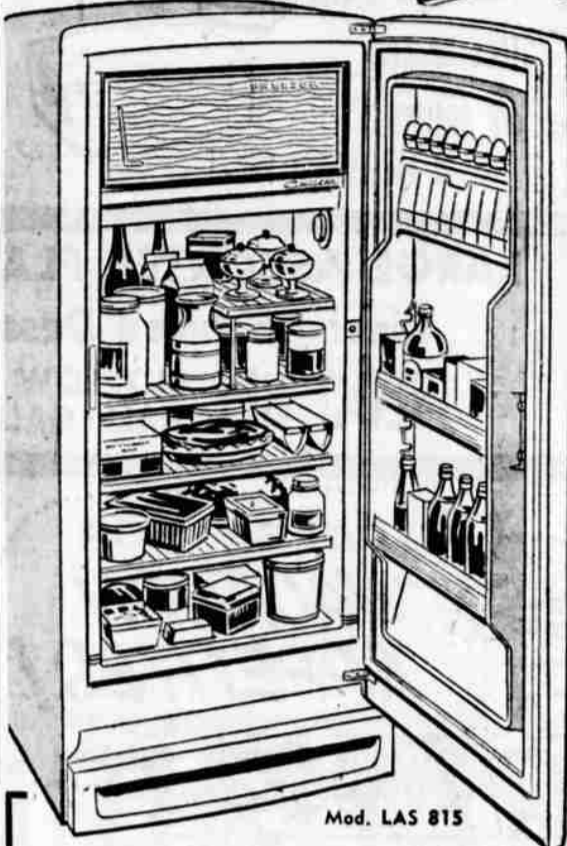

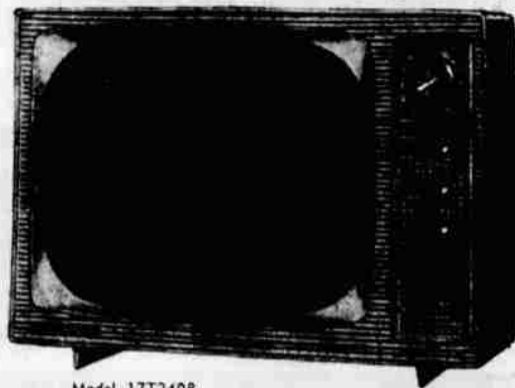
