Adviser On Public Health Sets Centennial Speech

A woman medical doctor who has served as an adviser on public health administration to the foreign governments will appear in Klamath Falls Wednesday the first speaker in a Centennial Lecture Series. She is one of several famous persons, Oregon-born to be featured.

She is Dr. Estella Ford Warner, retired medical director, United States Public Health Service.

She will speak at 8 p.m. in the Mills School Auditorium. The event will be free to the public.

Dr. Warner's topic will concern public health problems faced by the countries in which she has worked and the United States stake in helping solve them.

She is one of seven distinguished graduates of Oregon colleges and universities who will make a series of speeches in the state this summer under sponsorship of the Centennial Committee on Higher Education. Hers is the only talk of the series scheduled for Klamath Falls.

When Dr. Warner entered the public health service in 1932 she was the first woman ever to receive a commission in the regular corps of a U. S. uniformed

tered private practice. She organized the first maternal and child health division in the Oregon State Health Department and served as chief of the unit from 1923 to 1925. She then joined the Health Demonstration Program sponsored by the Commonwealth Fund of New York City. Commissioned in the Public Health Service in 1932, she served as director of the division of child health studies, chief of the division of rural health, regional medical director for Indian health in the Southwest, deputy regional director at Chicago, regional director at Kansas City, Missouri and director of the division of state grants.

In March, 1951, she was sent to Lebanon to establish a department of preventive medicine and public health at American University at Beirut and to help reorganize the nation's health ministry. At the conclusion of that assignment in December, 1951, she was awarded Les Chevalier des Cedars de Liban, the first time this decoration had gone to a woman or an American.

From December, 1951, to 1955 she served as consultant on public health to the health ministry of India. January 1, 1956, she retired and returned to Albuquerque, New Mexico, where she now lives.

She was recalled to active duty in 1956 and spent from March to June in Ceylon as a consultant on public health administration. In 1957 and again in the winter of 1958-59 she served as a consultant to the World Health Organization. She will be introduced at her speech here by Dr. William G. Holford Jr., chairman of the Klamath County Medical Society.

USC Graduates Hear East Prexy

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—A Mexican divorce has ended the marriage of Dr. W. S. McBirnie, Baptist minister who resigned his pastorate after admitting "improper involvement" with a woman member of his congregation.

Judge Eduardo Garza Villanor of the Court of First Instance granted the divorce June 1 in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, it was learned Thursday.

The divorce was by mutual consent, which is sufficient grounds under Mexican law. Mrs. McBirnie's maiden name, Jane Harvey, was restored. The couple was married in 1940.

The congregation of Trinity Baptist Church accepted the resignation of the 39-year-old minister Wednesday at a meeting attended by 1,200 persons.

The former Mrs. McBirnie declined comment on the divorce. McBirnie's whereabouts are unknown.
