

300 South Suburban Players Stage Meet

Had there been no one in Gem Stadium Friday night but the embryo ballplayers that showed up the South Suburban Little League jamboree would have been termed a success.

There were, however, in addition to 300 major and minor Little Leaguers who formed on the field for introduction, stands jammed full of proud parents and fans who witnessed the initiation of the newly formed suburbanite youngsters summer baseball program.

The jamboree, which was formulated and directed by Bob Abbey, opened with the formation on the field of the 20 teams of SS Little Leaguers.

Upon completing the symmetrical colorful formation of the swarm of players, Boy Scout Troop 100 officiated at the flag ceremonies.

Immediately following the introductions of players, coaches, league

officials and umpires, three two-inning ball games played by the six major league squads were gotten underway by young Gail Putman, a polo victim who threw out the first ball to be used by his friends.

The South Suburban League, which is opening its first year as a member of the National Association of Little Leagues is under the direction of Major William Harris, president, Vice President Sam Moss and Secretary-Treasurer Captain William Hill.

In the exhibition ball games played as part of the jamboree, the Kingsley Field nine and Teamsters Union Local 911 battled to a 1-1 tie in the first inning which was followed by DARCO's 1-0 victory over Oregon Food. In the third and final game of the evening the House of Discount staged a three-run, last of the second surge to dump Metter Brothers 3-2. None of the games played has any bearing on the league standings.

In addition to the six aforementioned teams which form the "major leagues" are 14 minor league teams. They are sponsored by Summers Lane, Richfield, Kilowatts No. 1, Kingsley Field Fire Station, Safeway South Sixth, Albers Feed, Roberts Hardware, Kilowatts No. 2, Sorans Poultry, Specialized Service, Klamath Lockers, Klamath Stockmen's Commission, Western Oil & Burner, Dunn's Heating Oil and Pacific Supply Cooperative.

Abbey, who emceed the affair, noted to the crowd that the SS organization would cooperate fully with the older Klamath Falls Little League mentioning that player facilities would be interchanged by both groups.

During the proceedings fans were reminded that associate or active memberships in the South Suburban Leagues were available to the public with the thought that funds to help further the big program undertaken would be welcome.

Major league play continues this week and minor league action opens Monday at Washburn field with 12 teams slated for action in six games.

It has been rumored that Jones' Ford Thunderbird has too many cubic inches. It has also been rumored that somebody may make the local driver tear the engine down and measure the cubic inches.

Next Sunday's races will feature a race between a horse and one of the hardtops. The horse, a sturdy mount donated by Dr. M. C. McFadden, will be pitted against a hardtop in a 200-yard race, much to the delight of local racing enthusiasts.

Stated Earl Sheridan, local hardtop promoter, "I don't think that this horse can outrun a hardtop at any distance under one-quarter of a mile."

The horse is the same one that the local doctor used to carry the pony express mail last week.

CHICAGO (AP) — Travis M. Kerr's mighty Round Table put on a great stretch run to overtake Etouan and win the \$36,800 Citation Handicap Saturday by equaling the Washington Park track record set by Swaps in '36.

Round Table, racing's all-time top money winner, picked up 33,700 and boosted his earnings to \$1,385,939. He whipped off the mile in 1:33 2-5.

Top-weighted at 130 pounds and conceding his rivals 17 to 26 pounds, Round Table voted Horse of the Year for 1958, paid \$3.80, \$3.20 and \$3.20.

Harvard Crew Big Race Winner

NEW LONDON, Conn. (AP) — A speedy Harvard varsity eight, rowing magnificently, trounced Yale for the first time since 1953 in rain, fog and sun late Saturday in America's only four-mile crew race.

The Crimson oarsmen, completing their first unbeaten season since 1942, stopped Yale's five straight winning streak by two and a half lengths. Harvard was clocked in 19:12 and the Blue in 20:02.

Pisoni, who was hitting .165 for Richmond in the International League, was brought up to provide defensive insurance against the loss of Bauer, who suffered a pulled hamstring muscle in his left leg on Wednesday and will be sidelined about two weeks.
