BALTIMORE (AP)—City police report they shot and killed a large, black bear in downtown Baltimore about 4:15 a.m. today. Two men spotted the animal late Tuesday night near a cemetery in the southwest section. Police were alerted. Some 100 officers joined in the hunt. The bear wandered in and out of alleys, with dogs at its heels. The hunt ended about five hours later when police killed the animal with a high-powered rifle. It took four policemen to load it into a wagon.
