President Endorses Little League Week

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. — President Dwight D. Eisenhower has called on the people of the United States to observe National Little League Baseball Week during the period of June 14 to 20, 1959.

In a formal proclamation issued Thursday, June 4, at the White House, Mr. Eisenhower accorded national endorsement of the highest order to Little League, which annually embraces more than a million youngsters under the age of 13 and which has taken on global proportions in extension to 23 nations.

The Presidential proclamation was authorized by a resolution of the Congress of the United States, which gave solid support to Little League by unanimous approval of

the measure introduced in the House of Representatives last January.

Significantly, the proclamation, which emphasized the scope and national status of Little League comes on the occasion of the 20th anniversary season. Efforts to secure the proclamation were initiated more than a year ago by President Peter J. McGovern of Little League Baseball in an exchange of correspondence with Mr. Eisenhower. Earlier this year, McGovern visited Washington and enlisted the support of many congressional leaders and as a result the measure introduced by Congressman Alvin R. Bush of Pennsylvania won bipartisan support in both houses.

NATIONAL LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL WEEK
BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the year 1959 marks the Twentieth Anniversary of Little League Baseball; and

WHEREAS Little League Baseball has contributed much to a wider interest in the game and encouraged our young people to direct their energies in healthful, competitive team sports; and

WHEREAS participation in this sport by boys — and by their adult leaders — has helped to develop a feeling of fair play, community spirit and respect for the discipline of rules and decisions; and

WHEREAS the Congress, by House Concurrent Resolution 17, agreed to June 1, 1959, has authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning the second Monday in June of each year as National Little League Baseball Week, in recognition of the national and community benefits resulting from Little League activities;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim the week beginning the second Monday in June of 1959, and the week beginning the second Monday in June of each succeeding year, as National Little League Baseball Week.

And I invite the people of the United States to observe such week each year in schools, parks, athletic fields, and other suitable places with appropriate ceremonies and activities designed to further these objectives.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed, DONE at the City of Washington this fourth day of June in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-nine and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-third.

Casper Leads By 3 Strokes In US Open Golf Tourney

MAMARONECK, N.Y. (AP) — Bill Casper shot into a three-stroke lead over Ben Hogan Saturday at the three-quarter point of the rain-delayed U.S. Open Golf Championship. He fired a third round 69 for a score of 208.

A drenching thunderstorm twice delayed play Saturday morning and finally forced postponement of the fourth round until Sunday.

Hogan, the man they said was through, remained in powerful contention for a record fifth Open victory by shooting a pin-pointed 71 for 221.

In a drama-packed day before a crowd estimated at 20,000, Sam Snead, who never has won the Open, stormed back into the picture. He fired a three-under-par 67 which placed him in a tie for third place at 212 with Arnold Palmer, 1958 Masters champion, and bespectacled Bob Rosburg, who matched Snead's 67, best score of the tournament.

Par for the 6,873-yard Winged Foot course is 35-35-70.

Kansas Sweeps NCAA Meet

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP)—Kansas Big Eight champions swept to their first team title and two meet records were shattered, another tied, in the 38th NCAA track meet Saturday. One performance which bettered a world mark, and one which matched a world record were disallowed because of an aiding wind.

The closing event, the 220-yard low hurdles, brought the most spectacular performance, a 22.5-second victory by Hayes Jones of Eastern Michigan, the meet's only double winner.

However, this clocking which would have been a new world mark around a full curve, was disallowed because of a 5.248-mile-per-hour wind.

Another brilliant effort, a 9.3-second victory by Kansas' Charlie Tidwell in the 100-yard dash which matched the world and meet record for the distance, was canceled because of a 10.4-mile-an-hour wind.

Champions Race

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore. (AP)—Last year's champions will defend their titles Sunday at the 17th Golden Poles ski race on the slopes of Mount Hood.

A field of 25 men and 5 women will compete in the final skiing event of the season and one of the closing events of the Portland Rose Festival.

Lorne O'Connor, of Vancouver, B.C., will be trying for his second title in the men's division and Putzi Frankl of Austria will defend her championship in the women's division.

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Favorite Captures Big Race

NEW YORK (AP) — Sword Dancer outslugged Bagdad in a bitter stretch duel and captured the \$145,500 Belmont Stakes Saturday by three-quarters of a length as two horses fell on the final turn, throwing jockeys Eddie Arcaro and Walter Blum into the mud. Royal Orbit was third by 12 lengths.

Arcaro was taken off the track in an ambulance and when he regained consciousness complained of neck pains. Blum walked off unaided.

Bagdad took the lead midway of the final bend in the 1 1/2-mile race and Arcaro, aboard Black Hills, and Willie Shoemaker, riding Sword Dancer, moved up to challenge.

Black Hills, owned by the King Ranch, was directly behind Howard Keck's Bagdad with Sword Dancer on the outside. Black Hills suddenly lurched, head down and tumbled into the mud. A short time later the King Ranch colt was destroyed. He suffered a compound fracture of the right shin bone.

Lake Erie, ridden by Blum, was directly behind Black Hills and tumbled over Arcaro's mount.

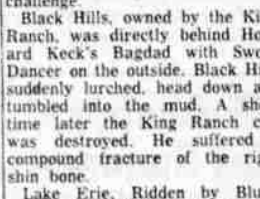
The spill marred the 91st and richest running of the famed finale of the Kentucky Derby-Preakness-Belmont triple crown series for 3-year-olds.

Arcaro was seeking a record seventh Belmont victory.

Sword Dancer, a Virginia-bred colt owned by the Brookmeade Stable of Isabel Dodge Sloane, had finished second in the Kentucky Derby, nosed out by Tony Lee. He also was second in the Preakness, four lengths behind Royal Orbit.

Sword Dancer, the slight favorite paid \$3.30, \$3.00 and \$2.30 in earning \$93,323.

Sword Dancer's time was a sparkling 2:28 2-5.

Ed Arcaro OK In Race Spill

NEW YORK (AP)—"I never ate so much mud in my life," said jockey Eddie Arcaro Saturday night as he lay in a hospital bed two hours after being thrown from his horse in the Belmont Stakes.

Eddie was smiling, Dr. Alexander Kaye had just told him that apparently there was nothing seriously wrong and that he should be up and around in a couple of days.

"Boy, that's good news," said the 43-year-old veteran who was thrown to the ground in the rich race won by Sword Dancer. "I've got a little headache and the back of my neck is sore from where that other horse hit me."

"But it's not nearly as bad as when they rolled me into here on a stretcher a while ago," Arcaro was hit by Lake Erie, handled by Walter Blum, when Black Hills went down. Lake Erie was right behind and plowed into him.

Dr. Kaye said the first examination showed no fractures but that as a precaution Eddie's neck was placed in traction.

Arcaro has been the victim of more than a dozen spills in his career but always has come up for more.

Pittsburgh Sells Smith To Detroit

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates Saturday sold southpaw pitcher R. G. Smith to the Detroit Tigers for the waiver prices. Smith appeared in 20 games with the Pirates this season but had no won-lost record.

The Pirates rebuilt their roster to 25 players by claiming pitcher Bob Porterfield from the Chicago Cubs. Earlier this season, the Pirates handed the veteran right-hander his release and the Cubs signed him as a free agent. The Cubs asked waivers on him this week.

Klamath Falls, Bend Legion '9's Share Saturday Day-Night Bill

The 1958 state champion Bend American Legion baseball team capitalized on a pair of big innings to win a 12-8 victory over the Klamath Falls Legion nine in the second game of a day-night twinbill in Gem Stadium Saturday.

Both clubs took to Bend for a doubleheader this afternoon. None of the four games in District 4 league play.

The Saturday night game was held as a benefit ball game, all proceeds going toward the Little League Ballpark fund.

Bend broke the ice first but the KF squad jumped up with three runs in the bottom of the first inning and then added five more in the second to hold a shortlived 8-1 lead. The Bend squad closed the gap 8-6 in the third, then added four in the fifth and two in the seventh while the Klamath Falls club failed to mark another tally.

The loss was charged to reliever Smiley Herrera, who replaced starter Bob Wilkinson midway in the fifth. The winner was Bend's ace right-hander Ed Cecil. Cecil, although he gave up 11 hits spaced them so that the damage was confined to the first two frames. He walked three and fanned six.

Wilkinson gave up six hits, walked three and fanned two before being replaced.

Second baseman Don Willey sparked the KF squad with a triquet and a single and some brilliant glove work. Leftfielder Blake Griggs and first baseman Don Gredel each added a pair of singles while catcher Dave Saks

whacked the longest hit of the day, a triple that bounced once and hit the deep left-center wall.

Long ball hitters for Bend included Fred Christiansen, left field, and first baseman Jon Lentz, both nailing triples. Pitcher Cecil was credited with a pair of singles as was catcher Andy Cleveland.

Saturday afternoon, chucker Johnny Webb shutout the Bend nine with a masterful seven hit performance backed up by some beautiful fielding on the parts of himself and his mates.

Webb, in working the full distance for the seven inning 2-0 win, walked only three Bend batters and whiffed five.

His opponent, loser Andy Warrington, gave up only three KF hits but the combination of the three proved fatal. Warrington fanned one Legionnaire and walked five.

The game was highlighted by four sparkling double plays, three of which, belonging to the KF squad, pulled Webb out of threatening circumstances. The Bend nine capitalized on the fourth.

Coach Hatfield's Legion squad topped the state champs by virtue of a pair of tallies scored in the first stanza. Blake Griggs, left field, the second man to bat for KF, smashed a screaming triple to left center then scored when centerfielder Rich Depew, the next man at the plate, doubled down the left field foul line. Depew romped home moments later when catcher Dave Saks singled to right. The local side failed to collect another hit off Warrington for the remainder of the game.

The Bend club threatened in the second frame when first sacker Joe Lentz and second baseman Wally Donahue singled after Mike Genna had walked. With the bases loaded and none out Webb forced the next batter to pop up to short and the threat died when pitcher Warrington grounded to third baseman Exton Kiger who caught the run at the plate. Saks, in turn, fired the ball to Ross Paxton at first for the last out.

A minor threat in the fourth, after Webb had walked two men, was stifled when Webb snared Donahue's line drive and flipped it to Herrera for the second double
