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Popular Hawaiian Singer 'Sings Teen-agers' Praise

"Young people are more interested in hearing operatic and musical comedy music these days," says Charles K. L. Davis, Hawaiian tenor. (The "K" is for Keonanaulani the "L" for Llewellyn.) The Hawaiian on an American tour emphasizes that this change indicates they have a greater appreciation for good music.

Charles, a 20-year-old mixture of English, Welsh and Hawaiian is enjoying his new-found popularity with the younger set.

"They usually write for my picture and those who have seen me on TV send along compliments. Many teen-agers know my records, but not much about me. They expect to see a young boy. If they haven't seen me on the air."

If you don't know what he's like, here are some vital and incidental statistics:

Charles was born in Honolulu. He's a bachelor. (But it's too late, girls, he's taken. Plans are in the making for a wedding. He's engaged to a girl who works at the Italian consul's office in New York.)

His hobbies include stamp collecting and old cars. (An old Rolls Royce was paid off long ago by renting it out.) He is a

skindiver. His mother brought him up in the old-fashioned Hawaiian tradition that the sea is the place to fish for your food. Charles goes down without aquilings, 50 or more feet to spear fish, and attributes his powerful singing voice to breath control learned in diving.

Most native Hawaiians go spear fishing, and enjoy sports, one reason why there is very little juvenile delinquency in Hawaii, he says.

Charles attended the University of Hawaii, and the Juillard School of Music and was winner of the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air last year. He has made a national tour with the Bel Canto Trio. He is a disappointment to his physician father who was hoping Charles would follow in his footsteps.

"I never could get music out of my mind," he says, "so there was no point in studying medicine." He is an accomplished pianist and organist and sang and played the organ in his neighborhood church. His favorite album is "Prayer for Peace." Another is his album of romantic arias, very popular with young and old.

Charles carries this romantic theme out in real life. "I may not be able to cook," he says, "but I'll be able to give my wife plenty of affection."
