Valued Paper Loaned By DAR For Display At City Library

The Klamath Falls City Library has recently been loaned by Eulalona Chapter, D.A.R., a valued paper 159 years old. This copy of the Ulster County Gazette, published at Kingston, New York, was the property of the late Francis Olds of this city and was presented to Eulalona Chapter many years ago.

The Gazette, a four page paper dated January 4, 1800, carried the story of the death of President George Washington, the account of his funeral, a list of pallbearers and remarks by prominent personalities of that day. The death occurred December 14, 1799.

Yellowed, aged, and crumbling, the chapter had been treasuring this not-to-be-handled relic in Eulalona's first scrapbook. Mrs. H. A. Pedersen, past regent, expressed a desire for the preservation of this document and Mrs. Charles K. Wells, historian, having knowledge of a process called lamination which is used to restore old documents, arranged for treatment of the paper by this method of preservation.

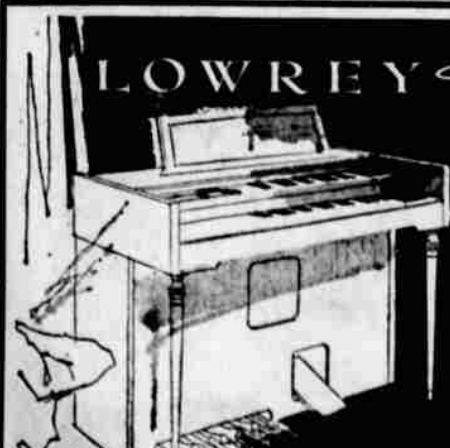
