

Podres, Newcombe Buhl Toss Shutouts

It took Johnny Podres five years and a little more than a month to pitch his first two-hitter in the majors. Now the stocky southpaw has put away two in less than three weeks.
He got the second Thursday night, giving up only a leadoff single by Richie Ashburn and a fourth-inning single by Wally Post while pitching Los Angeles to an 11-0 victory over the Phillies at Philadelphia. That gave the Dodgers full command of third place in the National League.
Podres' 15th shutout in the majors left the Dodgers within two games of second place San Francisco, beaten 12-9 at Pittsburgh. That plunked the Giants' two games back of Milwaukee's first place Braves, who won 4-0 at St. Louis behind Bob Buhl's five-hitter.
Don Newcombe also collected a shutout, giving up nine hits while winning his fifth in a row in an 8-0 Cincinnati victory at Chicago. The Cincinnati dropped the Cubs into a fourth place tie with Pittsburgh.
In the American League, southpaw Bill Pierce pitched the fourth one-hitter of his career for a 3-1 decision at Washington that gave the Chicago White Sox a 1-1/2 game lead. Cleveland took second place from Baltimore by beating the Orioles 2-1. Detroit reclaimed fourth place with an 8-1 romp at Boston while Kansas City slipped New York to fifth by belting the Yankees 9-3.

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

With only two slight changes the game commission at its meeting Friday, June 5, established the 1959 hunting seasons for deer, elk, and antelope along the lines of those tentatively proposed two weeks ago.

Under the final rules the buck deer season would run from October 3 through October 25. The elk season would extend from October 31 through November 11 along the coast range and from October 31 through November 22 on the Cascade and eastern Oregon elk ranges. Antelope season was set to run from August 15 through 19. In one of the changes, archers were given an additional week of hunting in several areas. These include the Wasco, Mt. Emily, Starkey, Baker and Keating game management units and the Keno area where the season would run from September 5 through September 27. The only other change in the tentative rules was lopping the extended weekend of hunting off the Applegate and Evans Creek deer management units. The season in these units for either-sex deer on a permit basis would run from October 17 through October 25, the same dates set for most of the other deer management units. All other tentative proposals were retained by the commission and adopted as final rules for the 1959 seasons. A complete hunting synopsis will be available to the public shortly after mid-June. Hunters were urged to be on the alert for news releases pertaining to filing applications for special tags and permits.

Fishing regulations stipulate only have a couple of days, the Klamath closes June 14, to take advantage of angler Whitey Sheets advice but here it is:
Whitey hooked five nice bass ranging from 1-3 pounds last Thursday and went back Sunday and snagged three ranging from 2-4 pounds. Says Whitey, "Any one who likes to do a little experimenting can stick his boat into the Klamath and just run up and down the river trying various spots for bass."
He used a red and white Dredge, frog flatfish, pork rind, airplane spinners, streamer flies behind spinners, and kind of a mix-em-match-em bait.

Whitey finds they are apt to hit anytime of the day providing there is a little ripple on the water. Still water discourages the fish claims Sheets.
Fish in sloughs or mouth of sloughs and you will find bass. Whitey plans to do a little fishing for crappie given the time and the company of some one.

Bradshaw Inks For Black Sox
WEED — Kim Bradshaw, 1959 Oregon State senior and a 1955 Weed High School graduate has joined the Drain, Oregon, Black Sox, semi-pro baseball team for the season.
Bradshaw received the Victor Brown Jr., annual trophy given at the OSC memorial banquet as the outstanding baseball player of the year. He was nosed out by .602 of a point for the Northern Division batting king crown. He posted a .357 league mark, hit .500 in preseason play and knocked in 28 runs in the first 14 games. He doubled his closest contender for stolen bases for a league lead of 12. Jerry Thornton of Washington had six.
Bradshaw was one of three OSC Beavers selected by the league coaches to the N.D. all-star nine and was also rated for his performance as a leftfielder.
He was the 1955 recipient of the Neal Wade perpetual trophy as the outstanding athlete during his four years at WHS, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Bradshaw of Weed.
